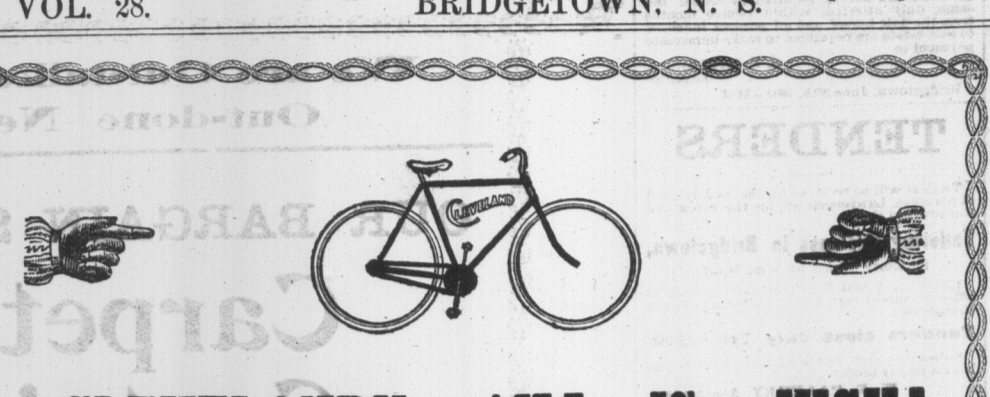

Mr. Flint, M. P., for Yarmouth, introduced a bill in the House of Commons last week asking for legislation to permit the Yarmouth S. S. Co. to sell its property to the D. A. Railway for \$350,000. The bill passed its first and second readings without opposition.

The government forces Annapolis Co. in the preparation of the supplementary estimates—perhaps they considered that the railway for the Grandville and Victoria Road Railway would be a sufficient reason for the delay.

There was a heavy thunder storm at Annapolis last Friday forenoon, which lasted for about twenty minutes. A large barn belonging to the estate of Stephen Davidson was struck by lightning and burned, with a loss of over \$20,000, a quantity of hay and straw, wagons and agricultural implements, etc., \$25,000 estimated.

The Methodist at the Parrsboro Conference, were not sold on the temperance question. By a narrow majority they declined to vote only for moderate temperance candidates at the coming election, but after rather spirited discussion this resolution was declared ultra vires and the assembly adjourned unopposed.

The Y. M. C. A. boys have received a challenge from Martine Square for a game of base ball to be played here on Saturday next. The boys, although not yet practiced to the highest point of efficiency, have accepted, and a good game may be expected. The game will be played on the Y. M. C. A. field at 2 o'clock. The admission will be ten cents.

N. E. Nelly's stallion, Ferro, 2202, in great shape this summer and has proved enough to break up track records on the maritime provinces. He was jogged on the other day of the Bridge Town track with a 2:10, given a half at 2:30 clip, and then ran an eighth in 15 seconds, rest standing in 14 1/2 to satisfy the spectators that his watches were going.

In a letter to the press, Hon. D. McPherson, manager of the Yarmouth Steamship Co., who has been in the Yarmouth office, Boston, says the negotiations between his company and the Dominion Atlantic Railway for the purchase by the latter of his company's steamships and franchises, are all off. The price of \$350,000 was agreed upon, but the terms of payment were not satisfactory. A bill before the Dominion parliament to give effect to the proposed purchase will be withdrawn.

The claims of the Province of Nova Scotia against the Dominion Government for refunding subsidies paid on account of the construction of the Eastern Extension Railway from New Glasgow to the Strait of Cans have been submitted to arbitration. The agreement was arrived at between the local and federal governments, which will appoint a board of arbitration. Mr. F. E. Wade, Q. C., of Halifax, will represent the Government of Nova Scotia. Chief Justice Burton, of Ontario, the Dominion Government, while a third arbitrator will be appointed from Quebec.

The full returns of the apple export for the season 1899-1900 show that 274,199 bushels were shipped from Halifax, St. John and Annapolis to English markets, representing the second largest export in history of the industry. In 1897 the shipment from these three ports was 269,723 bushels. Last season the shipments were from Halifax 288,318 bushels, St. John 72,481, Annapolis 13,400. Many thousands barrels were also exported to the United States, a considerable quantity going forward to London and Liverpool via Boston. The total shipments from the Dominion States and Canadian ports reached 1,283,121 bushels. Montreal shipments last season were 285,229 barrels, or less than those from Halifax, for the first time.

Parade Patriotic Demonstration.

Nothing ever happened in Paradise before—nothing! The word "Demonstration" seemed a pretty big word for unpretentious Paradise, but now it may be spelled with a capital letter and then will not have to blush for itself. We appeal to the two or three thousand people present on Monday to say if this be not so. The village had put on holiday attire, and went in with all its heart to celebrate. There were Union Jacks everywhere, and strings of them crossed the street at regular intervals, signifying no capital letter, but simply showing with their gay color and beautiful emblem "Loyalty! The speakers' platform at the school house had been beautifully draped with bunting, and when the parade was over, the speakers called to attention an audience of 2000 people, gay in holiday attire and soldiers' uniform, but in every way interesting spectators, both by the new flag presented by Mr. and Mrs. Moore and the other speakers.
