St. John Railway Company will meet with the Lancaster Highway board and discuss the matter of an extension into Fairville as far as Barnhill's corner. He was known during the latter years of his life as "Homest Old Girard." George Peabody, born in 1795, without a single stain upon his reputation, accumulated an estate of \$12,000,000, of which he gave away during his lifetime about \$8,000,000. Like Girard, he was without a family. 400,000 Miners Will Stop Work and Cost Will Reach \$10,-000,000 a Month---Operators Have Big Store of Coa and Miners Have a Good-Sized Defence Fund.

Whatever is done to bring about a new agreement between miners and operators, must come quickly. On March 31 will expire the award of the Anthracite Coal Commission, which was appointed by President Rocsevelt to settle the strike of 1902.
