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



TORONTO, Jan. 19. For the first time for the past forty rears, the Humber River has broken up after once freezing in mid-winter.

MONTREAL, Jan. 19. Following the high level temperaure of 46 degrees Fahrenheit, and a minimum register of 35 degrees, Friday was the warmest January day for eight years. Spring-like weather continues in Montreal. A record eary opening of the harbor is prophesied by shipping men.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 19. The Minister of the Interior, has issued the report of an engagment be tween the Turkish and Greek fleets between the Islands of Tenedos and Lemnos, lasting several hours. According to this official announcement there were heavy losses on both sides. 
