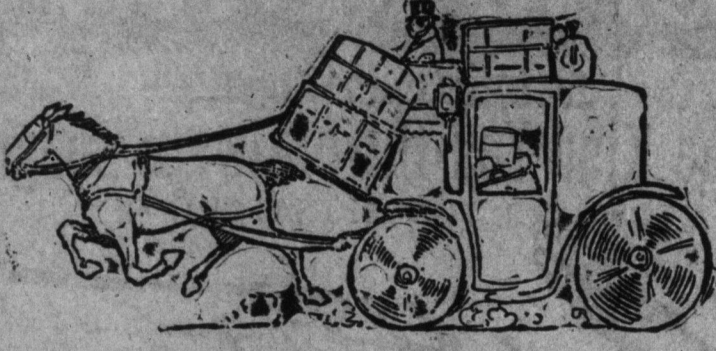

DEPOSITORS GET DIVIDEND.

Wrecked Stensland Bank Pays Out \$150,000.

Chicago, Aug. 26.—More than \$150,000 was paid to depositors in the Stensland Bank yesterday on the 20 per cent. dividend, first disbursements of which were made Friday. FUNERAL OF DR. LANGTRY SERVICE HELD AT CHURCH

Impressive Rites Attended Obsequies of the Distinguished Churchman on Saturday.

Impressive funeral services were held on Saturday afternoon in St. Luke's Church for the late rector, Ven. Archdeacon Langtry. Their conduct was in charge of Bishop Sweatman, assisted by Archdeacon Sweeney, Provost Macklem and Rev. Prof. C. A. Brodie Brockwell of Nova Scotia. At 2:30 o'clock, the hour set for the services to begin, the church was filled with mourning members of the congregation. There attended also a number of clergymen from within and outside the city, including Rev. Scott Howard (Newcastle), Prof. Clark, Rev. T. D. Wallace (Oakville), Rev. Thomas Patterson (Deer Park), Canon Macnab, Rev. T. G. Morley (Bradford), Rev. J. Fuller (Grace Church), Rev. P. Nevitt (St. Catharines), Rev. A. J. Broughall, Rev. J. S. Broughall, Rev. W. Broughall, Rev. C. Heathcote (Windsor), Rev. C. A. Seager (St. Cyrilian), Rev. W. H. Clark (St. Barnabas), and Rev. Mr. Roberts (St. Jude's).

The remains, which had been lying in state since Friday evening, reclined in a plain casket, covered with a violet, laid upon a bed of white silk, in the chancel of the church, which was draped with sable and purple vestments of mourning. The floral offerings, which were many and beautiful, adorned the chancel rail and formed a background to the altar. Among the tributes was a large cross from the congregation, a St. Andrew's Brotherhood cross from St. Luke's Chapter, cross from the council of Bishop Strachan School and wreath from the pupils, wreath from the A. O. U. W., and a cross from St. Luke's branch of the Guild of St. John the Evangelist.

The services, which were full of solemnity, opened with the professional hymn, "For the Saints." Bishop Sweatman followed with committal prayers, and Archdeacon Sweeney with the opening sentences of the ritual. Provost Macklem read the following chapter from 15th Corinthians in the midst of a tense silence, and with the pronouncement of Bishop Sweatman of the concluding prayer, a solemn, white-robed procession moved down the aisle, while the organ glided softly into the "Doral March."

The committal services at St. James' Cemetery were conducted by Bishop Sweatman, president of a large gathering of members of the congregation and warm personal friends of the deceased. The pall-bearers were: Rev. Canon Cody, Rev. Dr. Pearson, Rev. W. E. Cooper and Mr. Clarkson. In St. Luke's Church last night the Rev. Mr. Ingles, discoursing on the life of the late Archdeacon Langtry, said: "No man has contended more earnestly for what he considered to be right and in the best interests of the church than the late Archdeacon. When the federation of Trinity and Toronto University was a vexed question in the history of the church the dead Archdeacon Langtry was uncompromising opponent of the plan. Time declared the preacher, had vindicated the wisdom of his opposition. It might at some future time be the minds of the congregation to erect a memorial to the late rector. His faith in his life's work, and the memory of him were his greatest memorial. The duty of St. Luke's was to follow the mantle where their late beloved rector laid down, and go on to more glorious results."

The building now in course of construction, the foundation and basement having been laid, is designed to receive foundling children almost from the time of birth to the age of four years. It is expected that it will be completed in four months at a cost of about \$40,000. Situated in the rear of the parent institution, it will be 114 feet in length by 20 feet wide, will be three stories in height, in addition to the basement, and will be constructed of white brick, faced with stone.

The procession, headed by the surpliced choir-boys of St. Paul's Church and the vicar-general, proceeded to the vicar-general's study, where the vicar-general, supported by Rev. Fathers Hand, Roubler, McCabe, Doherty, Minahan, O'Donnell and LaMarche. Among the invited guests in attendance were A. C. Macdonell, M.P., Controller of the Excise, and Mr. H. Harrison, A.D. Vaughan and D. N. DeFoe.

Following the rendering of the psalm "I will create spirits," came the ceremony of blessing the building, the vicar-general, after having proceeded to sprinkle the walls at intervals with holy water contained in a cruir.

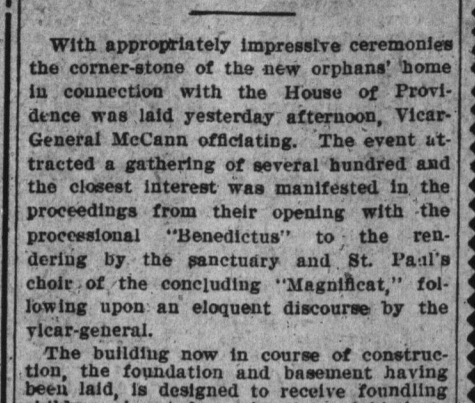
After the rendering of appropriate psalms the formal ceremony of laying the corner-stone was performed by the vicar-general, a silver trowel being used. He then entered upon an eloquent address in which he extolled the virtue of charity. Faith and charity were, he said, the two pillars of the inviolable world; hope was also a divine virtue, giving strength and firmness of purpose to him who possessed it, but charity was a still greater endowment. The church impressed on the people the necessity for aims, deeds and works of charity, and in the House of Providence and kindred institutions would be found the most precious treasures of the church in Toronto.

Opened in 1830 to the needy and poor, its resources had increased so that the Sunnyside institution for children was later founded. Now there was found the need of a home for infants. It would declare how sacred human life was before God.

The church should declare that unborn infants had rights and that to deprive them of these rights was a great crime against God and man, said the vicar-general. The undertaking, he added, would proclaim the great Catholic charity of the church and a monument to the great charitable heart of the people of Toronto.
