This is only one of the many losses now being paid by the com-

The fact that the Railway Passengers has paid out over thirty-two millions in claims, and that ample funds are provided for such catastrophes, fitly illustrates the importance of insuring in a company granting adequate security to meet such contingencies. The Suppression of Opium.

SHANGHAI, To-Day. A circular telegram from General Li Yuen Heng, Vice-President of the Chinese Republic, concerning the suppression of opium in China, is given great prominence in the native press Li Yuen Heng begins the circular with reference to the action of the Ngan Hwei Provincial Assembly, which urged the President of the Republic and the Cabinet Minister press forward negotiations with foreign powers for a revision of treaties in view of a stoppage of the importation and transit of opium into the interior of China. Li Yuen Heng points out the suppression of opium includes three main undertakings: first, the prohibition of its importation and transportation; second, the suppression of its cultivation; third, the suppression of opium smoking. He calls on officials and assemblies of people in all the provinces of China to consummate the action of the Provincial Assembly of Ngan Hwei by doing their utmost in their several degrees to further campaign.


