### A Hero of the Sea.

The brain work and courage of one man alone saved the "Camperdown" from sharing the doom of the "Victoria" when that great battleship met her fate on June 22, 1893, through the "Victoria," and sinking her with a loss of three hundred lives. The terrible force of the collision ripped an Camperdown," through which came rushing hundreds of tons of sea water. Stoker Paffett was the one man below who kept his head and realised what was happening. He ran forward, and flying like a lamplighter down the long steel ladders, reached the platform decks to find the water high above his waist. Undismayed, he struggled forward through the rapidly rising tide, reached the watertight compartment, and, after a violent struggle, closed it. By the time he had accomplished this task, the water was up to his chin, and he was forced to swim back to the ladder, but the "Camperdown" was thus saved from the fate of the "Victoria."

Captain Kean Writes Lengthily.

Editor Evening Telegram

Dear Sir,—When I last wrote on our local owned Foreign going tonnage I said I only touched the border of a lot of questions which could be raised on that point. Since then several of these questions have been raised and some of them discused in the Assembly. I hope some abler pen than mine would show up all that could be said on this subject, both pro and con particularly as I am an interested party and therefore may be regarded as considerly biased on this matter. However, in my opinion no obstacle has been placed in the way of using our local tonnage in the foreign service that cannot be coped with and overcome if only the Exporters were willing to come half way and meet us, and in saying this I do not mean that they should come half way to meet us in any measure against their

that they should come half way to meet us in any measure against their own interest.

I shall now deal with some of the obstacles which have been placed in the way of our vessels. The first is our vessels are too large. My reply to that is, it is fortunate they did not put it the other way because if they had it would have been impossible for us to have met their demand, as it would be impossible to take a six thousand quintal cargo in a vessel thousand quintal cargo in a vessel that could only carry four thousand: but the reverse is easy. Then again is may not generally be known that vessel that can carry six thousand quintals of fish does not require a greater number of men than the vessel that can only carry three thou-sand. They both take the same number of men and they require the same amount of provisions, and in coming this way th larger evesel will take the larger quantity of salt, so what they lose on the small quantity of fish they partly make up on the salt. It is also a mistake to imagine that because a vessel has three masts she must nec-essarily be large. For instance the Cyril T. has three masts but is almost the smallest ship in the fleet. That the three mast vessel is so much better adapted for the Foreign voyage than the two masted schooner is so easily understood by the practical man that I do not need to trespass on your

space to explain it here.
So many of our vessels have been lost that insurance rates have gone up. Perfectly true. The history of our local built vessels during the years of the war was anything but creditable to us. And the fact remains that all hrough the war, and I think even now the Government is paying a bounty for building vessels, some of them which foundered on their first voyage. Three never reached their first destination: two others reached their first destination but were abandoned in mid ocean towards their next port, and in my opinion the vessels which we have to-day may be greatly considered a survival of the fittest. Upon this subject one could write a book, but I must dispense with this part of the subject now by saying that our experience with ships built in this country during the war was similar to the United States Snipping Board. Apart from saying that, we ought to have a report from the surveyors of our local built vessels and if it can be proved that our wood is not suitable for building purposes then we ought to stop the bounty for building, for how so many of our seamen were rescued in mid ocean without more loss of life is nothing short of a miracle.

of a miracle. Some advance the reason why so many of our vessels are abandoned is for the want of capable men in charge. Personally I make no such charge. But I make bold to say right here that every owner ought to do all in his power to get certificated men in charge, and I believe there are good men in charge without certificates and the reason they have not certificates may be their misfortune, but not their faults, but the days of quacks are past. No man should be satisfied to take a position to-day which he is not qualified to fill. Those who have certi-ficates ought not to be left on shore while those who have no certificates are in command. Then with proper qualified men in charge and with good substantial vessels, we ought to prove to the world that we are not indebted to any other country on the face of the globe to command a marine fleet to

take our local produce to market.

I dealt with figures in my last let ter, which I think was augmentative and convincing. I shall now deal with the class of men who own our local fleet. They number far too many to mention here, but can be found on the whole coast line from Burgeo in the West, to the Moores in St. Anthony, who by sheer dint of perseverance have become men of eminence. Some of them are to-day doing a large mercantile business of their own. All of them are men who have contributed to the upkeep of the business people in this community. The unfortunate position we find ourselves in to-day cannot be attributed to the owners of our local foreign fleet, and for our ex-porters to engage foreigners to carry our exports to market while so many of our men are in need of employ-ment, is not only detrimental to the interest of the trade, but to my mind criminal to the interest of our sailor and their families.

We publish to the world, that while our merchants are so handicapped that they cannot give the necessary supplies for the carrying on of our local fisheries without Government aid and assistance, they are engaging foreign vessels with foreign crews to take away our produce thereby send. take away our produce, thereby sending hundreds of thousands of dollars to help built up other countries, while our own children are begging for






