built by his father and grandfather literally with their own hands, for they were typical Bavarian peasant artisan-artists, the father a woodcarver, the grandfather a smith. The late Sir Hubert carried on the fam-



Although as indicated above

clause 25 of the new laws allows German resident to acquire a new na tionality and at the same time to re tain his own if he applies beforehand through a German Consul, for th written permission of his own Gov rnment. The idea, of course, is tha the foreign nationality in such a case is acquired solely for business con venience or some such reason, and does not constitute' a repudiation of German nationality.
