In Ceara, as the chief of police telegraphs, the Emacipation saciety at Fortaleza not only has successfully resisted the shipment to Rio of slaves belonging to Senator Nunes Golzalves, and got a judge to take them from the police and set them at liberty by habeas corpus, but it and the numerous other societies are inciting the slaves of the adjoining provinces to take refuge in Cears, wherein they are promised harbor and defense. Under the pressure of these societies Ceara will in a year or two be a free province, and be a thorn in the side of the adjoining ones. Para also is agitating in the same course, and will soon extinguish slavery, when Maranham, which had 74,000 slaves at the end of 1873 and has now only about 52,000, will be drained of her slaves on all sides until, in self-defence, she joins her neighbors in freedom.

The government bill on slavery has been brought in. It permits no more slaves to be transferred from one province to another, unless when obtained by inheritance, gifts from parents or carried with their owners, in which last case the slaves may not be sold before five years after registering them in the new province. All transferred in any other way to another province become ipse facto free. The bill also strengthens the emancipation fund with a tax of 25 cents on every slave, 25 cents to \$1 on horses and \$1 per bond on transfers of national stocks. With these it is estimated that the emancipation fund will be increased about 3,000,000 milreis a year, say £1,500,000.
