




Redistribution Bill Presented in the House - Nova Scotia Loses Two, New Brunswick Same Number.


(Canadian Press Despatch.) Ottawa, Feb. 13-Canada's new louse of Commons will consist of 245 nembers, an increase of ten over the present representation. This afternoon Premier King presented the long awaited redistribution bill. Under its provisions-based in turn on the 1921 census-the Maritime Provinces lost two members, both in Nova Scotia-the members, both in Nova Scotia—the prairie provinces gain eleven—four going to Alberta, five to Saskatchewan and two to Manitoba and British Col-umbia gains one. The other provinces remain as at present, as does the repre-sentation of Yukon Territory. The net increase in representation for the whole Dominion is therefore ten. Premier King said it was the con-stitutional duty of the government to introduce such a bill after each decen-nial census. The British North Amer-ica Act provided that after each cen-sus a bill to readjust the representa-tion in the House of Commons should be introduced. The Prime Minister read a list of the years in which redis-



SCIENTIST SAYS PEACOCK IS NORTH AMERICAN BIRD New York, Feb. 14.-Dr. Frank Blair Hanson, head of the department of cology at Washington University, says that a bed of asphalt found in California, which had caught and preserved the skeletons of animals, birds and reptiles, has been of "immeasurable value to science." 



> Lesson No. 282 RADIO DICTIONARY

SELECTIVITY.

As applied to radio, it is the ability to select a particular wave length and to exclude other wave lengths. A receiving circuit, for example, which has a high resistance responds to a wide range of wave lengths and is consequently not very selective. High selectivity is secured in a receiving circuit when satis-factory reception of radio signals is obtained on a given wave length and signals having wave lengths differing by a comparatively few meters, either higher or lower than the given wave length, are excluded.

WAVEMETER.

The function of a wave-meter is to determine when a condition of resonance exists in a circuit at a given frequency or to measure the frequency at which a circuit having certain established values of inductance and capacity will be in a state of resonance. A wavemeter consists essentially of a series circuit con-baining an inductance and a capacity, one of which is variable, and the value of both being known. The circuit is also provided with an instrument for measuring radio currents, such as a hot-wire ammeter, this instrument being either inserted directly in the circuit or electromagnetically coupled to it.

MOLYBDENITE.

A type of mineral used as a detector in radio circuits and possessing the property of rectification, which allows more current to flow when a given vol-tage is applied in one direction than when an equal voltage is applied in the op-posite direction. It is a sulphide of molybdenum, has a blue-gray color and a formation similar to mica as it can be separated into thin sheets. The oppos-ing contact should be a fine wire resting on the surface of the crystal with a light contact. The degree of sensitiveness of this type of crystal is much less than that obtained with a good galena crystal.

VELOCITY OF WAVES.

The speed with which radio waves, light waves and radiated heat waves travel through space is 300,000,000 meters per second or 186.000 miles per second. Sound waves travel through air with a velocity of approximately 330 meters per second or 1,083 feet per second.

COMMUTATOR "RIPPLE."

When the brushes pass over the commutator segments of a direct current generator, a slight drop in voltage occurs when the brushes do not have con-tact with any commutator segment. If a circuit connected to the generator is used as a source of current supply to heat the filaments of vacuum tubes it will be found that the slight voltage variations or "ripple" will produce an annoy-ing hum in the receiving circuits and cause serious interference with the re-ception of radio signals. The effects of this type of disturbance may be re-duced, but not entirely eliminated, by the use of absorption circuits employing absorb colds and condensers.

By means of this seal, a glass tube is joined to a copper tube in such a manner as to ob-tain an adhesive union which will withstand, without cracking, changes in temperature over a wide range and also permit a high degree of evacuation in the glass cylinder which encloses the active electrical elements of the thermi-pric tube

RADIO FREQUENCIES.

All frequencies above 10,000 cycles per second are known as radio fre-quencies. The mechanism of the average human ear, although extremely sensi-tive, does not normally respond to vibrations in excess of 10,000 cycles per second which has therefore been arbitrarily chosen as a convenient dividing line between inaudible or radio-frequencies and audible or audio-frequencies, the latter being frequencies of less than 10,000 cycles per second. Washington, Feb. 14.-- A world sugar shortage this year is indicated in a report on world production and connption conditions made public by the Commerce Department. Consumption needs this year, placed at about 850,000 tons higher than in 1922, are estimated to total 725,000 tons more of raw sugar than the estimated pro duction.

The year starts, the report says, with a 4,000,000-ton Cuban crop in prospect, a big crop in Java, and great, ly increased production in European countries, but decreases elsewhere, par-ticularly in the United States, are ex-pected to bring world production to a point only about 125,000 tons above that of last year. Figures listed for 1921-22 revealed a raw sugar production in America of \$018,000 tons; Asia, 5,245,000 tons; Australasia, 364,000; Africa, 519,000, and Europe, 4,037,000, while 1922-22 estimates placed the output in America at 7,417,000 tons; Asia, 5,386,000; Aus-tralasia, 882,000; Africa, 558,000 and Europe 4,615,000. This means, according to the analy-sis, that Cuba in 1922 disposed of its entire record crop of 4,000,000 tons and practically all of the 1,200,000-ton car-ry-over. Of this total, more than 4,-000,000 tons were exported to the Un-ited States, which re-exported about 1,700,000 tons was obtained from Java.
