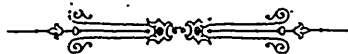

CHRONICLE.

BY R. R. BOGART.

ARGENTINE—We have the 12c. blue, surcharged "¼," in large numerals at bottom.

ANGOLA—The *American Journal of Philately* mentions the 4or., 1887, in red, being an error on the sheet of the 20 reis.

AUSTRIA—The new cards come inscribed "Ruth;" and "Bohm."

BAVARIA—The 50 pf. is violet-brown.

BHOPAL—*Le Timbre Poste* says the ½a., perf., has been retouched and has no errors.

BR. GUIANA—A few more provisionals have made their appearance, owing to a change in the postal rates. They are the same style as the 1889 issue provisionals and are all printed in lilac and black; 1c., 3c., 6c., 10c., 20c., 40c.

BULGARIA—The following stamps of the new design are in use; 1s., lilac; 2s., gray 3s., bistre; 15s., orange; 25s., blue; 30s., brown; 50s., blue-green.

CAUCA—Mr. Hubbard has shown us a new provisional inscribed "Cauca—vale 5 ctvs—Provisional—P de A" in four lines, enclosed by an ornamental frame. Color, red on white.

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC—There is a 20c. envelope on white paper.

ECUADOR—The following stamps have been surcharged "Oficial:"

1881 issue, 1, 2, 5, 10, 20, 50.

1887 issue, 1, 2, 5, 80.

FRANCE—The 10c. post card comes on light buff.

GREAT BRITAIN—There has been issued a new card: 1d., red on buff, with the usual stamp in upper right corner. There is also a new envelope 1d., blue on white with same stamp as on the card. Both of these were issued to commemorate the jubilee of penny postage. At the top of envelope is the picture of a stage coach carrying the mail from Highgate, 1790, at eight miles an hour, and at bot-

tom are the steam cars carrying the mail to Carlisle at forty-eight miles an hour. At left side is the postman of 1840 with rates of 4d., 8d., 1sh. 2d., 2sh. 6d. At right is the postman of 1890 with the uniform rate 1d.

ITALY—We have the 30c. surcharged 20c. There are also cards 10c. on 15 and 10+10 on 15+15.

JAMAICA—It is reported that the 6d. is now bright yellow.

MEXICO—Mr. Mekeel has recently discovered two new locals used in 1876-68. The first is from Guernavaca, and consists of a circular stamp inscribed "Guernavaca" above, and "Correos" at bottom and across the centre is printed "Guernavaca," no value expressed but used as two reals; black on white paper.

The second is from Patzeuaro and is a circular saw inscribed "Franco" at top and "Patzeuaro" at bottom; no value; black on blue paper.

NABHA—The 3a., orange, and 1ru., gray, have been surcharged "Service," in black.

QUEENSLAND—We have the 2 sh., brown, same type as the 1sh.

ROUMANIA—The 5 and 10 bani stamp have been issued on water marked paper.

ST. CHRISTOPHER—It is stated that the 6c. is now slate green.

SEYCHELLES—The *Philatelic Record* notes envelopes of the value of 8, 16 and 25 cents.

SOUTH AUSTRALIA—We have the 4d. lilac with "South Australia" at top, "Four Pence" at bottom, "Postage and Revenue" at the sides and queen's head in center.

TOLIMA—We have the 10c. 1871 on laid paper also a specimen printed on both sides of paper.

UNITED STATES—There are about half-a-dozen shades of the new 2 cent stamp which vary in color from a light pink to a dark carlet. Series 5 of the letter sheets has appeared.

VENEZUELA—We have seen the 25c. yellow, lithographed, rouletted, surcharged "1 ctvo," and same stamp also surcharged "½ real." The 5c. green, lithographed, rouletted, also comes with surcharged "1 ctvo."

VICTORIA—The inscription on the 1d. card has been changed and now reads: "This card may pass through the post without additional postage to any of the following colonies, viz: New South Wales, South Australia, Queensland, Tasmania, Western Australia and New Zealand but an additional one penny must be affixed if addressed to Fiji."

WESTERN AUSTRALIA—We have the 1d. red, same type as the ½d.

C. P. A. CONVENTION NOTES.

Montreal saw a fine display of Canada rarities.

Dr. Cameron enriched his already fine collection by laying out nearly \$150 at the auction.

The Convention rooms were on the corner of McGill College Avenue and St. Catherine streets.

A. E. Labelle had charge of the entertainment on Wednesday evening and made an excellent host. He is major of the 65th.

Among the visitors at the Convention were Mr. Gibbs, of the London (England) Philatelic Society, and Mr. Smith, of the Montreal Society.

The boys took in the sights of the city, including Solmer Park, National Art Gallery and Museum, Mount Royal, Running Lachine Rapids, etc.

Mr. Gibb, of the London Society, attended the auction sale and bought a few lots; he has one of the finest collections in London and values it at £20,000.

Mr. J. H. Chapman, has a fine collection of Br. North America and Br. Colonies. His Shillings Nova Scotia and New Brunswick are especially worthy of mention.

Mr. Chas Beamish, Jr., was the only representative from the U. S. present. The Yankees as a whole are pretty good fellows and Mr. Beamish was no exception.

Mr. Hooper has good reason to feel proud at his success as Librarian; he began the year with almost nothing and has now over 2,000 pieces in the Library.

Mr. Hooper's collection, numbering 22,500 pieces, will be sold by auction this coming winter in New York. It comprises the three B. N. A. Shillings, Original Connel, unequalled Newfoundland Provisionals and Splits, besides an Avalanche of N. B. and N. S. rarities.

From the reports of members present the coming year promises to be one of prosperity, one member saying he had six applications for membership for next month.

Mr. J. S. Robertson, of St. Thomas, was called the "Kicker" of the Convention. Haply Mr. Robertson's "Kicks" were all in the right direction and were endorsed by the Convention.

Mr. H. L. Hart, of Halifax, exhibited his superb collection of N. S., N. B., P. E. I. and Newfoundland provincial stamps, and a list of them will be found in another part of this Journal.

The only visitor present at our meeting was Mr. Smith, of the Montreal Society. He was so favourably impressed with the C. P. A. that he at once sent in an application for membership and was duly initiated—at the banquet.

A complaint from A. Lohmeyer was read by J. R. Hooper, also the following resolution which it was decided to consider later on :

"Whereas, Mr. Pearson Hill has conclusively shown that the adhesive stamp was originally proposed by Rowland Hill, and

"Whereas, all claims to the contrary have failed to be substantiated, therefor

"Be it resolved that the Canadian Philatelic Association recognizes Rowland Hill as the inventor of the adhesive postage stamp, and

"Be it further resolved, that a copy of these resolutions be engrossed and forwarded to Mr. Pearson Hill, together with the thanks of this Association for his endeavors to clear up this important subject."

Under the head of Reports of offices the following report of the Exchange Superintendent, Mr. F. J. Grenny, was read by H. F. Ketcheson and passed over to the Secretary to be taken up by the proper Committee.

EXCHANGE SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

I take pleasure in offering for your consideration my Third Annual Report. The amount of business done by the Exchange Department has been good, but not quite so satisfactory as it should have been, because of one serious drawback, the delay caused by some members who have balances against them and seem to have no idea of paying them. This makes it impossible to pay all creditors promptly and works an injury to the Dept. in that some with balance owing to them have withdrawn their support while others have threatened to do so unless payments were made more promptly. Every time some member delays in remitting, some other member has to wait a corresponding length of time. Perhaps the system recommended by Mr. Henry Clotz of making immediate payment for stamps removed might be a good thing. But then it would be no longer an exchange Dept. and not near so many stamps would be disposed of, as some would not be in a position to pay immediate cash. I am now using new covers with extended circuits and will place in a cover only one member's sheets. I shall send out more books at one time and not so frequently I think this would save the members some postage. Finally

I would request the convention to raise the percentage allowed me to 10 per cent., the same as paid Ex-Supt. of A. P. A. Here is a statement of receipts and expenditures.

During the 10 months from 1 Sept. 1889 to 1 July, 1890, 88 books value \$5366 were put in circulation and 80 have been returned from which stamps to value of \$1121 were removed. More stamps would be taken if some members did not persist in putting on such high prices in some instances above catalogue. Stamps should be marked at least 30 per cent. below standard catalogue prices.

The President then requested Mr. R. A. B. Hart to take the chair while he read his report as Treasurer, which showed that there was a balance of \$9.66 on hand. The Secretary's report was then read.

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

My report for the year ending June 30, 1890, shows a total membership of 130.

This is 11 less than for the same time last year, but while this looks like a loss it is really a gain. When I reported at last years convention 141 paying members, there was included in it a number who were a dead weight to the Association. They took no interest in it, never paid their dues, in fact did nothing but honor us with their names.

Since then I am happy to say those members have all been dropped and the 130 members we now have are all good men. For all that, our showing for the year is not a very good one. During this time we have added 37 new members, 12 have resigned and 37 have been expelled for non payment of dues.

Now in the coming year we should certainly make an effort to increase our membership and I hope some plan for doing so will be devised at the convention.

The receipts during the 11 months past ending last report amounted to \$156.50 and the cash paid out and to Treasurer to \$132.75. A detailed statement and memoranda in connection is annexed. All of which is respectfully submitted.

I have acknowledged all contributions each month and the library is now assuming a formidable aspect.

Among the more useful works now in the Library are, Scott's Catalogues, the P.O. of 50 years ago, complete vols. of *American Philatelist*, *Halifax Philatelist*, *The Post Card*, and foreign Philatelists, and a number of other journals, Part I of Mr. Watson's Post Card Catalogue, Maury's Catalogue, Scott's 94th sale priced. R. C. H. Brock's monograph on "Sidney Views," Scott's Catalogue for advanced collectors, Div. I; besides a variety of minor books and catalogues.

The photos now in the C. P. A. Library are of the following gentlemen: Messrs. H. E. Deats, W. D. Spry, A. Davison, H. L. Hart, N. E. Carter, A. Lohmeyer, H. Wechler, H

F. Ketcheson, C. C. Moreney, F. J. Stanton, Alf. Lane and the late Geo. Walker.

The publishers of the *American Philatelist*, *American Journal Philately*, *Central Philatelist*, *Western Philatelist*, *N. Y. Philatelist*, *Curio* and *Eastern Philatelist* are the only papers sent with any degree of regularity to the library, others are received semi-occasionally, in consequence there is always a broken gap in their files. The lack of priced catalogues is felt, as I have had nearly a dozen applications for copies of such.

In consequence of the difficulty of giving a correct list monthly of the state of the library files, and also to benefit as large a number as possible, I would suggest the advisability of placing the library in some of the cities which have a good C. P. A. membership, and thus benefit as great a number as possible.

The library has been self-sustaining so far, with a small contribution received, and I would not recommend that any volumes be bound at present by the Association. There are, of course, a large lot of duplicates on hand and these I have held for exchange. The increasing interest now manifest will no doubt make our library a large and valuable one, and I trust our members who have not yet contributed will do so during the next few months.

The contributions of Mr. Watson (579 pcs.) and of Mr. Wurtele (205 pcs.) have been especially valuable, and in fact nearly all the pieces received from other members have been of the better class and in a good order. The A. P. A. Literary Committee kindly gave me some copies of the *American Philatelist* in order to complete a file of that journal. Annexed hereto is the financial statement.

In conclusion I beg to offer my thanks to those who have assisted me in giving the library a helping hand, and I trust that by next year we shall have a showing of at least 5,000 pieces.

Wednesday August 13—Meeting called to order at 10.30 a. m., Dr. Cameron in the chair.

The Report of Committee on Finance was then read.

To the Officers and Members of the Canadian Philatelic Association :

Your Committee of Finance, appointed yesterday, beg leave to report as follows :

That they have audited the accounts of the Treasurer and find the same correct.

That from the report of the Secretary it appears that he has been collecting money for dues, etc., of the Association, which by the constitution of the Association (article V secs. 3 and 4) should be done by the Treasurer. This not only gives the the Secretary more work, but is a direct violation of the constitution, which should not be permitted in any case.

We find that there is \$9.66 in the hands of the Treasurer.

We find that there is \$52.91 in the hands of the Secretary, but as he has sent no vouchers, etc., for his payments, and no list of members who have paid their dues, we are not able to vouch for or audit the same.

We also find that the total funds or cash on hand of the Association is \$62.57, and would recommend that the Secretary be instructed to remit at once the amount in his hands (\$52.91) to the Treasurer, and that hereafter he do not receive or collect any money, but that the constitution be strictly adhered to and the Treasurer handle all the funds.

The Convention then proceeded to discuss the report and same was amended to read as follows:

To the Officers and Members of the C.P.A.

Your Committee beg to report the following:

1.—The Exchange Superintendent is to only send sheets to those members who send in stamps to exchange, make a cash deposit or give first-class references.

2.—That a quarterly account be rendered by the Exchange Superintendent, and all indebted are to remit at once, in default thereof the Superintendent has power to dispose of the stamps or retain the deposit until such debt is cleared. Fifteen days will be allowed members to settle.

3.—Members having more to their credit than the amount of stamps taken not to be called for payments.

4.—That the value of all sheets be not less than three dollars.

5.—Your Committee suggest that affiliation be secured with the Dresden Society for exchange.

6.—That Exchange Superintendent have option to receive 10 per cent. on sales without choice of stamps, or retain present commission of 7½ per cent. with choice of stamps.

7.—That a list of all members with the amount sent in to the Exchange Superintendent be published monthly in the official organ.

Moved by H. F. Ketcheson, and seconded by J. R. Hooper.—That affiliation with the Dresden Society be entered into for the purpose of exchange—Carried.

Moved by H. F. Ketcheson.—That we recommend to the Official Board that Mr. J.

E. Schultze be appointed to fill the position of 1st Purchasing Agent, now vacant.—Carried.

A complaint was made that some members had written remarks about stamps on sheets passing through the Exchange Department, and it was recommended that same be discontinued.

Meeting adjourned at 1 p. m. to meet again at 2.30 p. m.

Convention called to order at 3 p. m., Dr. Cameron in the chair.

Moved by J. S. Robertson, seconded by J. H. Chapman,—That the Constitution be amended as follows by adding to article IX section 1 as follows:

By striking out the word "voting" in the second line of section 3 of article IX and inserting the words "present personally or by proxy" in the same line between the words "association" and "to."

By adding the words "when voting is by ballot" in first line of section 1 of article IX between the words "amended" and "only."

Provided that when the amendments to the Constitution or to the by-laws (as provided in sections 2, 3 and 4 hereof) is made in open Convention a majority vote of those present or represented by proxy shall be sufficient to carry the amendments and from such vote and thereafter the said amendments shall be binding unless and until repealed as hereafter provided.

All such amendments shall be published in the official organ issued next after such Convention any five members of the Association may by mailing by registered letter posted on or before the 15th of the month immediately following that in which such amendments appear in the official organ a protest to the President or Secretary and demanding a mail vote of the Association in which case the official Board shall at once take the proper steps to secure such vote and in case not more than ⅓ of the members in good standing vote against such amendment the amendment shall remain in force but in case over ⅓ vote against it the President shall declare the amendments repealed and the by-laws or constitution shall stand as before such amendments the result of such votes and any declarations relating thereto shall at once be declared in the official organ.

Moved by J. S. Robertson and seconded by J. H. Chapman,—That the Constitution of this society be amended by adding to sec. 1 article IV. the words “and an international Secretary and Foreign Exchange Superintendent”; by adding to sec. 2 of same article in the first line between the words “Vice-President” and “Secretary” the words “International Secretary and Foreign Exchange Superintendent”; by adding to article V the following:—“International Secretary and Foreign Exchange Superintendent. This officer shall carry on all the correspondence of the Association with foreign countries and purchase for members who shall desire and furnish funds any foreign publication, and carry on the the Exchange circuits and business with foreign societies (except the A.P.A.) subject to such rules as he may frame from time to time. That at the time of voting for such constitutional amendments the names of such members who shall be nominated unless after provided and published in the official organ shall be submitted to a vote. The member receiving the highest number of votes to be declared elected such.

That the proposed amendments be published in the next issue of the official organ and that any person wishing to nominate any person to fill the office thereby to be created do forward his nomination to the secretary in time to appear in the official organ for the next issue after publication of said proposed amendments and that such amendments and the election in case of more than one nomination, be voted on at the same time. The person receiving the greatest number of votes in case more than one is nominated or the only one nominated, as the case may be, to be declared elected if such amendments carry.”

Moved by J. S. Robertson, seconded by J. R. Hooper,—That in the opinion of this Convention affiliation for the purpose of exchange only with foreign philatelic societies (not including the A.P.A.) would be to the interests of this Association, and Mr. Schultz is hereby appointed to correspond with the Dresden society and any other society he may think proper and see if exchange cannot be secured with the Dresden society and such other socie-

ties for this Association and publish a report of his correspondence in the official organ.

Resolution *re.* Hill-Chalmers question, read at previous session, again read.

Moved by J. R. Hooper, and seconded by C. Beamish, Jr.,—That same be laid on the table—Carried.

Moved by J. R. Hooper, and seconded by J. S. Robertson,—“That this Convention having had the question of Chalmers claims to the invention of the adhesive postage stamp before it for the past two years, does not believe that any evidence has been brought forward which warrants an expression of opinion from the C. P. A. as to the origin of the adhesive post stamp,—believing that the remarks of the London Society are quite sufficient to settle all further doubt upon the matter”—carried un-
animously.

The Convention then proceeded to decide on next place of meeting.

The following places were nominated: Belleville, Halifax, Toronto, and Niagara Falls.

A vote was then taken and the result was as follows: Belleville 32, Halifax 1, Toronto 2, Niagara Falls 1.

Moved by H. L. Hart, and seconded by J. R. Hooper,—That the next Convention be held at Belleville, Ont., Tuesday, the 4th week in August, 1891—Carried.

Moved by J. R. Hooper, and seconded by J. S. Robertson,—That a vote of thanks be tendered Dr. Cameron for the able and impartial manner in which he filled the chair and conducted the business of the Convention.—Carried.

Moved by J. H. Chapman, and seconded by H. F. Ketcheson,—That a vote of thanks be tendered H. L. Hart for the efficient services rendered the convention as Secretary.—Carried.

Moved by J. R. Hooper, and seconded by J. S. Robertson,—That a vote of thanks be tendered Chas. Beamish, Jr., our visiting member from the U. S., for his presence with us, and also for the efficient services rendered to this convention.—Carried.

Moved by H. F. Ketcheson, and seconded by J. H. Chapman,—That this convention does hereby disapprove of and censure the conduct of certain officers of this Association,

who have not attended this convention, and have not given any excuse for being absent.—Carried.

Mr. J. H. Chapman then read an invitation from the Montreal Philatelic Association inviting the C. P. A. members to a social gathering to be held in the 65th Battalion quarters. Also that Ketcheson's auction sale would be held at the same place.

Moved by J. S. Robertson, and seconded by H. L. Hart,—That this convention adjourn to meet in Belleville, Ont., on Tuesday, 4th week in August, 1891.—Carried.

They are all on the original envelopes and make a valuable and interesting collection. They were all tastily arranged on cards, each a different design. The U. S. were arranged in the form of a seal with a spear pointing towards it on the end of which was the "Union Jack."

After the sale all again repaired to the refreshment room when the health of Dr. Cameron was drunk, followed by three cheers, such as only Canadians can give, and "For he's a jolly good fellow." The doctor made a suitable reply, thanking the members present for the hearty manner they had drunk his health and ending by proposing the toast, "the C. P. A." Several other toasts were proposed and suitably responded to and the gathering broke up about midnight, all being satisfied that the Montreal boys are a fine lot of fellows and hoping to have the pleasure of meeting them again soon.

THE A. P. A. CONVENTION.

The A. P. A. Convention opened in the rooms of the Lincoln Club Aug. 4th, at 10. a. m. A large number of members were in attendance from all parts of the United States and Canada. The Convention lasted four days and although a lot of time was consumed and a good deal of talking done but not much real business. 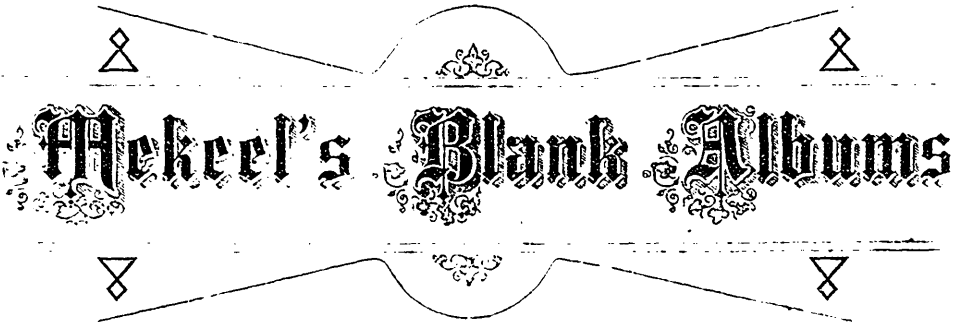
