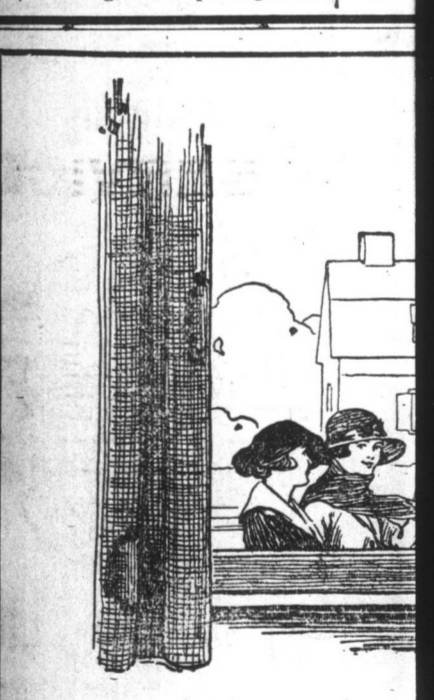

GERMANS MOVING BACK. WITH THE AMERICAN ARMIES IN THE MEUSE and MOSELLE, Nov. 13.—Germany's army was "moving slowly along its whole front towards us" today. The American forces remain exactly where they were when the armistice went into effect. So far known at the American army headquarters no disposition has been made at any point that part of the withdrawal of the German troops. It is believed that the reversing of the gains of the great German machine will not be simple. There would be surprise among the American officers had the German front remained most touched, but already there appears to have been left immediately in front of the American line little more than a fringe of soldiers. In some places even that fringe has been withdrawn so far that the army men this side do not know its location. It is believed that the reversing of the progress of the great German machine will not be simple. There would be a surprise among the American officers and the German front remained unscathed, but already there appears to have been left immediately behind the American line little more than a fringe of soldiers. In some places even that line has been advanced so far that the army men on this side do not know its location. The Germans reluctantly abandoned their efforts to continue fraternization where the lines were still in proximity, but threats to hold as prisoners were approaching the American line, and the American line the activity of supply trains mobilized at the front settled down to routine duty. WANTS TO ESCAPE.
COPENHAGEN, Nov. 13. The new Bavarian Government has sent a message to President Wilson through Switzerland, expressing its fears that the armistice terms will bring chaos to the disordered young republic, and requests that Great Britain, France and Italy be asked to punish the guilty. The message adds that the German autocracy and military party do not deserve mercy.

SOCIALIST VIEW OF ARMISTICE.
BASEL, Nov. 12. The Socialist Vorwarts, of Berlin, describes the German armistice conditions as terrible, and adds, since the old regime has collapsed, the new government must accept the conditions and execute them loyally. The treaties have been signed and must be executed. It will be the task of the new government to conclude rapidly the best peace possible.

A THREAT TO POLAND.
GENEVA, Switzerland, Nov. 12. Baron Von Wangenheim, the German military Governor of occupied Poland has issued a proclamation in which he declares that in the midst of the realization of Poland of her national ideals, a section of the population, the enemies of order, are attacking like brigands the German army officials and are seeking to cut communications. The proclamation threatens that the most severe measures will be taken against those elements, and concludes: "Take care lest a fresh struggle break out and your beautiful country be reduced to ruins, thanks to a few agitators."

RENOUNCES POSITION.
BERNE, Nov. 12. Budapest newspapers received here

contain details of a remarkable ceremony in which Archduke Josef, of Austria, and his son, Josef Francis, took oath to the Hungarian constitution as simple Hungarian citizens, named Hapsburg. The newspapers say this was the first instance in four hundred years when such a renunciation was made. All privileges were given up by the Archduke and his son. The newspapers also say that the little principality of Liechtenstein of 10,000 inhabitants, situated on the Swiss Eastern frontier, also had a revolution. The Prince of Liechtenstein was forced to leave the country. He was superseded by Dr. Ritter, a lawyer of Innsbruck.

KAISER REACHED HOLLAND.
AMSTERDAM, Nov. 12. (By the A.P.)—William Hohenzollern, former German Emperor, arrived Monday afternoon at the Castle of Amerongen, Count Von Benthick's country seat, at Maarn, in the province of Utrecht.

THE EX-EMPEROR'S COMPANIONS.
LONDON, Nov. 12. A despatch to the Daily Mail from Maarn, Holland, says that among those who accompany the former German Emperor to the Castle of Amerongen, were Generals Von Plesien, Von Gouard, Von Braniberg, Von Lintoff and Von Griesman. The correspondent of the Daily Mail says he hears that the former emperor is not regarded as an officer, because he has resigned his titles and offices. The other officers in the party were Colonel Count Von Moltke, Surgeon General Von Miseser, Major Hirschfeld, Marshal of the Court, Von Plann and five captains. After the arrival of the German party, General Osen of the Dutch army asked all the members to give parole.

IMPERIAL CONFERENCE TO MEET.
LONDON, Nov. 12. (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.)—

Reuter's Agency learns that the Imperial War Cabinet will shortly resume its sittings in order to deliberate on the terms of peace. There will be also important conferences and discussions in London between the Imperial and Dominion statesmen.

REVOLUTIONARY RECRUITS.
BASEL, Nov. 11. The crews of the German battleships Poseha, Calfaelstland, Nassau and Oldenburg, have joined the revolutionary movement, according to a despatch from Brunsbutel, Prussian Holstein. The four battleships named are among the largest in the German navy.

FOR HUMANITY SAKE.
PARIS, Nov. 13. Premier Clemenceau, in concluding his speech in the Chamber of Deputies to-day on the armistice terms, said Germany surrendered to us all locomotives and 150,000 cars which had been taken from us. This will embarrass her means of provisioning. Germany has waited until the last minute and when exhausted she has been obliged to accept capitulation conditions that are not normal. In this first hour we must come to her aid. We do not make war against humanity but for humanity.

MONTENEGRO CAPITAL LIBERATED.
LONDON, Nov. 13. Cetinje, the capital of Montenegro, has been liberated, says a Siberian official statement issued Tuesday. On Sunday Serbian troops entered the town of Versek, in Hungary, 25 miles north of the Danube, dispersing and capturing elements of German rear-guards. A number of guns and war material were captured. The Serbians also entered Novissad.

FOOD SITUATION STILL SERIOUS.
LONDON, Nov. 12. John Robert Clynes, British Food Controller, said to-day that the food situation in Europe continues to be serious and necessitated larger shipments until spring. He said that he confidently expected the United States to back up any British sacrifices which might be necessary in behalf of the needy peoples of Europe recently freed from German domination.

WANT WILSON AT CONFERENCE.
WASHINGTON, Nov. 13. Messages from high sources in Europe are reaching President Wilson urging that he personally attend the great peace conference that will finally settle the issues growing out of the war. The President, it was said to-day, had given no indication of how he regards the suggestion, though some of those usually well informed believe he has an open mind on the subject and may give it consideration.

EXPECTED TO CRUSH REVOLUTION.
COPENHAGEN, Nov. 13. Telegrams found in the Palace of the Former German Crown Prince, according to a Berlin telegram to the National Tidende, show that it had been planned to send loyal troops from the front to Berlin in an attempt to crush the revolution.

THE DAY OF GLORY.
PARIS, Nov. 12. "The day of glory has arrived," a line from the Marseillaise in the text of editorial comment in the morning newspapers. Former Premier Viviani in the Petit Journal, says France during four years has showed an example unique in the annals of the human race. Her calm has been magnificent. Who could have expected the apparent impassiveness of a nation known for the spontaneity of its enthusiasm. The people of France knew from the first that on the war was staked the end of the world of the Teutons or the end of the Latin world. M. Capus, in the Figaro, says, as to the civilized world with her will depend on the manner in which she accepts defeat and punishment. To-day, says the Matin, the civilized world gives itself up unreservedly to superhuman joy at the triumph over the forces of barbarism. Tomorrow we must get to work and build a lasting edifice of a free and just humanity.

EARTHQUAKES AT PORTO RICO.
SAN JUAN, Nov. 13. Two earthquakes occurred in Porto Rico yesterday, the first at eight o'clock in the morning and the second at 6 o'clock in the evening. Both shocks caused some damage in cities reporting loss in the earthquakes of October, but there was no additional loss of life.

BOLSHEVIKI CAUSING TROUBLE.
STOCKHOLM, Nov. 13. Russian Bolsheviki forces are marching on Finland. They are now threatening the Finnish seaport of Viborg, 72 miles north west of Petrograd.

WILL COMPLETE WARSHIPS.
WASHINGTON, Nov. 13. All warships now under construction or contracted for will be completed, Secretary Daniels said to-day, after the weekly meeting of the War Cabinet.

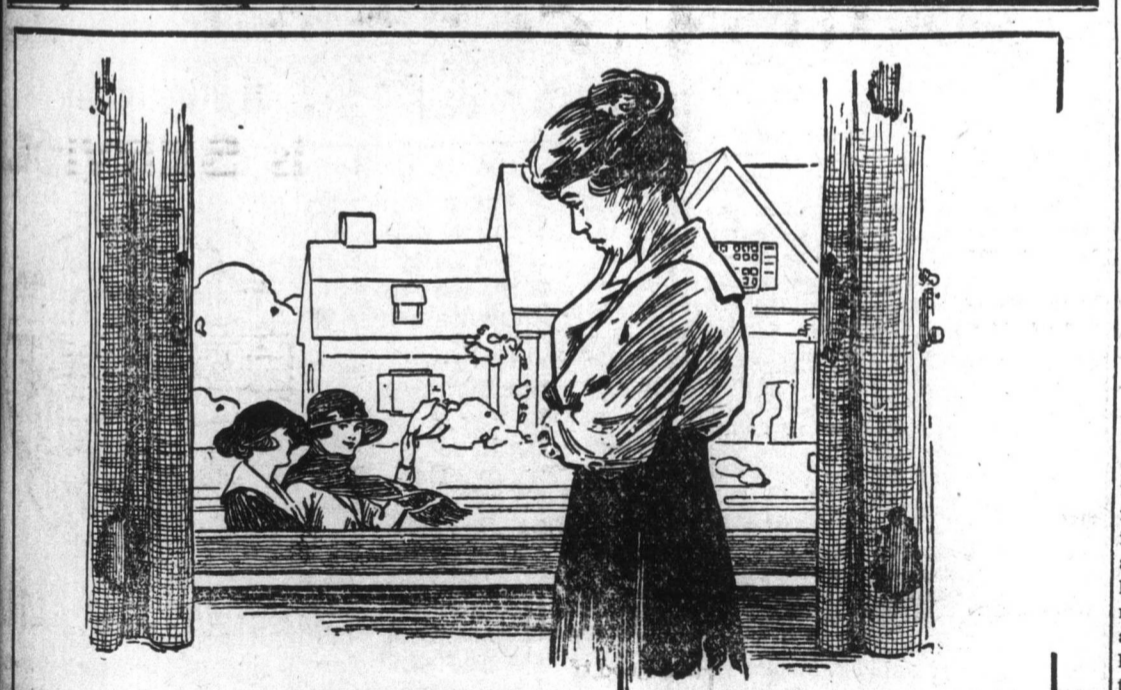

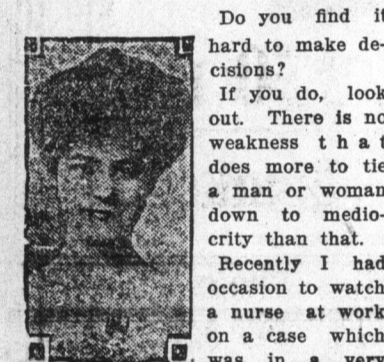

tleships carry eight anchors.

Anchor smithing is about the only
shipbuilding trade in which machinery
has failed to out men. To hold 20-
000 tons of Queen Elizabeth in a gale
requires something heavy, strong, and
reliable. A machine may roll our
huge armour plates, but for the last
resort, when two millions of public
money and the lives of a thousand
men are in jeopardy, the reliability
of a hand-welded anchor is recognised.

The blackest of black squads are the
anchor smiths; their work is contin-
ually among white-hot metal, among
fumes, smoke, glare and dust. The
hammers regularly wielded by them
are the heaviest known in any indus-
try, and as one watches the brassy
giants swinging their arms in the vol-
canic glow from the anvils one won-
ders whether such are recruited from
a special race of Titans or are merely
the development of the fittest, the
cream of thousands of failures.

The forging of steel anchor-chains
is a typical Black Country industry,
though those for the ill-fated Lusitania
were made at Pontypridd, in South
Wales. The huge links were nearly
two feet long, the metal being three
and three-quarter inches in diameter,
and each link weighed 160 lbs.

The Lusitania's main cable was
about 2,000 feet in length, and weigh-
ed 100 tons. Naval statistics on the
matter are scarcely available in war-
time, but one would judge that at
least four times the quantity of chain
would be carried by a Queen Eliz-
abeth.

When it is remembered that each of
our battleships and cruisers must, for
safety's sake, have at least eight full
sized anchors with chains to match
(to say nothing of the needs of lesser
craft and of our mercantile marine)
the war-time importance of the indus-
try will be the better appreciated.

Notorious Crook

Chicago, Nov. 6.—Edward Joseph
Fay, a world-notorious crook and
bank robber, known as "Eddie Fay,"
was found shot to death in an alley
here to-day. There was a bullet
wound in his head, just below the
right ear. The police believe he was
slain by a member of his own gang,
following an argument over the divi-
sion of loot. He became international-
ly known fifteen years ago, when he
was arrested in Paris, with "Mickey"
Gleason, also of Chicago, for robbery
of a Paris bank. They were sent to
Devil's Island, a French prison, sur-
rounded by cliffs, and Fay later
escaped. He was the first criminal to
make a successful break for freedom
from that prison. The police estimate
that Fay has stolen more than
\$2,000,000 from banks throughout the
country.

No more Collars

A lawyer of New York named Leight-
on Fooks has organised an anti-collars
league to relieve mankind and to
help win the war.

Wearing collars, he tells us, is de-
trimental to health, preventing free
movement of the neck muscles and the
flow of the blood. Few men do not
wish at some time or other that
collars were never invented.

Approximately, in America, 125,000
men and 200,000 women are engaged in
making "this suffocating harness and
nuisance for our throats." Thousands
more are engaged in washing and iron-
ing them. Valuable time, too, is spent
in making the buttonholes in shirts to
which the collar is attached, and
thousands are making collar-buttons,
which labour would be more usefully
utilized in a collarless country.

"No author ever wrote anything
worth reading with a collar on," de-
clares Mr. Fooks, and he believes
President Wilson always removes his
collar "when penning his great mes-
sages." Edilson has to take off his
collar before he can invent anything.
Has not Mr. Shaw expressed im-
mense wrath upon ironed linen?

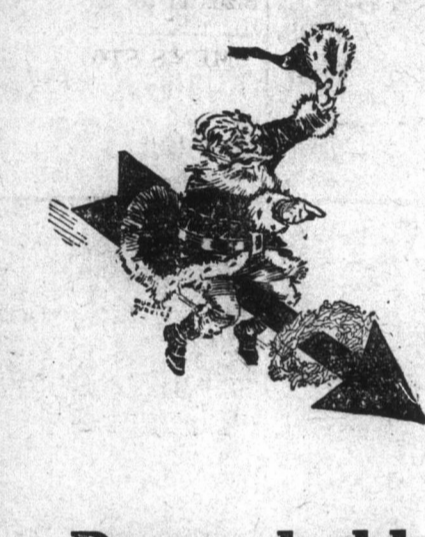

Germans Hastening Retreat.

BELGIAN HATE.
BELGIAN HEADQUARTERS, Nov. 11. (By the A.P.)—"The war is over," was the expression heard everywhere in re-occupied Belgium to-day. The abdication and subsequent flight of the German emperor was received without elation or enthusiasm, but the news of the unconditional acceptance of Marshal Foch's conditions was greeted by the people and the soldiers with relief and satisfaction. The civilian population is more bitter towards the Germans than are the soldiers who fought the enemy to a standstill. Terms of bitter hate and execration are heard among the civilians while the soldiers grin soberly saying the war is over.

WILL BUILD SHIPS.
LONDON, Nov. 12. Bonar Law said that everything available in connection with the manufacture of instrumentalities of war would be turned to the production of merchant ships, so that there would probably be an increased expenditure under this head.

HOLLAND WILL LOOK AFTER PRISONERS.
PARIS, Nov. 12. (Havas)—Holland has consented to carry on the work of repatriation of Allied prisoners of war now held in Germany.

EVACUATING BRUSSELS.
PARIS, Nov. 12. The Germans have begun the evacuation of Brussels, a Dunkirk despatch to the Paris edition of the New York Herald says. The despatch adds that King Albert and his family probably will re-enter Brussels next Friday.

HOLLAND'S PREDICAMENT.
LONDON, Nov. 12. Holland's hesitancy in dealing with William Hohenzollern is ascribed to the extremely indefinite state of public opinion in Holland by the Amsterdam correspondent of the Mail. He says that German revolutionary soldiers along the Dutch front say that they were strictly ordered to prevent the former emperor and his family from escaping into Holland. Late Saturday night and shortly after six o'clock on Sunday morning, he says, the sound of cannon could be heard from German territory. It was reported that a fight had taken place between revolutionists and royalists troops and that both sides had used artillery. According to neutralist reaching the British lines from Brussels several of the officers were killed.

WANTS BUTCHERS ARRESTED.
AMSTERDAM, Nov. 12. The Independent Social Democrats in the new German Government have demanded the arrest of Admiral Von Tirpitz, former Minister of the Navy, Major General Keim, President of the German Army League, Dr. Wolfgang Kapp, President of the Fatherland Party, Admiral Von Holtzendorff, former chief of the navy general staff, and others and the establishment of a tribunal to try all persons primarily responsible for the continuation of the war and hindering peace. This information is contained in a Berlin despatch to the Telegraph.

PEKIN JOINS IN REJOICING.
PEKIN, Nov. 12. (By the A. P.)—The news of the signing of the armistice was enthusiastically received in Peking. Allied troops paraded through the legation quarters. Flags of the Allies were seen everywhere. Bells were rung and celebrations were held in the various churches. The attitude of the former German Emperor at Tientsin, known locally as Tin Willie, was pulled down yesterday evening. Three holidays have been proclaimed in Peking.

THE FOOD SITUATION.
OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 13. Food has almost literally won the war. It is growing plainer and plainer that that is the final factor which brought about the submission in turn of Bulgaria, Turkey, Austria-Hungary and Germany, says the Chairman of the Canada Food Board. Four statements from the best sources in to-day's news bring the facts out in sudden brightness. The German Foreign Secretary Solf pleads that peace negotiations should start at once, and informs the Secretary of State of the United States that here is a pressing danger of famine among the people. An Associated Press message from New York says starvation faces the worn-out empire. Germany to-day is begging not only for peace, but for bread. Mr. Andrew Bonar Law, Chancellor of the Exchequer, asking the House of Commons for a vote of credit of \$3,500,000,000, says it might be necessary for the Allies to make an effort to bring food supplies to Europe, in which case the expenditure will be great and it will be vital that the close international unity which the war has produced shall prevail while the ravages of war are being repaired.
