# WOMAN RULE

Female Suffrage Threatens To Bankrupt the State

### UTOPIA VIA LEGISLATURE

Creates Thirty-one Uplift Commis sions and Increases Appropriations \$3,000,000 - Orgy of Freak Bills and Things Have Only Started

which California has been governed since women were given the right to port made by Miss Alice Hill Chittenden, president of the New York State Anti-Suffrage Association, which was given out for publication recently by the Washington headquarters of the National Association Opposed to Woman Suffrage. The report is based, it was explained, on a three months' investigation made by Miss Chittenden in California

"Creating the millenium with the ballot and regardless of the staggering cost," says Miss Chittenden, "has been California's beautiful dream since wo-California's beautiful dream since women suffrage carried the state ten months ago. Children are not to be separated from their parents because of poverty. The state is to subsidize the home. School teachers are to be pensioned. Old people are to receive an annual income. Prisoners are to be paid for their work in the jails. A regime of ease and comfort is to dawn in the Golden State. And then everybody in the community will be happy except the taxpayers, who must become paupers or criminals before they can draw dividends on their investments in California's Utopian scheme.

No Money in the Treasury "The appropriation for governing California, with it spopulation of 2,877,540 (census of 1910), for the coming

549, (census of 1910), for the coming year is nearly \$20,000,000," Miss Chittenden's report continues. "This is an increase of about \$8,000,000 over the amount appropriated two years ago, just before the suffrage was given to women by the male voters of the state. just before the suffrage was given to women by the male voters of the state. This increase is not surprising when one learns that thirty-one commissions were created by the legislature that adjourned a few weeks ago. It is estimated that the annual expenses of these commissions will amount to about \$1,000,000.




