The Board is sorry to have to report that the effort to establish a church in Winnipeg did not prove successful. We understand that some effort was made by brethren in Manitoba to find another man to take up the work in that city, but they were not successful. It would appear that sufficient provision work in a place like Winnipeg, as our Board was assured was the case before our pledge was made. It is a great pity that the Disciples of Christ are not well represented in the chief city of Manitoba, and it is much to be desired that a well managed attempt should crelong be made to found a church there.

Welland.

The fruits of last year's protracted meeting, held during the month of May, by Bros. P. A. McAtthur and D. Munro, have been garnered during this year, four having been received into local fellowship and one into the Franklin Ave. Church, Bussalo, N. Y. Four members have received letters of transfer and one name has been removed from the roll. Several others are now non-resident, but, as they have not applied for letters, are retained on the roll, which contains forty names. Regular meetings have been held every Lord's day morning and evening. The Sunday-school has maintained its position, and the Y. P. S. C. E. has been re organized with great benefit to the weekly prayer-meeting. The weekly collections are larger than for some time past, and in addition to the payment of current interest on mortgage we have been able to pay that for 1888 and 1890, thus leaving only the principal to be met. We are hoping, by making a special effort, to secure the sum of \$300, and then to re-mortgage for \$700. Thankful-for past aid, we ask for increased aid in both prayers and gifts, that we may speedily attain a more healthy state, both spiritual and G. W. JACKSON. financial.

Owen Sound.

The history of our work since last Annual Meeting is marked by no great, advancement in the number of our membership; indeed, it has not met our expectations. There has been no cessation of effort, but a larger effort has been made, we think, than last year; yet our additions, by obedience to the Gospel, have been smaller, and fewer have come to us from other places; even our student members are for some reason not so numerous as they have been. We have also suffered to some extent from removals. Yet we are thankful to say that in spite of these, things we are not losing ground. Our Sunday services are generally well attended; our Sunday school is in excellent condition; our prayer-meetings well attended and specially profitable, while our influence for good as a people in our town is steadily increasing.

Two short series of special services were held during the year; one in the summer by Bro. A. P. Cobb, which proved somewhat disappointing, and one in the fall by Bro. Lediard, assisted by Bro. Ballah, of Erin, adding several new members to our congregation.

Our financial matters have received the careful attention of Bro. C. A. Fleming and Bro. J. Tolton, which is a guarantee of them being conducted on the best and most economical principles, and the total amount raised for all purposes nearly \$800.00, shows that Owen Sound is doing its very best in this matter. not making haste to endorse the Endeavor movement, the answer would probably be, that when men of wisdom and experience among our own brethren, and also among other religious bodies, hesitate and withhold unqualified approval while the movement is yet in an experimental stage, it cannot be a very serious offence to make haste slowly. The Board is glad to believe that many, if not all, of the young Disciples understand that the members of the Board, and the older friends of the Co-operation generally, have no wish to suppress the young people, nor to repress their enthusiasm. but on the other hand ardently desire that their efforts and enthusiasm may be guided and blessed for their own and the general good.

And in this connection it may be pertinent to remark that nothing but evil could possibly come from setting the young people against the old, or the old people against the young. The old people need the young to stir them up, and the young people need the old to keep them from going too fast. Where both consider one another to provoke unto love and good works, and are mutually forbearing when there is a divergence of view as to what is best to be done, the peace of all and the good of the cause will be most largely furthered.

This much may be safely and to the will of the Lord are hindering properly said here, that the Disciples His cause and dividing His people. of Christ in Ontario have since 1886, largely increased their facilities for presenting their plea for a pure Gospel and a united Christendom to the people of this country. The number of men giving their whole time to the ministry of the Word is probably four times what it was then. Our brethren have now meeting houses in cities and towns where they had none in 1886. In other places new houses have been built, or old ones improved. The number of Sunday schools has largely increased. The O. C. W. B. M. has become a prominent and potent factor among us, and we believe that we are well within the mark when we say that the Disciples in Ontario, in proportion to their numbers and ability, give more to Foreign Missions than their brethren in any other part of America. In making these statements and references in this report it is not intended to suggest that this Co-operation claims the credit for all the good that our brethren do, but it is felt that at this representative gathering we can take note of, and rejoice at, all the good all our brethren and sisters are doing.

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With regard to the special work of this Co-operation, 1893 presents a greatly different aspect to 1886; then the Co-operation was supporting scarcely any missions, now we are assisting Toronto (Cecil St.), Hamilton, London, Collingwood, Owen Sound, Welland Toronto Junction. True, none of these churches are as yet self-supporting, but they all want to be, and hope soon to be, by the blessing of God. And in brief it may be said that whether we consider the number of missions or the amount of money contributed to Home Missions, we find nothing discreditable to our people, as things go in this imperfect world.

Mention should be made too of the Educational enterprise of the Co operation, small though it may be at the present. If it be wisely managed and receive the hearty and substantial support of our people, it will in due time speak for itself in a force of well eduated preachers of the Gospel. Let the foregoing suffice under this head, which naturally leads to the next, which we style,

"HOLD THE FORT."

Those persons who judge a people by their present numbers, rather than by their fundamental principles, may wonder why a body numerically so small should seek to maintain its position and extend its influence in this country. There may be members in some of our churches who see little, if any, reason why we should prefer to remain as we are rather than allow ourselves to be absorbed by the large decominations. Such individuals do not nderstand the considerations which inderlie our movement; nor do they pprehend the grand characteristic of true church of Christ, which is a body hose only Lord is Jesus Christ, who one has the right to say who may and no may not enter His church. In answer to Bro. D. M. K. on the import of this scripture, I would remark, first, that it does not, as is supposed by some, refer to a spiritual resurrection as in Eph. ii. 5, for that is the result of faith, and Paul had attained to that already. It was a change of the past.

In the second place, it could not refer to the general resurrection when

There is a distinction made between the resurrection of the just and the unjust in various ways by the Saviour and the Apostles: one is the resurrection of life, and the other as the resurrection of damnation. Again, that of the righteous is called the "first resurrection:" and the Saviour says in his answer to the Sadducees, "They that are accounted worthy to obtain that world, and the resurrection from the dead, neither marry nor are given in marriage; neither can they die any more: for they are equal unto the angels; and are the children of God, being the children of the resurrec-

Hence, we conclude that it was the resurrection of those who are raised with a body like unto Christ, refashioned and made glorious and incorruptible, that he so carnestly wished to attain unto, and for which he was willing to sacrifice all earthly honors and comforts, and for which we would do well to take the same care and exercise —the same self denial—that we may by the use of every means, also attain to this resurrection from the dead.


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
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
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
