endusn in 1600, and earl of Devonshine in 1618. The second earl WAS AN EXTRAVAGANT PEER, but the fortunes of his house were restored before his heir became of age. The fourth earl was the friend and ally of Sydney and Russell, and at the frial of the latter he dared, notwithstanding the danger he in-curred, to vindicate him in the face of the court. He afterward sent Russell a message offering to change clothes with him and stay in prison so that he might escape. To this Russell would not agree. His next public act was to pull the nose of a courtier who had insulted him in the presence chamber of Janies II. For this he was fined £30,000 - equal to some \$550,000 at present values—and put in the king's bench prison. He escaped, however, to Chaisworth. He offered to pay his fine with bonds for £60,-000 loaned by the Cavendishes to Charles L and II., but King James insisted upon a new bond. William III. cancelled this bond and made the earl a duke. The duke died in 1707, and since then the Caven-dishes have steadily

Lord Frederick Charles Cavendish, who was appointed chief secretary for Ireland on Thursday and assessinated on Saturday, was born at Compton place, the Sussex seat of the Cavendish family, Nov. 30, 1836. In August, 1873, Mr. Gladstone undertook the chancellorship of the exchequer, in ad-dition to his office as first lord of the treas-ury. At the same time Lord Frederick was placed at the head of the list of junior lords of the treasury, and he continued in close personal and official relations with the liberal ministry went out of office. 


