GERMANY SHOWS FIGHT READY FOR TARIFF WAR

By Vote of 192 to 71 the Reichstag Authorizes the Government to Retaliate on Any Country Discriminating Against German Goods.

Berlin, Nov. 13.—The Reichstag today adopted by 192 to 71 votes the paragraph of the new tariff bill authorizing the government to retaliate on any country discriminating against German goods. The agrarians openly affirmed that it was necessary to arm the government with weapons for retaliation, especially against the United States' customs practices. Dr. Brumer, National Liberal, related an instance in which he said \$200,000 worth of enameled goods were ordered in Germany for New York, but the speaker asserted the customs officials "changed the classification of the goods being ordered, the books showed that shipments had been made to India at still lower prices. Dr. Brumer further asserted that the customs officials' treatment was dictated by the interests of the home manufacturers. He continued: "It is stated that we must not offend the United States, but they will respect us more, and we shall gain more, by showing our teeth than by always giving pleasant words."

Herr Goebel, Radical Liberal, replied that such words were no fitting epithet to the sentiments expressed by Count Posadowsky, the Home Secretary, in the presence of the Foreign Secretary, Baron von Richthofen, at Ambassador White's farewell dinner. "They will make discord," he continued, "among the wishes spoken by the members of commerce with the United States. Why empower the government to do something it does not want to do? Although the present government would not apply the paragraph, some succeeding government might commit such a folly. Retaliation is a weapon of chauvinism and not of patriotism."

Herr Fitchback, Radical, said all that was necessary was to be proposed to a tariff war with the United States. Herr Broemel, Radical, remarked that if Germany adopted retaliation measures against the United States, it would be a serious breach of the existing treaties. The Associated Press is authorized to announce that the ministry has not decided to drop the tariff bill, as published in the London press, but determined to persist until the dissolution of the Reichstag in June.

Three years ago last July Contractor M. Hutchinson got the contracts for the carpenter work on the St. Lawrence market. There were two contracts, one for the lower end of the market, which is now finished, and the other for the north end of the market, which is only just commenced.

Plans for Rhodes Scholars. New York, Nov. 12.—Prof. William P. Thayer of Montreal has just returned from a European trip, where he studied the different school systems. He is connected with the school system of Ontario, and he has returned with plans for the Rhodes scholars, in addition, every year. This would give the smaller colleges from six, increasing up to fifteen for the larger ones, which take the three-year scholarships. Oxford has twenty colleges, and there are from eighty to two hundred undergraduates in each college.

Mayor is Home Again. Mayor Howland returned from Montreal last night, and he said that he would report to the Board of Control to-day what he considered would be satisfactory arrangements for the shipment of the Welsh coal from Montreal to Toronto. His Worship felt very much satisfied with the results of his trip to Ottawa and Montreal.

Arrangements have been made for the transportation of 3700 tons of the Welsh coal from Montreal to Toronto by boat, and the balance will likely come by rail. The boat route is 22-ton. Aid. Dunn returned from Montreal yesterday morning. He left the Mayor negotiating with the railway companies. The Grand Trunk would not promise more than ten cars a day. The P. E. N. would not promise more than five cars a day. In all there are about 5000 tons of the Welsh coal to be shipped this winter.

Dispute Over the Generator. The Board of Control will to-day deal with the dispute between the Canadian General Electric Company and the United Electric Company for the contract for an electric generator and engine for lighting City Hall. The P. E. N. claims that it is entitled to the contract, and that the works on Lansdowne-avenue will furnish employment to 1000 men.
