Riches Found by Rabbits

One of the greatest treasures for the finding of which we are indebted to a rabbit is undoubtedly that known as the Stoke Prior Treasure, now in the Victoria and Albert Museum at Kensington. This find was made near Leominster, and was due to a rabbit unearthing a magnificent silver cup. Further investigation revealed a. small, circular salt-cellar, and two bell salts and covers, all of silver, belonging to the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries.

A silver Roman coin, the only one of its kind known, was picked up by a farmer on a mound of excavated earth at the mouth of a rabbit hole in the West of England. Passing into the hands of a dealer, it eventually found its way to the British Museum.

In 1894, some French boys playing in the forest of Fontainebleau discovered a great quantity of gold coins scattered over the earth which had been thrown out by a rabbit in digging its burrow. Scraping through the loose mould, they found, in addition to a further quantity of coins, several gold brooches, three gold and jewelled bangles, a necklace of filigree gold and enamel, and two jewelled hair ornaments

REVOLUTION RELICS.

The discovery was reported to the police, but all inquiries failed to reveal the rightful owner. Nor was it ever discovered how the valuable objects came to be found in such a position. They may have been stolen and hidden-though a theory at the time was that they were probably buried during the French Revolution, as the date of the coins and the design of the iewels were of that period.

Two rollars of gold were found, together with a broken bracelet of the same metal, lying loose in a rabbit's hole in Cornwall. The farm worker who found them also picked up a quantity of burnt bones, from which it was surmised that the rabbit had penetrated an ancient grave, probably one belonging to the Bronze age.

Quite a romance is attached to the digging activities of rabbits in one of the great warrens in Somerset. The locality has long been famous for its Roman remains, for here, until the mines were exhausted, the ancient Romans did a great deal of lead mining. The lead was smelted on the spot, as the great heaps of slag which they left attest.

But it was not until a rabbit, in digging its burrow, turned out a fragment of unsmelted ore that any particular significance was attached to the slag-heaps. The piece of ore in question came into the hands of a metallurgist, who noticed that, in addition to the lead, it contained about twenty per cent. of silver. When the slag was examined it was found to contain the same high percentage of silver, although the lead had been extracted. A small company was formed and the great slag-heaps were exploited for the silver they contained.

TO ERECT NEW HALL AND

The parishioners of St. Mary's turned out en masse last night to discuss plans in connection with the erection of a new building to house schools supported on the platform by Rev. J. Goodland, assistant priest and Mr. C. F. Pike, people's warden and Mr. A Whitten, rector's warden.

The proceedings centred round the report presented by Hon. Dr. Mosdell on behalf of a special committee which has spent several weeks investigating the project and devising plans for its consummation. Questions of location, materials and method of construction and plans for financing the undertaking were all dealt with and practical recommendations were in each case made to the parishioners. The discussion that followed was long, but interesting and to the point. It bespoke the careful attention, keen interest and practical knowledge of the big and enthusiastic gathering, in which the ladies, as well as the men of the parish were well represented. The report was

received and adopted by the meeting. The plans approved by St. Mary's parishioners provide for the immediate construction of a three-storey building of concrete, to be located on the site of the present hall, which will be removed as soon as the school year ended. Provision is to be made for modern and well-equipped schools in the building and for facilities for the work of the various organizations that are doing so much valuable work for

the Church of St. Mary the Virgin One of the storey's, which will have greater floor space than the British Hall, is to be designed and equipped as a public hall and will have an estimated seating capacity of one thousand people. It will supply a great and long-felt need in the West End of

After discussing building plans in detail and approving of ways and means of financing the project, the meeting of parishioners resolved itself into a Building Committee of the Whole for the realization of the scheme. An executive was formed, consisting of Hon. Dr. Mosdell, chairman; Mr. L. G. Chafe, deputy-chairhan; Mr. Max Colton, recording secretary; Mr. Bert Colton, corresponding Secretary; Mr. D. R. Thistle. Treasurer; Mr. Harvey Skirving, assistant secretary. The Rector, Rev. A. B. S. Stirling, and the two wardens Messrs. G. F. Pike and A. Whitten are also members, ex officio, of the ex-

The building plans disposed of, the neeting took up garden party matters. This event is staged for June 17th, and the parishioners plan to make it the best and most successful on record. All proceeds are to go to the Parish Hall fund and St. Mary's people are confident that their friends throughout the city will, in view of this special need, assist with their patronage even more generally and erally than of former years.

The unannounced appearance of Rev. Henry Uphill on the platform last night shortly after proceedings began, thrilled and delighted St. Mary's folk, who gave him a regular ovation on his entry to the hall. The former rector made a brief speech in which he complimented the parishioners on their keen practical interest in church matters, as displayed by their presence. He congratulated them on their progressive ideas and ideals and created much enthusiasm by his exhortation for hard and united work for very necessary undertakings they had decided to shoulder.

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

Ranger Enquiry

ed by Mr. McNeily-Witness made an examination of the Ranger's boiler; he did not make a thorough examination of the boiler outside of the damaged parts, but as far as he saw it was in fairly good condition. In the case of an old boiler he would think it advisable to have a hydrostatic examination every year. It would be difficult to say if this was absolutely necessary; some engineers would make one every two or three months. If he was test every three months. Witness did no have it in any boiler. If he was an inspector he would have the cement removed every year and a hydro-static test put on it. Tapping is done to produce sound; sound is produced by viration where there is anything solid behind it. As he saw the boiler after the ship came in, there was no danger of explosion, the principal danger would be the helplessness of the ship. Often ships get disabled from various reasons, and have to be repaired. If the witness had been Chief Engineer of the Ranger, when the first trouble occurred, he would have insisted on getting to port, and blowing down as soon as possible. Steam blowing out of a boiler would cause erosion and the effect of this would depend on the condition of the plate. A test is very necessary on an old boiler; if it cannot stand the pressure laid down there is something wrong and the amount of steam should be less than before. Every boiler plate will stand a certain strain, but there is a point which, having been reached, it will not go beyond; this is called the elastic limit. (Here the witness outlines the regular formulae used in the testing of boiler plates). A Market for Fish Products

VICTORIA, B.C., April 30 .- With the demand for fish oll and fish meal and dried fish in the United States and the Orient far exceeding the supply, plans are under way for the construction of five or six new fish meal and fish oil plants at various points





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
