

LATCHFORD SUBMITS BILL TO EXTEND TENISKAMING

Government Asks Power to Lend Railway Commission Two Million Dollars.

The legislature sat for half an hour yesterday afternoon, and in that time got thru an accumulation of routine business.

The Commissioner of Public Works moved the first reading of the bill to amend the Teniskaming Railway bill.

Mr. Latchford introduced a bill to amend the Public Schools Act. The object of the bill is to give the mayor or reeve of a municipality the casting vote in the case of a tie on the Public School Board.

Mr. Hoyle's bill to amend the Ontario Companies Act provides against the over-capitalization of joint stock companies and the watering of stock.

The Premier introduced a bill to confer orders-in-council regulating arrangements with guarantee companies for the security of public servants and to enable similar arrangements to be made in the case of Division Court officials.

The Attorney-General submitted for its first reading his bill relating to municipal taxation. The main features of the measure were made public when it was discussed by the special committee on assessment a couple of weeks ago.

A bill submitted by the Attorney-General takes the statute labor assessment out of the General Assessment Act.

Mr. Smith (Peel) has a bill which was introduced yesterday, to enable public libraries to charge a fee to non-residents.



ESTIMATES BROUGHT DOWN \$4,657,909 IS ASKED FOR

Premier Ross Presents the Request for Funds to Carry the Province Thru Another Year.

The estimates for the year were brought down by Premier Ross in the legislature yesterday afternoon. They amount to \$4,657,909.70, of which \$4,057,344.78 is for current expenditure, and \$590,564.92 for capital account.

The sum of \$3000 is provided for additional roads and fittings in the Parliament Buildings. The total vote for public works is \$105,000, while last year \$118,177 was the estimated expenditure for this purpose.

BANNERMAN AND CHAMBERLAIN. Said That Joseph Said Game in Africa Was a Bluff.

London, Feb. 5.—In the House today Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman said: That when Mr. Chamberlain interviewed him June 20, 1899, prior to the war, and asked him if the opposition would support the government in sending out 10,000 troops to Cape Colony, he, Sir Henry, expressed surprise, whereupon Mr. Chamberlain said: "You need not be alarmed. There will be no fighting. We know those fellows won't fight. We are playing a game of bluff." Sir Henry said the opposition refused the request. The statement of Chamberlain was greeted with roars of laughter from the opposition benches.

BOTH LAXTONS COMMITTED ON CHARGE OF CONSPIRACY

Expert Declares Same Hand Tampered With Aldermanic and Education Ballots in Their Booth.

Two more officials were committed for trial by Magistrate Denison in the Police Court yesterday morning. In the persons of John E. and W. A. Laxton, D.R.O. and clerk respectively in sub-division 9, Ward 6, where it is alleged 14 ballots were illegally marked for Ald. McGhie, and the addition of crosses made on the Board of Education ballots in favor of Dr. Orr. E. C. Robinette appeared for the accused and Mr. Curry for the Crown. The commitment was made largely on the strength of the testimony of the writing expert, Eldridge Stanton, who swore that of the 127 ballots cast for Alderman, 14 had been positively marked by the same hand, and that an individual hand had marked many votes for Dr. Orr, the Board of Education candidate.

E. C. Robinette made a strong plea for acquittal, on the ground of insufficient evidence of conspiracy on the part of either of the Laxtons. All that was added to the testimony taken was that there was a suspicion of one having tampered with the ballots. Nothing had been proved that would be directly incriminating against either of the officials, he held.

Disputed in Counting

Colonel Denison thought differently. It was evident that some one had been tampering with the ballots in this division, and John E. Laxton, as D.R.O., and his brother W. A. Laxton, as clerk, were in charge of the booth, the ballots and the ballot box, therefore it appeared that they would be the most likely persons upon whom suspicion should fall.

Mr. Robinette stated that he was going to show that there was ample ground for suspicious pointing towards other persons who were in the booth at the time of the count, and that the show by witnesses that there were a number of scrutineers in the booth at the time of the count, and that while the count of the alderman and controller ballots was progressing, under the supervision of the two officials in question, the ballots for the Board of Education were in the hands of several persons, and that the light in the corner of the room. The light in the former count was quite bright, and every move could be plainly seen, but the corner in which the education ballots were counted was dark.


