PHILADELPHIA BRAVES THE SUBMARINE DANGER

First American Liner to Make Eastbound Voyage LEFT LIVERPOOL WEDNESDAY

Ninety-five Passengers Including 38 Americans—Had to Sign Waiver of Damages in Case of Disaster— Express Freight and Despatches

New York, Feb. 16.—The Associated Press this morning carries the following cablegram: Liverpool, Feb. 15.—The Philadelphia, the first American liner to leave Europe since Germany's declaration of submarine warfare, sailed from here late Wednesday afternoon.

The Philadelphia was unarmed, carrying neither a mounted nor an unmounted gun. In addition to her passengers she carried a general cargo of what is known as express freight and two tons of despatches from the American embassy in London for the state department at Washington.

The despatch bags contained important documents forwarded from American embassies and consulates in nearly all the countries of Europe, including a large quantity for Germany, which was despatched before the break in diplomatic relations.

A jolly and good natured crowd waved farewell from the Philadelphia's decks to anxious friends as the ship left the dock.

Waive Damage Claims Prior to embarking the passengers had discussed the prospect of the liner being attacked by a submarine, but most of them treated it lightly.

Even the London daily newspapers tied in vain to procure permission for staff men to make the voyage. The editors of these papers engaged the Philadelphia newspaper men on board to send them stories in the event of disaster befalling the ship.

The shortage is being felt in all parts of the city, however, and all city reservoirs are six feet below their normal levels.

THE PUBLIC CONSCIENCE

Whether the government or the opposition will win on Feb. 24 depends upon the attitude of the public mind toward graft in politics.

If the people have grown weary of graft and want a change they will defeat the government, as they did in Manitoba and British Columbia; and by this act warn future governments that graft will not be tolerated.

If the government is not defeated, it will mean that the people have postponed what they will be compelled by self-respect to do later, when other royal commissions have revealed new intrigues done by the whitewashers of Fleming.

Questions of platform and this or that proposed change or development of policy are secondary in the present contest. It is right and proper to talk about roads and crown lands, and the various departments of the public service, and of measures that might be introduced; but the people can have no sort of guarantee of satisfactory results if the men charged with administration are not to be trusted.

The elections of Feb. 24 are an appeal to the public conscience. If it is so dulled as not to respond to the appeal of the higher politics, there is no chance for the opposition, and the reign of graft will continue.

It is clear that some Conservatives are supporting the Murray government because they are such bitter Conservative partisans that they refuse to see anything bad in their own party or anything good in the other party.

Havana, Feb. 15—General Gerardo Machado, a prominent Cuban military official, and member of the Liberal committee, is reported to have been killed at Las Villas. He was formerly minister of the interior.

**SOLDIERS TO VOTE**

Key Those in Province Will be Given Leave and Transportation Home

The statement that arrangements have been made for taking the soldiers' vote for the New Brunswick election was made in a despatch from Ottawa to The Telegraph this morning.

When asked the nature of the arrangements, Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, the attorney-general, said this morning that efforts were being made to permit the return of the soldiers still in the province to their place of residence in order that they might vote. This would

involve granting leave to the men and arranging their transportation each way. He had not yet been advised that the arrangements had been complete at Ottawa.

If this plan is carried out it is expected that practically every soldier in the province who is entitled to vote will be granted sufficient leave to permit him to return to his home for election day and will be given his transportation each way.

There has been no suggestion that the votes of the New Brunswick soldiers who are overseas should be taken, as was done in the British Columbia provincial general elections, presumably because of the fact that the New Brunswick elections were brought on so hurriedly that there was no time to make the elaborate arrangements which would be required in order to give each man an opportunity to cast his ballot.

**UNITS TO BE AMALGAMATED**

They Will Become the 178th Battalion

**THREE TO JOIN TOGETHER**

The 178th, 150th and 233rd—St. John or Sussex to be Headquarters—Lieut.-Col. Girouard to Command

That the 178th French-Canadian Battalion, which recently arrived in Sussex from Montreal, under the command of Lieut.-Colonel R. Girouard, the reinforcing draft for the 150th battalion and the 233rd battalion, now quartered on Partridge Island, are to be amalgamated into one unit and to be known as the 178th battalion, was the information that was received in the city this morning.

Just where the unit will be quartered, whether in St. John or Sussex, has not been decided upon by the military officials, but it is altogether likely that it will be in St. John, as there are more extensive quarters here. The commanding officer of the 178th, Lieut.-Colonel Girouard, who is to command the unit when amalgamated, and who was in the city this morning, expressed himself this morning to the effect that he would rather remain in Sussex for various reasons.

Men will arrive weekly from recruiting stations in upper Canada for the unit, and it is expected that within a short time it will be recruited to full strength. The 178th battalion at the present time is but 300 strong, but the other units will bring the strength up to about 800.

Several of the officers of the 178th are returned men, and the colonel himself has seen service in this present war. He was a member of the 22nd battalion, which was in the same brigade and fought terms by side with the 28th. He said that the officers and men of the two mentioned battalions were greater in number than those of any other two corps at the front. They always went into the trenches together and fought hand in hand. He was personally acquainted with Major Charles Fairweather of Sussex, and spoke in familiar terms of his ability as a soldier, and that of other members of the 28th.

The battalion when recruited will cross to England as a unit.

**CASE OF THE CHINESE**

Almost the entire session of the police court this morning was taken up with the case of the twenty-five Chinese charged with being inmates of a gambling house in Mill street and against Lin King, the alleged proprietor. Daniel Mullin, K. C., who representing the Chinese, cross-examined Tom Chum, the star witness for the prosecution, for almost two hours. At one time through the cross-examination the magistrate was explaining that he has asked all the Chinese if they wanted to put up a deposit of \$50 for their appearance. If they did this and did not appear there would be more about it, whereas if the case was defended, as it was now, and they were found guilty, they would be fined \$100. Mr. Mullin remarked: "Then they are being punished for defending themselves." The magistrate replied that this was the plain English of it.

Mr. Mullin said that he never heard of such a thing in a British court of justice that a man was threatened in view of these intensions said Mr. Mullin, that there is a court of appeal, fortunately.

The witness, Tom Chum, took the stand and said that he lost \$60 at one time in the house, the boss of which was Lin King, the defendant. On another occasion he had lost \$40, his entire sum, and when this was gone he was told to get out of the house. He said he was going along Mill street to take a car for Fairville when he was invited into the house by King. The witness demonstrated to the court by means of the table, conducted in the raid by the police, how the game was played and also how the proprietor got ten cents on every dollar and also how he had lost \$100. Mr. Mullin cross-examined him and went into the whole case very thoroughly. The case was adjourned until next Tuesday at eleven o'clock.

One Chinese who failed to appear on Wednesday when the case first came up, following the explanation that he was liable to a fine of \$100 if found guilty, decided he would let the court have the \$50 today and went back to his work. Tom Chum said that he had never gambled before and that King told him he could make \$800 with every \$100 he had. This alluring proposition, he said, was the cause of Tom's fall from grace. There are still five who have failed to put up deposits.

**SACKVILLE THE HEADQUARTERS**

That the quarters of the No. 1 Divisional Ammunition Column depot, recently authorized for the maritime provinces, have been changed from Moncton to Sackville, was information received at the office of the New Brunswick command this morning. The depot is under the command of Lieutenant Gunn, formerly of the 9th Siege Battery.

Recruiting for the depot throughout the provinces has been very brisk during the last few weeks, and it is thought that within a short time a draft will be sent to their assembly centre in Montreal.
