## LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

### British and Foreign Bible Society.

I. The designation of the Society shall be, **THE BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY**, of which the main object shall be to encourage a wider circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment; the only copies in the Language of the United Kingdom, to be circulated by the Society, shall be the Authorised Version.

II. This Society shall add its endeavors to those employed by other Societies, for circulating the Scriptures through the British Dominions: and shall, also according to its ability, extend its influence to other countries, whether Christian, Mahometan, or Pagan.

III. Each Subscriber of One Guinea annually shall be a Member.

IV. Each Subscriber of ten Guineas at one time shall be a Member for life.

V. Each Subscriber of Five Guineas annually shall be a Governor.

VI. Each Subscriber of fifty pounds at one time, or who shall, by one additional payment, increase his original subscription to Fifty Pounds shall be a Governor for life.

VII. Governors shall be entitled to attend and vote at all Meetings of the Committee.

VIII. An Executor, paying a bequest of Fifty pounds shall be a Member for life; or, of One Hundred Pounds, a Governor for life.

IX. A Committee shall be appointed to conduct the business of the Society, consisting of thirty-six Laymen, six of whom shall be Foreigners, resident in London or its vicinity; half the remainder shall be members of the Church of England and the other half members of other denominations of Christians. Twenty-seven of the above number, who shall have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

The Committee shall appoint all Officers, except the Treasurer, and call Special General Meetings, and shall be charged with procuring for the Society suitable patronage, both British and Foreign.

X. Each member of the Society shall be entitled, under the direction of the committee, to purchase Bibles and Testaments at the Society's prices, which shall be as low as possible.

XI. The Annual Meeting of the Society shall be held on the first Wednesday in May, when the Treasurer and Committee shall be chosen, the accounts presented and the proceedings of the foregoing year reported.

XII. The President, Vice-Presidents, and Treasurer shall be considered *ex officio* members of the Committee.

XIII. Every Clergyman or dissenting Minister, who is a Member of the Society, shall be entitled to attend and vote at all Meetings of the committee.

XIV. The Secretaries for the time being shall be considered as members of committee; but no other person deriving any emolument from the Society shall have that privilege.

XV. At the General Meetings, and at Meetings of the Committee, the President, or in his absence, the Vice-President first upon the list then present; and in the absence of the Vice-President the Treasurer; and in his absence such member as shall be voted for that purpose, shall preside at the meeting.

XVI. The Committee shall meet on the first Wednesday in every month, or oftener if necessary.

XVII. The Committee shall have the power of nominating such persons as have rendered essential services to the Society either MEMBERS FOR LIFE, or GOVERNORS FOR LIFE.

XVIII. The Committee shall also have the power of nominating HONORARY MEMBERS from among Foreigners, who have promoted the objects of the Society.

XIX. The whole of the Minutes of every General Meeting shall be signed by the Chairman.

## REGULATIONS

ADOPTED AT THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF THE SOCIETY IN 1826 AND 1827.

I. That the fundamental law of the Society, which limits its operations to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, be fully and distinctly recognized as excluding the circulation of the Apocrypha.

II. That in conformity to the preceding resolution, no pecuniary aid can be granted to any Society circulating the Apocrypha; nor except for the purpose of being applied in conformity to the said resolution, to any individual whatever.

III. That in all cases in which grants, whether gratuitous or otherwise of the Holy Scriptures, either in whole or in part,

## LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

# Nova Scotia Bible Society.

I. This Society shall be called THE BIBLE SOCIETY OF NOVA SCOTIA AND ITS DEPENDENCIES; the object of which shall be the same as that of the British and Foreign Bible Society, viz.; to encourage the circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment, and to furnish copies of the Scriptures *gratis* to the indigent, and at reduced prices to those requiring them.

II. The business of the Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary and Committee.

III. In order to give effect to the designs of this Institution, benefactions and subscriptions shall be solicited, and books opened for receiving the names of benefactors and subscribers.

IV. Every person contributing annually Ten Shillings at one time, or a donation of Ten Pounds, shall be considered a Member of the Society.

V. A General Meeting of the Members of this Society will be held every year, before which will be laid the accounts and proceedings of the preceding year.

VI. The whole of the subscriptions and donations, after deducting incidental expenses, shall be remitted annually in aid of the funds of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

VII. Every Member of this Society shall be entitled to purchase, under the direction of the Committee, Bibles and Testaments at the reduced prices of the Society, which are as low as possible.

VIII. The Committee shall be authorized to meet for the purpose of conducting the business of the Society as often as may be necessary, and shall have power to add to their numbers as occasion may require.

Held in Temperance Hall, on Monday, 28th November, 1870.

The Chair was taken by HON. S. L. SHANNON, President, at half-past seven o'clock.

The Chairman called upon the Rev. G. W. HILL, M., to give out a hymn and engage in prayer.

The PRESIDENT addressed the Meeting.

The SECRETARY read the Forty-second Report of the Committee.

It was, on motion of the Rev. E. M. SAUNDERS, seconded by A. RUSSELL, the Agent of the Society,

RESOLVED,—That the Report, an abstract of which has been read, be received and adopted as the Forty-second Report of the Nova Scotia Auxiliary Bible Society, and that the same be printed, with the usual appendages for circulation, under direction of the Committee.

Resolved,—That this Meeting desires to express its devout gratitude to Almighty God for the success which has crowned the efforts of the Parent Society during the past year and especially for the providential openings for the dissemination of the Scriptures which have taken place on the continent of Europe and elsewhere, during the past year.

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## REPORT.

THE committee of the Nova Scotia Auxiliary Bible Society, beg leave to appear before their friends and patrons with their usual Annual Report.

The first paragraph of last Report expressed gratitude to the Giver of every good and perfect gift for His preserving care during the past year, "in that they were permitted to appear before you with unbroken ranks, no deaths had occurred among the members of committee." This year we in humble submission bow to the will of our Heavenly Father in the different circumstances in which we are placed. The President, REV. ROBERT UNIACKE, A. M., the Senior Vice President, J. W. NUTTING, Esq., and A. K. DOULL, Esq., of the members of Committee, have all entered their rest.

Regarding these lamented deaths there is a minute Committee which will be published with this Report; (see App.) but in passing we notice that there is not now one member of the original subscribers to the Society alive; that there are only one or two of those who joined in 1820, when Mr. Nutting first associated himself with the institution, of whom the Judge Marshall is one. "Man goeth to his home, and the mourners, go about the streets." "The grass withereth, the flower thereof fadeth, but the Word of the Lord endureth forever." Mr. Nutting's connection with the Society has been

uninterrupted ; of the others, though they have been ever friendly, yet they have been removed from the city and province and have been unable at all times to take an active interest in the movements of the institution. In the demise of Mr Nutting we have sustained the loss of a constant and active friend and a member of committee for a half century. Those afflictive dispensations read their own lessons and say to every one of us "work while it is day, the night cometh when no man can work.."

With thankfulness to our Heavenly Father the Committee desire to bring before you some details of their work during the past year. Keeping steadily in view the objects of their Auxiliary, namely, the circulating of the Word of God among our own people, and at the same time the gathering of contributions towards the great work of the Parent Society whose efforts in circulating the Scriptures have been attended with the usual success, they do not expect those striking incidents which so often mark the career of the colporteur as he comes in contact with superstition and prejudice in foreign lands. Our people as a whole, with some few class exceptions, are generally acquainted with the Bible, and our Agents have in most instances to contend less against ignorance and superstition than the indifference of the careless and unrenewed heart. The reports of Mr Russell and the extracts from the returns of the colporteurs will show what success has attended this part of the Society operations. Their efforts in behalf of the Parent Society's funds have been well sustained, particularly by the Branch Societies through

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out the province. The committee would point especially to the zeal of their friends in the country in order to stimulate their patrons in the city; and they deem it but right to say that the contributions which from time to time they are enabled to forward to the Home Committee, are derived in a larger proportion from the Branch Societies than from our subscribers in the city.

With these preliminary remarks your committee will now turn briefly to the operations of the Parent Society during the past year. As usual they commence with

FRANCE.—At the time the Parent Society's Report was published, there was a peculiar interest attached to France on account of the then all-absorbing topic of the Infallibility of the Pope. That has passed away, and now we have the same country involved in a desolating war. It is from the first named standpoint that the Society's operations are to be viewed. The changes of the past few years have given opportunities for increased circulation of the word of God, for which the Christian Church in all lands have been giving thanks to God.

In the midst of the great controversy on the Pope's infallibility, the Bible could not be ignored. Those who once rejected the Bible were welcoming the Colporteurs to their houses, and entering into conversation with them with marked interest. Antagonism to Rome has received an impulse from Roman Catholics which in France has never been

manifested to a similar extent, and it does not seem improbable that the force through which the once gigantic edifice of Papal supremacy will be overthrown, will be the internal force of its own exalted pretensions. And it is pleasing to know that one who is both King and Priest shall wield the sceptre of a righteous government, and, like the great millstone which the angel took and cast into the sea, "with violence shall that great city Babylon be thrown down and shall be found no more at all."

During the past year the issues of the agent, M. D. Pressense, have amounted to 91,212 volumes. The result of all sales, apart from all grants to religious societies and gratis distributions, is 80,309 volumes.

The Report thus speaks :—

"The issues during the thirty-seven years that M. de Pressense has had charge of the work in France have amounted to 4,026,094, and if to these are added such Scriptures as are known to have been distributed through other religious and Christian friends, a grand total is reached of 5,736,744 copies. How gratifying a prospect does this one fact afford to the Christian mind, when contemplating the probable results of such an extended circulation of the Word of God! Who can tell the influence which it has had upon the nation, in the development of the blessings of peace and constitutional government, or in the restraint of what God calls 'the madness of the people,' and the inculcation of temperance to the use of newly-acquired liberty? And when from the expansive prospect of a whole nation, the mind's eye endeavours to individualize its component parts, how impossible it is to form any adequate conception of the good effected—the ignorant that have been in-

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constructed and the mourners that have received consolation, the wayward and rebellious that have stooped to wear the yoke of Christ, and the souls that have been sanctified and made meet for a heavenly inheritance. The final day alone will declare it, but in the meantime faith loves to magnify the grace of God, and works on under that conviction that 'He is able to do exceeding abundantly above all that we ask or think.'

The Paris depot, which is now situate in the Rue N'Cligny, has proved very attractive to a large number of people, both on account of the facility which it affords for the purchase of the Scriptures, and the large variety of the editions in different languages which are there offered for sale. Visitors listen with astonishment when told of the vastness of the Society's operations in every land, and groups of workmen are not unfrequently seen at the window, reading the open copies which are there exhibited, and noting some passages of Scripture which more especially arrest the attention. Six Colporteurs have been employed in the capital during the whole year, and five more during a portion of it.

The sales from the Marseilles depot and other depositories in the country have amounted to 18,927 copies, being an excess of 3,908 over the preceding year; this is attributed in a great measure to the increased publicity of the depots by means of the extensive circulation of the specimens of languages printed by the Society. This could scarcely be otherwise if they were viewed only from the low ground of literary research.

Colporteurs have been employed outside the capital. Two visited the Military camps, one has occupied himself with the requirements of the sailors, and 49 (of whom 39 have been employed during the whole year) have been travelling through the various departments, and have succeeded in selling from house to house, 42,613 volumes.

No difficulty existed in the way of colporteurs; as soon as it was ascertained that the men confined their sales to the Scriptures, they at once grant the authority required.

In the army the officers, for the most part, manifested a friendly disposition, and this induced the men to take more interest in the Book offered to them than they otherwise would. The fact that during the past year 4,000 soldiers have been willing to set aside a portion of their pay for the purpose of purchasing the sacred volume, is a cheering evidence of the respect they entertain for it.

The Rev. A. Fisch, a French pastor, highly recommended for his Christian character, has been engaged to assist the Agent. He has visited very many places in the North and East, and North West of France. He has held public meetings for the purpose of giving information respecting the general work of the Society. In the various towns he passed through he called upon the various booksellers, and, though Roman Catholics, they were willing to undertake the sale of the Scriptures.

**BELGIUM.**—In Belgium the total issues have amounted to 13,671 copies, showing an increase of

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more than 800 over those of the preceding year. The camp is never a favourable locality for the introduction of the Gospel,—at least not in seasons of peace. But there the Colporteurs have learned lessons of patience and hope for the future. One, having been specially appointed for that work, found that in the midst of poverty some borrowed money to purchase the New Testament, or clubbed together to get one among them.

The great question agitated in the Parent Society's Report respecting Belgium is the circulation of the DeSacy's version of the Bible, and the following sentence would seem to close the controversy so far as Belgium is concerned. After referring to the men who, in Belgium, had been engaged in the work of Bible circulation and seen its fruits, and ought to be able to judge.—“The opinion of such men in Belgium is that for the present it is not expedient to discontinue the circulation of the vulgate version; an opinion formed by facts, by the fruits of their own labors combined with those of the B. & F. Bible Society, and the formation of more than twenty Protestant Churches in Belgium, almost exclusively composed of converts from Romanism.”

HOLLAND.—The work of the Society in Holland partakes of but little variation. Its chief characteristic is the steady perseverance with which the Colporteurs pursue their labours, and the even level as regards numbers at which the circulation has remained from year to year. The International Exhibition held at Amsterdam had a beneficial effect in

raising the circulation this year from 24,741 to 32,283 copies, showing an increase of 7,542 volumes on the issues of the preceding years. Interesting incidents are given in detail, and a good deal of opposition is manifested in some districts of the country, which seems to retard the work :

“ The enmity shown against the Bible (especially in this province) is incredible. In some places the priests opposed the Colporteur. They forbade him to sell his books, saying they were not genuine.— He showed them the approbation of the bishop, and as they could not say anything against that, the priests followed the Colporteur from house to house warning the people against buying the books.

“ In another place it was the mayor who by command of the priest endeavoured to prevent the sale of his books. The Colporteur declared he would lodge a complaint against a mayor, who instead of protecting him, as the law commands, tried to hinder him. Thereon the mayor became afraid. He however contrived to get the master of a large village school to send the boys out through the village warning the people against the man with the bad books. This is indeed a very sad case, more so as there are persons who would buy, but are now afraid to do so. At another time he met a family that showed much interest in the Bible. They invited him to enter, for fear the priest might see them, but just as they were on the point of purchasing a copy, the priest came in and prevented them from doing so. Many persons assured our Colporteur that they most willingly would have bought a Testament but their priest had forbidden it and threatened not to absolve them when they came to confess.”

GERMANY.—In a country such as Germany, in which the work of the Bible Society has been for

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many years carried on with equal activity and intelligence, there must be some degree of sameness in the record of its operations, and yet experience teaches that seldom a year passes which does not claim some characteristic peculiar to itself. On former years war spread its desolations through the land, and God's word found an entrance among those whose lives were trembling in the balance, and imparted special consolations to the dying, and such, we doubt not, will be the state of things at this very hour. The reflection that vast numbers of our race who have fallen during the present continental contest should make us lift up our hearts in gratitude and praise to our Heavenly Father that we have been enabled in any slight degree to aid in giving them the Word of Life. There was, before the war commenced, a population of 42,500,000 souls. It must not, however, be supposed that the Parent Society bears the whole burden of the work which its figures represent. There are there between thirty and forty native Bible Societies which share for it the honour of working for God in the distribution of His Word. The Bible has been printed and circulated in sixteen different languages in that country alone, and printing establishments have been in active operation in Cologne and Frankfurt—which supply those districts in the German Confederation generally. They have their depots all over the country, and active Agents and Colporteurs, whose energy, as of old, scaled the Alps and descended into the valleys with the precious treasure. The emigrants on their way to the American

continent are visited, and the Word of Life sold to them, that every man in his own tongue can read the wonderful words of God. Interesting incidents to this effect from the Colporteurs reports :

“The seed of the Divine Word has this month found its way into the hands and hearts of the people of many lands; for all the northern countries of Europe contribute their contingent to the emigrants who leave our port, sometimes sending the good, oftener the bad. It might be a comfort to think that Europe is weeded of so great a mass of corruption, if it were not to be feared that the evil seed springs up with ranker luxuriance on American soil. In almost every emigrant ship there are children of light, if one were only successful in finding them out. Their joy compensates for the insults and reproaches of the rest. One day I met a man whose language I could not comprehend, but when I made him understand the words ‘Bible’ and ‘Jesus,’ his whole countenance brightened up. He began to speak rapidly—I could not understand him, but he took off his hat reverentially, and then, pointing heavenwards, kept repeating, ‘God, God.’ The languages we speak on earth we could not understand, but our souls understood enough to know that we worshipped one God and trusted in one and the same Jesus. Another, a Bohemian, said to me, ‘I have a Bible more than 250 years old, which my forefathers had to hide in the depths of the rocks.’ To another Bohemian I sold a Bible, and made him read the words, ‘Father, I will that they also whom thou hast given me be with me where I am.’ Immediately he began to tell his countrymen, who gathered around him and listened with the greatest interest, how believers in Jesus are fellow-heirs with Jesus, destined to be like Him, and to reign with Him. His words produced a deep impression, and many Bibles were bought.”

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Who can compute the value of such services rendered to the cause of truth? The giving of one of the Bible Society's Bibles to a young Irish laborer on his way to America, resulted, under God, in the conversion of him, who afterwards gave to the world and to literature the celebrated letters of Kirwan, and to the Church the illustrious name of the late Dr. Murray, of Princetown, whose memory we would not willingly let die.

In SWITZERLAND no new features of the work present themselves, except a controversy raging with great virulence in Geneva, on the morality of the Holy Scriptures. M. Brussons, a young Professor in the Academy of Neufchatel, published a thesis, in which it was argued "that indiscriminate reading of the Holy Scriptures by the young is at the same time a wrong against the conscience and the intellect." His words seem to have fallen upon a fruitful soil, and the result was an agitation which extended all over the Cantons of French Switzerland. Other Professors took up the defence, and, from being an attack on the authority of the Bible, the conflict assumed the character of a struggle between Christianity as taught in the Scriptures and a certain new christianity to be organized into a Church called the Liberal Christianity.

From this the friends of the Bible have only to see the tendencies of the age in countries which have been subject to so much of the Papal rule. If they cannot oppose the Word from its circulation from the Church point of view, they must bring it

under the influence of a so-called enlightened intellect, which denies its authority and attempts to tarnish its morality.

The total circulation effected in Switzerland during the past year amounted to 13,934 Bibles, 23,082 Testaments, and 9,409 portions, making a total of 46,425 copies on the whole, an increase of 3,952. The following sentence concludes the Local Agent's Report: "I see no signs of our work being injured by the attacks of Infidelity on the Holy Scriptures. God reigns, and His word abides forever."

AUSTRIA.—The Report says: A review of the Society's operations throughout the Austrian domain, during the past year, is calculated to excite feelings of a varied description. The political, social, and religious condition, must necessarily produce a considerable influence on such a work that in which we are engaged. There is cause for great thankfulness that the yoke of Papal superstition has been broken from the necks of the people and that some measure of religious liberty has been conceded to them. But liberty unhallowed by the Word of God leads only to licentiousness, and the slaves of spiritual despotism when once set free are very apt to exchange the profession of a false religion to which they blindly conformed for the rejection of all belief in the testimony of God concerning the Work of Redemption or the need of holiness. And that such has been the case in Austria we must not wonder, and we have no desire to condemn.

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To give anything like an accurate synopsis of the Report which occupied 25 pages of the Parent Society's Report is utterly impossible in the limits at our disposal. We will here transcribe two extracts.

"Their houses were distinguished from afar by their cleanly appearance, and by the Bible texts with which they are externally adorned. I found one individual, the only one I could discover, that had known Boos. She was an old woman that had been converted by him. I found her confined to her bed, but she was reading her Bible. She was a dear warm-hearted soul, full of Gospel knowledge. I had a long conversation with her concerning the things that the Lord had done for us; and she was so highly pleased with my visit that she continually said, in a low voice, 'Oh, how I wish my husband was yet alive to see you.' He had, I understood, been extremely zealous in the cause of the Gospel, and had suffered much on account of his profession.

"One man who died three years ago, at the age of 70, was particularly mentioned as having been a shining light. Sick and dying persons, many miles around, used to send for him. There are now about a dozen individuals left, truly devoted to the Lord, though, perhaps, as may easily be explained, somewhat peculiar in some particulars; and at a small distance there are some more, chiefly women, connected with them, and striving to rear up their families in the fear and nurture of the Lord. In another place Rauch found a family, consisting of three brothers and one sister, whose house he describes 'as a Bethany.' 'I was welcomed with open arms,' he says, 'and soon I found myself listening to the most interesting and encouraging statements of what the Redeemer had lately done unto their souls; the youngest brother, in particular, is a marvel in my eyes. He used to be the leading man in Romish processions, drawing out the oft-repeated prayers in

the usual monotonous strain; when not thus engaged, he used to play his musical instrument. But having been supplied with a Bible, having thoroughly studied the Word of God, having experienced the power of Divine grace in his soul, and having strictly compared the doctrine of Rome with the Scriptures, he resolutely determined henceforward to do away with whatsoever might to him appear inconsistent with the revealed will of God. Of course this soon led to trouble. The parish priest visited him, and made the most solemn representations to him. He begged the priest to lend him one of his New Testaments. He then set himself to compare it with Luther and Van Ess. Finding full agreement among them all, he determined more firmly than ever to adhere to his convictions, and abide by the consequences. On Corpus Christi day he met the priest walking in the fields, and the latter invited him to follow him to his house. He hesitated. "Ah! I see you have no time; I suppose you must needs go and read your Bible?" the priest tauntingly insinuated. He boldly avowed this to be his intention: the priest then most pressingly entreated him to give up this dangerous reading; it would turn his head. Some previous knowledge was necessary before a man could read the Bible profitably. "Why," said the priest, "I do not understand very much of the Bible myself." Our friend observed he thought he did understand as much as was necessary for salvation; he could not think of giving up the precious Book. Upon this the priest abused him most violently, calling him "a wretched blockhead of a cobbler," and ordered him, under pain of ecclesiastical censure, at once to commit his Bible and all his tracts to the fire. His whole heart blazed up in holy indignation. Unfolding to the amazed priest the simple plan of salvation, he charged him with leading his flock to unprofitable fields of stubble, instead of to the green pastures of God's Truth, and said he rejected the whole system, as a miserable refuge of lies.

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"A number of bystanders had collected, and had been listening to this boisterous conversation. They stared, and wondered to see the priest morally beaten; the shoemaker to master the priest, it was passing strange! It was expected that our friend would be marched off to jail at once, but the times are altered. The priest applied to the Authorities to have the shoemaker's house searched, but as yet nothing of the kind has been attempted. The shoemaker sent word to the priest that he had nothing to conceal, that he would most willingly send any books he could spare to the bishop, or to Rome, if he liked, but that he would rather part with his life than give up his convictions. He and his whole family are held in high esteem in the neighbourhood; they are known to lead exemplary lives."

"Amidst the torrent of opposition we have to meet, it is refreshing to be permitted to register two friendly votes, the one from a Romish priest and the other from a Protestant pastor. The former congratulated us on the acquisition of this beautiful translation, and hoped we would continue and speedily complete it. It was, he said, a thing devoutly to be wished. The latter writes: 'It has given me the highest pleasure to receive this copy of Mark in the Slovenian. May the Word of God evince its powerful and saving strength in this forsaken and deluded people. There is no weapon against the enemies of the Word like the Word itself. The isolated position of this people has contributed not a little to the success of the adversary in uprooting every trace of Gospel. I have a firm conviction in God, that the light of the Gospel will dispel much of the surrounding darkness. May the Lord continue to bless the truly grand operations of the Bible Society.'"

And last the following simple story is both touching and encouraging. It shows how impossible it is to satisfy the soul that is athirst for God with anything but the work of Life.

"A poor servant girl entered the Depot and bought a copy of Mark. After a few days she came 'for the other parts;' she meant an entire Bible. We told her they were being prepared, but could not be had yet. This was a great disappointment to her. 'No, I cannot wait so long,' she said. 'Oh, it has given me so much pleasure, and I understand it so well. The whole story of Jesus is in it. I have read it all night;' and she compelled us to show her all our Slavic editions, but she could not fully understand any but the Slovenian. She was very sorry, and in her simplicity reproached us for leaving the Slovenians so long without the good Book, while the Germans and others had such nice editions."

**POLAND.**—The circulation of the Depots at Warsaw has during the past year been most satisfactory, having exceeded that of the previous year by 3,714 copies. The number has been as follows:—4536 Bibles, 13,705 New Testaments and 2,433 Portions or a total of 20,677 volumes.

Mr. Millard states that it has required no small degree of vigilance and activity on the part of the depositaries and Colporteurs to secure this gratifying result. Serious difficulties have at times intervened but God has overruled these for good, and have tended rather to the furtherance of the Gospel than otherwise.

**IN DENMARK.**—The Report says,—progress and opposition are for the most part found side by side in every land in which God is working by His Word and by His Spirit to dispel the darkness of unbelief.

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A Bible monopoly has to be contended with in this country which raised the price of the Bible to 9s. is now reduced to 4s. 6d., a result which under God is due to the action of the Society and the untiring zeal of its Agents.

The issues from the Depot in Copenhagen during the past year have amounted to 20,860 copies of which 2,763 were Bibles, 16,778 New Testaments and 1319 Portions.

The Revision of the Danish Bible which has been sometime in course of preparation, will soon be completed. It is to be circulated among the clergy for their approval and criticism before authority will be given to its general circulation, a considerable period may yet elapse ere the consummation is reached which the committee had for many years in view.

The Depot in Copenhagen was opened 1856, and has distributed 200,000. Colporteurs have visited the camp at Jutland and all along the Baltic coast. Iceland has remitted £30 stg. through the agency of Copenhagen for Scriptures sold, the depression of the Island by the severity of the season, which interfered with the commerce of the Island and other causes brought much distress upon the people—under such circumstances the work of Bible distribution has been almost suspended.

There are six agencies in Norway, Christiana, Alesund, Birgen, Dronthavirn and Tromsø. And in this country the past year has been a marked one in the annals of Norwegian literature, inasmuch as a New Translation of the Bible has been completed under the auspices of the Norwegian Bible Society. The

Agency at Christiana is the centre of the Society's operations in Norway from which supplies are furnished to the other agencies according to their various requirements.

It appears that the issues of the past year have amounted to 25,929 copies, and have exceeded those of the preceding year by 25,97 copies. This is a gratifying result, and when we consider the physical labour incurred by the Colporteurs in visiting the fairs and sparse population, 1035 copies have been sold by them. Of the other agencies the work has been much the same as in former years.

**SWEDEN.**—The custom which exists, and which has prevailed for sometime in Sweden, of presenting a copy of the Scriptures, formerly a New Testament—now for the most part a Bible to each young person when confirmed, necessarily makes the people of that country better supplied with the word of God than are the inhabitants of most other European countries. The circulation from the depot at Stockholm amounts to a total of 1798,802 copies, and if to those be added as far as can be ascertained the numbers issued by the Swedish Bible Society, a total is reached of 2,623,810, which within the last few years have been circulated among a population of four millions.

In **RUSSIA**, 50,491 copies of the Scriptures in more than twelve different languages, have been circulated, small, indeed, when contrasted with the population of that great empire.

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the Society's supplies are furling to their past year have exceeded those of the year before. This is a result of the physical exertion in visiting the colonies have been the work has been done.

Society been more satisfactory during the past twelve months, than in SPAIN. No book has been so much sought after as the Bible. Where less than three years ago the Scriptures could not be openly sold—now, except where priestly intolerance excites popular prejudice—they can be freely exhibited for sale. 135,695, either Bibles or Testaments, or Gospels, issued from the Depot in Madrid, 38,697 of which had been distributed by colporteurs.

The law of PORTUGAL does not prohibit Bible circulation, but the administration of the law is capricious; owing to the vexatious interferences with the colporteurs, only 3,476 copies had been sold.

Years ago God's Word had found its way into every part of ITALY—save Rome and its environs. 5,876 vols., were circulated last year. But your committee are happy to say that within the past few weeks the Bible has found an entrance into Rome. A colporteur of the British and Foreign Bible Society accompanied the Italian army there. And subsequently we have information that, an agent of the Bible Society entered Rome and opened a depot for the sale of the Scriptures and seven colporteurs were actively employed there. May the Word of the Lord—there, as elsewhere—have free course and be glorified.

Time does not permit giving further details of the great work of the British and Foreign Bible Society. It suffices it to say that during the past year 2,186,186 copies of the Word of Life were circulated, and that the total issues of the Society now amount to 59,671. The Word of God, or portions of it, are

now printed in 183 different languages or dialects. The receipts for the year—including monies received for the sale of the Scriptures at home and abroad, were £132,265 6s. 3d. The expenditure has been £173,476 2s. 0d.

Turning again to the affairs of our own Auxiliary, your Committee have to speak of the attention and zeal manifested by their agent, Mr. Russell, to whose reports we refer for information in detail respecting the Bible cause in Nova Scotia, which reports are ever read with interest. He has not only been able to visit the several Branch Societies connected with Nova Scotia, but, with the permission of the committee, he has rendered good service to the New Brunswick Auxiliary, in devoting a portion of his time to their service. It is a cause of gratitude to our Heavenly Father that his health has been spared after undergoing so much labour and fatigue.

The Branch Societies and Ladies' Association have rendered valuable service during the past year, and by their assistance your Committee have been able to remit to the Parent Society, a free contribution of *Fifty* *teen Hundred* dollars, besides paying over *Two Hundred* dollars on purchase account.

The Treasurer's account will show the receipts and disbursements during the year. The following is an abstract of the receipts:

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Within the past few weeks an effort has been made to increase the subscriptions in the city, of which we cannot satisfactorily report at present, as it will form the subject of the next annual report.

It will be in the recollection of the friends of the Society that about twelve years ago efforts were adopted by the Halifax Ladies' Association to promote the circulation of the Scriptures among the thinly settled portions of the Province; several colporteurs were employed, some for longer and some for shorter periods. About four years ago the Agent of the American Tract Society, whose colporteurs were then laboring in Nova Scotia, applied for quantities of cheap Bibles and Testaments, to be furnished to their colporteurs who were instructed to sell them wherever practicable, and where in their journey they found families without the Scriptures and unable to purchase them, to give every such family a copy of God's Word.

A considerable number of copies of the Scriptures were thus disposed of. The committee are unable to say how many were given away and how many sold. When the Book and Tract Society took the place of the American one, the same grants of Scriptures, partly sold and partly given away, were issued to their colporteurs.

In April, 1869, an application was made by the committee of the Book and Tract Society to your Auxiliary to supply their Colporteurs at half price with as many copies as they might require, the committee of the Book and Tract Society pledging that

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their colporteurs would supply gratuitously any cases of destitution of the Scriptures they might meet.

At one of the largest meetings of committees in April last, it was agreed to grant for one year Bibles and Testaments of cheaper kinds at half price to the value of \$800.

In accordance with this resolution, 940 Bibles and 615 Testaments, to the value of \$249.86 have been granted, for which the sum of \$178.98 has been received. Of these 509 Bibles have been sold, and 462 Testaments. The following number of copies of the Scriptures have by these colporteurs been disposed of or held in the following counties for sale:—

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Nova Scotia work, Rev. S. T. Rand, Micmac missionary, has finished a translation of the Gospel by St. John, in the language of the Millascet Indians of New Brunswick, which has been printed by the Parent Society and sent out for the use of that tribe.

And also within the last few weeks an edition of the Book of Exodus, in Micmac, has been printed in this city, the expense of which is also borne by the Parent Society. Making, in all the Gospels, the Acts of the Apostles, the Epistle to the Hebrews, the book of Genesis, and the Psalms all published in that language.

That your committee have given grants of the Scriptures to the Mount Hope Lunatic Asylum, and the Institution for the Deaf and Dumb.

That with all the sister institutions in the neighboring Provinces we are on the most cordial terms. That the past year saw the New Brunswick Auxiliary celebrate its jubilee; and the Auxiliary at Montreal in January next will celebrate the same, to which they have kindly invited representatives from this Auxiliary.

The committee rejoice in every opportunity offered for conveying fraternal greeting to those who are engaged in the same work,—and especially those who represent the men who fifty years ago beheld the dawn of the day of small things, and are enabled to look back on the past and say, "What hath God wrought."

Other reasons why your committee seek to cultivate their kindly christian feelings and intercourse. The signs of the times, the aspect of affairs on the continent of Europe, a conflict to which we may be called,

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may just be one even in this continent which requires the friends of Bible truth to speak unitedly and in trumpet tones. To men in authority in behalf of the teaching of the Bible in our common schools. In behalf of the faith of our Bible as taught and exemplified in our colleges, and the higher branches of education. In behalf of the power of the Bible upon our statesmen, senators, and judges.

Then may we expect the peace, purity, and full enjoyment of the Bible with all its promises and blessings to be felt on all our lives.

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The following is the Minute of Committee referred to :

A Special meeting of the Committee of the Nova Scotia Bible Society was held on Tuesday in the Young Men's Christian Association Rooms. Sir William Young presided. Prayer was offered by Rev. Dr. King. On motion of Hon. S. L. Shannon the following Minute was adopted unanimously :

*Resolved*, That the meeting desires to express its sense of the loss their auxiliary has sustained by the death, within a brief period, of the Rev. R. F. UNIACKE, the President, of JAMES W. NUTTING, Esq., one of its oldest members and a former Secretary, and of A. K. DOULL, Esq., who has been only recently appointed a member of the Committee.

Connected with the Society in his youth Mr. Uniacke continued throughout a long life to evince his attachment to its principles and objects. He joined the Parent Society when a curate in England, and on his return to his native land, he not only united himself with the Nova Scotia Bible Society, but devoted his energies to its advancement. On the demise of the late lamented Rev. J. T. Twining, D.D., he was elevated to the position of President of the Society, a situation which he esteemed one of great honor and responsibility—and the duties of which he discharged with the single desire of diffusing by every practicable means the Word of Life.

Mr. Nutting was also one of the oldest members of the Society, having joined the Society in 1820, elected on Committee in 1822. From the year 1823 to the year 1842 he was its active Secretary, and on resigning this office he consented to become one of its Vice-Presidents, and was ever ready by word and act to advance its interests.

The sad loss of the *City of Boston* in February last, deprived the Society of the services of A. K. Doull, Esq., one of its youngest members. Mr. Doull's energy in all things relating to the Redeemer's cause has led the Committee to hope that he would be long spared to aid in the discharge of its duties, but wise though mysterious Providence has ordered it otherwise, and the Committee can only bow with submission to the blow. This Committee deems it a privilege thus to make a public record of the services of those who have passed away from among them, feeling that though dead they still speak, and their works do follow them.

The Secretary was directed to send copies of the foregoing to Mrs. Uniacke, to Mr. Nutting's family, and to Mr. Doull's brother. Rev. Dr. King passed a warm eulogium on Mr. Uniacke's memory.

## MR. RUSSELL'S REPORTS.

TO THE COMMITTEES OF THE HALIFAX LADIES' BIBLE ASSOCIATION, AND THE NOVA SCOTIA AUXILIARY BIBLE SOCIETY.

On the 13th of November I came from Truro to Halifax to attend the Annual Meeting of the Auxiliary held on the 15th. All day after (16th) was busily engaged in arranging Subscription lists, &c. for Annual Report. Early Wednesday morning left by coach for Chester, and the same evening addressed a pretty well attended meeting in Temperance Hall, Rev. Mr. Shreve presiding. He, as well as Rev. Mr. Skinner aided largely in sustaining the interest of the meeting. Some subscriptions were obtained, and two Ladies exerted themselves in procuring more on my return; altogether \$22.38 were obtained. Next meeting was held the following evening in Chester Basin. The interest manifested was greater than I had before witnessed here. Some subscriptions were received, partly paid there, partly paid on my return—\$6.22 were obtained. Next evening addressed a very small but spirited meeting in Mahone Bay. Rev. Mr. McNab presiding. At the meeting some subscriptions were paid, and more were waiting me on my return—\$16.75 were received.

Went on to Lunenburg, where on Monday evening I addressed an excellent meeting in the Presbyterian church, Rev. William Duff presiding, who with Rev. Mr. Huestis advocated warmly the claims of the Bible Society. Next day calling round on the friends accompanied by S. Finck, Esq., a larger subscription was obtained than I had ever before received in

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Lunenburg, -partly paid then, partly awaiting my return—\$52.53½ were received. Kindly taken by Rev. Mr. Duff to Lower LaHave, next meeting, a very small one owing to stormy weather—was held in the Wesleyan church, Cross Roads. Next morning crossed the LaHave river, and walked on to Petite Riviere where at night I addressed a small meeting in the School-house. A subscription paper was opened, and collectors were appointed to try to add to the small sum then paid in.

Next day went on to Bridgewater, I had purposed ending the labours of the week, by a meeting in Bridgewater on Saturday night. But at the hour appointed through some mistake the door of the place where the meeting had been appointed, was unlocked, search was made for the key, it could not be found; hence no meeting was held that evening. Next day however I had opportunities of adverting to the work of the Bible Society, and the day after, accompanied as usual by Mr. Gow, I gathered up in all \$33, about double of what had been obtained in Bridgewater last year.

Kindly furnished by Rev. Peter Morrison with his horse and carriage, I rode to New Germany where a meeting had been appointed. A heavy rain which came on in the afternoon and continued all night, prevented any gathering. I received a payment on purchase account and came on to Bridgewater.

Having now visited all the Branches in Lunenburg County, I returned Thursday Dec. 2nd to Halifax. Spent some time further preparing additional lists for Report. And went on Saturday Dec. 4th to Antigonishe where a meeting had been appointed that evening. The coach was somewhat late. The people had assembled, and had been holding a prayer-meeting until my arrival. Within five minutes of the time I had alighted from the coach I had commenced my address. Next Sabbath evening collections were taken in the Presbyterian and Baptist churches in aid of the Bible Society.

Left Antigonishe Monday evening about midnight by mail in an open carriage, under a heavy rain for Guysboro'. So heavy was the rain, that I was not only drenched myself, but my valice, and clothes inside it, were wetted. The rest of the week was spent in holding meetings in Cape Canso and in Guysboro', meetings on the whole very encouraging. Found no abatement of interest in Guysboro'. The Ladies' Bibles Association had sent on their annual remittance before my visit. And from the other Society a payment was also received, bing the balance of their last year's subscriptions which remained after the payment of a Colporteur for a few weeks last winter.

Early on Monday morning, 13th Dec., left Guysboro' for Sherbrooke, which I reached after 9 hours riding over very bad roads. The same evening addressed a meeting in the Presbyterian church, and next day found my way with some difficulty, owing to the Ferry-boat having ceased to run, and the ice, not being strong enough to bear—to Goldenville where a meeting was held. Both in Sherbrooke and in Goldenville collections were taken amounting in all to \$24.70. Next two meetings were held in connection with the Ladies Bibie Society, Glenelg; the first a small one in the School-house, Glenelg; the second a large one in the School-house Lochaber Lake. Subscriptions will be taken up at an early day and forwarded. The labours of the week were ended by meetings in Lower, and Upper Caledonia, netther of them largely attended. Some subscriptions were paid and more will be obtained.

Came on next week to Musquodoboit, on the evenings of Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday held meetings in the School houses of Upper Musquodoboit, the Flat, and Middle Muequodoboit. The attendance at all the meetings was small. Some subscriptions were obtained, and more will be secured.

On Friday, December 31st, came on to Halifax, to arrange finally about lists for Report.

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Since the 11th of November, I have in prosecution of my work travelled by rail, coach, or private conveyance 825 miles, walked 94, addressed 29 meetings in 24 different places, and obtained of subscriptions, &c., \$410,32.

Another year of Bible Society work has now terminated. Looking back over the past twelve months, I would say, as I have often had to say before—"Hitherto hath the Lord helped me." Through a year of (perhaps) the hardest labour I have performed, a Gracious God has preserved me. Helped by Him, (in this Province, and in New Brunswick together) I have travelled 4261 miles, sailed 1037, walked 657, addressed 201 meetings in 166 different places. Often weary in my work, never weary of it—without one day's sickness during the past twelve months, I have been enabled to engage in it. To Him who has so often led me in ways I knew not and in paths I had not trodden, and amid some discouragements granted very much to cheer and sustain me—to Him be all the praise and the glory.

TO THE COMMITTEE OF THE HALIFAX LADIES' BIBLE ASSOCIATION, AND THE NOVA SCOTIA AUXILIARY BIBLE SOCIETY:

Having returned from New Brunswick about the middle of March, on Friday, 1st of April I resumed my labour in Nova Scotia, by holding a meeting in Clifton, Rev. Mr. Bayers presiding. Though the roads were bad the meeting was well attended, and the interest manifested, on the whole encouraging. Next week on my way to Halifax went through Musquodoboit, and held meetings in Little River, Meagher's Grant, and Musquodoboit Harbour. Neither of these meetings were large. Reached Halifax on Thursday,

and spent the two following days taking stock of the Bibles and Testaments in the Depository. Attended the quarterly meeting of Committee. Next day went to Truro, where, in the evening I attended the Annual Meeting of the Branch. The President, J. F. Blanchard, Esq., was in the chair, and several of the ministers of Truro took part in the proceedings. Next day went to Lower Stewiacke. In the evening attended and addressed a Bible Society meeting in the Presbyterian Church. Rev. Mr. Hare in the chair. The three remaining days of the week were employed visiting the other Branches in Stewiacke; meetings were held in Springside Village, and Middle Stewiacke. In each place these meetings were encouraging.—Springside had recently sent on its Annual Contribution. In the Village \$30.00, and in Middle Stewiacke above \$20.00 were handed me.

Next week, meetings were held in part of Hants County. On Monday evening at Five Mile River, on Tuesday evening at Maitland, on Wednesday at Lower Selmah, Thursday at Noel, Friday at Walton, and Saturday at Chiviree. In the greater part of these places our gatherings were on the whole good, and the interest exhibited cheering. Maitland (with which Branch Five Mile River and Lower Selmah are connected) always does well. Noel has been rather behind, but there are signs of improvement. Walton was better than previously. In Chiviree while the attendance was large the subscription was small. — But it is hoped Collectors will gather up something more.

On Monday, went to Kennetcook (Burlington). Here a better meeting than had formerly been obtained was held in the Wesleyan Church. Next day was ferried across the river and walked to Avondale. At night addressed a large meeting in the Basement of the Wesleyan Church—a collection was taken and handed me, and efforts will as usual be made to gather up subscriptions.

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Presbyterian Church, Newport. The interest taken in our cause here is encouraging. Next day kindly taken by J. F. Cochrane, Esq., to Rawdon, addressed in the evening a small meeting there. The President of our Branch there, Rev. Mr. Bowman, had left, but his successor, Rev. Mr. Willers, who was elected President of the Branch, attended the meeting and took part in the proceedings.

Next evening addressed a very small meeting in Windsor. It was disheartening to see the little interest taken in the Bible cause by this flourishing place.

I had intended crossing from Windsor to Parrsboro' on Saturday 30th April, and had some ten days previously written to this effect—appointing a meeting for Parrsborough on the Saturday evening. But I learned (what I was unaware of when I wrote) that no steamer crosses this season from Windsor to Parrsboro'. There was no help for it, so I returned to Truro, and (having previously written to the various Branches explaining the changes) went to Londonberry. Held meetings with both Branches there,—in Colly, De Bert River, Acadia Mines, Great Village, Portauisque and Bass River. At nearly all of these meetings the attendance was better than on former occasions. It appeared to me as if there was a deepened interest in religious matters. Things "unseen and eternal" seemed to engross more of the thought, and occupy a larger share in the conversation of the people than formerly. Hence (as it appeared to me) the increased interest taken in Bible Society work.

From Portauisque I was kindly forwarded by Mr. Walton to Economy. Here also the increased interest in the Bible Society was marked. When the first notice of my coming by way of Parrsboro' had been received the Collectors were immediately sent round, and nearly forty dollars of Subscriptions were waiting. In Five Islands where the next meeting was held the interest also was encouraging. About fifteen dollars was paid in at the meeting and more will be

collected and forwarded. Went on to Parrsboro'—general notice not having been given of the meeting the attendance was small.

Crossed in the packet to Windsor. After resting a few days, went to Hantsport where on Thursday evening, May 26th, I addressed a meeting chiefly of young people in the Baptist Church, Rev. Mr. Rand presiding. Collectors had been appointed last year, but nothing had been obtained. No one would undertake to make any effort,—a collection of \$0.62½ was taken and handed me.

Next meeting—also a small one—was held in Lower Horton. Some subscriptions were received and more will be obtained. Next meeting was held in the Reformed Presbyterian Church, Wolfville. It was well attended. At the close of my address a collection of \$9.35 (increased afterwards to \$10.60) was taken and handed to me. Immediately after the meeting in Wolfville rode over to Canard, and in the Presbyterian Church there addressed a pretty large meeting. Next evening a smaller one was addressed in Canning. From the Branch in East Cornwallis received \$38.75. Went on to Kentville, a fair attendance at our meeting in the Court house. Proceeded to Berwick. Here, and at Somerset addressed meetings—both better attended than those held last year.

Some subscriptions were received, and more are expected. Next meeting was held in Aylesford. In the Plains and at Factorydale, I addressed audiences on the work of the Bible Society. From that place above \$15 were received.

Proceeded to Wilmot—small gathering, and the meeting held the following evening in Nictaux Falls was not much larger.

Went on to Laurencetown. Here also the attendance was small. Next evening in Bridgetown, in the Wesleyan Church, there was the largest gathering I had seen here as a Bible Society Meeting. Besides the usual subscription (part of which is paid, and part

Went on to Annapolis. Our meeting in the Court-house was small.

Next day went to Hillsboro' (Bear River). Had a large meeting here; at the close of my address a collection of \$5.40 was taken, and next morning E. E. Tupper, Esq., obtained above \$14 of subscriptions.

Proceeded to Digby. In the school-room of the Wesleyan Church our meeting was held, and from the spirit evinced as the result of the stirring appeals of Rev. Messrs. Armstrong, Brown, Taylor and others, I anticipate a larger subscription than was obtained last year.

Next day went to Weymouth. In the evening addressed a small meeting. Not much interest taken. About an hour after its close I was on the coach on my way to Yarmouth, which place was reached in the morning. In the evening addressed a meeting in the Kirk, the President, Dr. J. G. Farish, in the chair. Rev. Messrs. Christie and Prince, with T. M. Lewis, Esq., also took part in the proceedings. Accompanied by Mr. Lewis, who has never failed me, spent part of three days collecting subscriptions. We obtained upwards of \$100, and I expect about \$30 additional will yet be received. The Ladies Society there maintains its efficiency. There are many warm-hearted friends of the Bible Society in this thriving town.

Went on to Barrington. Down the Passage and at the Head meetings connected with both Branches were held. The latter meeting, owing to the stormy evening, was thinly attended. Next meeting was in Clyde River. It was small. A collection of \$3.50 was handed me.

Went on to Shelburne. Small meeting—the smallest I ever held in the Kirk. But the two days follow-

ing, accompanied by Mr. Irwin, I obtained larger subscriptions than I had the previous year, and more I expect will yet be forwarded.

On Monday morning, June 24th, left Shelburne for Mill Village. In the evening I spoke to a small meeting. Next evening addressed a larger one in Liverpool. From that Branch I received about \$18 and \$20 for the Spanish fund.

On Wednesday went to Milton. Addressed a good meeting in the Baptist Church, and next day accompanied by Hon. Mr. Tupper, gathered up about \$30 subscriptions. The following evening addressed a meeting, chiefly of young people, in the Congregationalist Church, Brooklyn. Returned after the meeting to Milton.

Next morning went on to Caledonia, in which place, and in Maitland, Annapolis County, brought before pretty large audiences the claims of God's word.

Went on to Annapolis. Took the train for Halifax. Attended the Quarterly Meeting of the Committee, and the Thursday after went on by steamer to Port Hood to visit the Branches in Cape Breton. The meeting in Port Hood proved a failure. Some few subscriptions were received, as well as payment of the purchase account.

Went on to Mabou. The first meeting appointed proved a failure, owing to the want of an opportunity to make sufficiently public the notice of my coming. Another meeting—a pretty large one—was afterwards held. Collectors are to go round at an early day.

Went from Mabou to Margaree. In the Congregationalist Church, and in a school-house up the Big Intervale, I had opportunities of presenting the claims of God's word. A subscription was opened above \$6. More will be collected and forwarded.

I had to employ one to take me from Margaree to Baddeck, from the latter place went by steamer "Neptune" to Whycocomagh. I had written to the President of the Branch more than a fortnight pre-

viously, but no notice had been taken. I had written to the school-house. Left next morning, reached in the evening. Large meeting held. Mr. Jost in the evening were received. Took the steamer. Addressed the folks in the Presbyterian Church. Increased after the meeting. Addressed a meeting in T. H. Porter, received and returned. Took the steamer. Hence by stage. viously, but he had been for months away. Hence no notice had been given of my visit. I went to the school-house and intimated a meeting, but none came. Left next morning for Sydney, which place was reached in the afternoon. In the evening addressed a large meeting there in the St. Andrew's Church, Rev. Mr. Jost in the chair. About \$24 of subscriptions were received.

Took the steamer next morning to Cow Bay. Addressed the following evening a large meeting in the Presbyterian Church, \$12.50 of a collection was taken, increased afterwards to \$15.75. Next evening addressed a meeting in the Bethel, North Sydney, Rev. T. H. Porter, presiding. Some subscriptions were received and more will be obtained.

Took the steamer next morning for West Bay, thence by stage to Hawkesbury, where a small meeting (owing to defective notice) was held. Returned after the meeting to West Bay.

Proceeded to Baddeck. Here, on the whole, an encouraging meeting—the last I held on the Island—was obtained. Left Baddeck next day, and came on via Whycocomagh to Pictou, Truro, &c.

From the 1st of April until the present date (15th August), I have, in prosecution of my work, travelled by rail, coach, or private conveyance 1,889 miles, walked 204, sailed 394, addressed 81 meetings in 71 different places, visited 56 Branches and obtained of subscriptions, and on purchase account, \$935.07.

I have nothing further particularly to add. There, I think, on the whole, steady progress making. In the corresponding four and a half months of last year, visiting the same Branches—\$827.81½, a larger sum than I had ventured to anticipate, had been received. The receipts this year shew an increase of \$107.25½. My visits are welcomed, and very soon the wish is expressed—"Well, we hope to see you round again next year." As heretofore, much personal kindness and hospitality have been shewn me, diminishes

thereby the expenditure that would otherwise have been incurred. From the 16th of April, I have had through the kindness of Mr. Taylor, a free pass over the Nova Scotian Railway; and last season Captain Beattie generously gave me a free passage all the trips I went with him in the "Neptune." All this is encouraging, I feel it so, and would render the praise to Him whose work I am trying to advance.

TO THE COMMITTEE OF THE HALIFAX LADIES' BIBLE ASSOCIATION, AND THE NOVA SCOTIA AUXILIARY BIBLE SOCIETY :

About the end of last October, on my way back from New Brunswick, I remained some time at Amherst, and addressed a meeting in connection with our Branch there. The audience was not large, but the interest taken was encouraging. At that meeting and next day, above \$22 was paid me. More will be collected and forwarded.

From Truro came to Halifax; went on Saturday, November 11th, to Lunenburg. On Monday evening I addressed a pretty large meeting in the Presbyterian Church; Daniel Owen, Esq., presiding. Within ten minutes after the close of my address, about \$40 were subscribed, and more than half of it paid. The balance, with some additional subscriptions, Stephen Finch, Esq., and I gathered up next day. *No one who was asked to contribute refused.* A young lady who has often labored in the good work, collected after I had left, \$8. Altogether in Lunenburg upwards of \$64 were received, besides \$25 for the Spanish fund from the gentleman who had gone round with me.

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nesday and Thursday at Kinsburg, and Cross Roads pretty good meetings were held; Rev. D. McMillan presiding. Small collections were taken, and subscriptions will be obtained and forwarded.

Next day crossing the LaHave river, walked on to Petite Reviere. A small meeting was obtained in the school-house that evening; Rev. Mr. Sprague presiding. A subscription was opened and collectors were to go round. Next meeting was held at Bridgewater; Rev. Mr. Bowers presiding. The evening was unfavorable and the audience consequently small; but that day, and the following, accompanied by Andrew Gow, Esq., about \$20 of subscriptions more than had been received last year was secured—\$52.70 in all.

Kindly taken at night by Rev. Peter Morrison to Mahone Bay, I addressed a small meeting there; Rev. Mr. McNab presiding. About \$10 of subscriptions were paid, and more will be collected and forwarded.

Went on next morning, under a pelting storm, and in an open coach to Chester. The remainder of the week meetings were held in Chestertown and at the Basin. Our first meeting in Chester, owing to a stormy evening, was small. Another held on the evening of "Thanksgiving Day" was more successful. The meeting in Chester Basin, partly owing to a change in the hour—partly owing to the notice not being widely circulated, was small; but a larger one was addressed by the Rev. Mr. Skinner who, now, as he always has done, aided me much.

Returned to Halifax; attended the annual meeting; spent some time preparing lists, &c., for the coming Annual Report.

Went on to Antigonishe. Addressed the largest, and in some respects, the most interesting meeting I had ever been privileged to hold there. Besides \$22.90 of a collection at the meeting, a friend—by no means a rich man—said to me, "I never gave so much as I should to this good work—here is something"—handing me a handful of silver and cents, all

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I believe he had in his pocket—there were \$2.50. Another who had given liberally at former visits, but who, I believe, contributes *now* from a new motive, said—“I went to the meeting resolving to give \$2 to the collection, but after I heard your address I felt convinced I ought to give \$4, and (handing me a four dollar bill) here it is.” At a prayer meeting, before the exercises had commenced, said another, “I don’t know why I went to the meeting last night without any money, I did not intend to do so, but”—putting his hand in his pocket and handing me \$2—“here is my contribution.” The \$22.90 of a collection had from these and another contribution, increased to more than \$32, all handed me without the slightest hint given, and all I believe given from love to Christ and to his word. It is pleasing to receive contributions in this manner, and during the past year more than in any previous one—it has been my “hap” (as John Bunyan would say) thus to receive them.

Left Antigonishe about Dec. 5th, in an open carriage for Guysboro’, which place I reached—almost chilled with cold—next morning about sunrise. I had arranged for a meeting that night in Manchester, but a severe storm made it utterly impossible to hold it. During the remainder of the week very encouraging meetings were held in Cape Causo and in Guysboro’. Nearly \$40, partly old—partly new subscriptions were received, and more will be procured. The Ladies’ Association in Guysboro’ had sent on their annual contribution, and from the other society I obtained above \$20.

From Guysboro’ went on to St. Mary’s. Here a week was spent holding meetings in Lower and Upper Caledonia, the Forks, Sherbrooke, and Goldenville. All of these meetings, with the exception of those held in Caledonia, were good. Those in Caledonia would have been much better had the notices sent on been more widely circulated. In all these places subscriptions or collections were received. In Caledonia,

Left Sherbrooke on Monday evening, Dec. 19th, and after travelling all night in an open carriage over roads, parts of which were rough as a ploughed field, reached New Glasgow about nine next morning; came on to Truro; next day proceeded to Halifax, arranged remainder of subscription lists, and put the whole into the hands of the printer. Returned to Truro, and on Tuesday 27th December, returned again to Halifax. Addressed a meeting in the basement of St. Matthew's Church on the work of the Bible Society. A collection was taken for the benefit of the Ladies' Society in connection with the Bible women's work.

During the past two months in prosecution of my work I have ridden 1266 miles, walked 75, addressed 31 meetings in 23 different places, obtained of subscriptions, &c., \$506.72.

During the year 1870 I have been enabled to travel in every County of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. In each County of the former Province I have addressed meetings in connection with the Bible Society. In all the Counties of Nova Scotia, with the exception of Pictou where our Auxiliary has no Branch, and in Richmond where there is no Branch of any kind, meetings have been held. In connection with my work I have ridden by rail, coach, or private conveyance 6,021 miles, sailed 1,085, walked 491, addressed 220 meetings in 183 different places.

Through the whole year, and so far as labor is concerned, it has been the busiest I have spent, without one day's interruption from sickness. God my Saviour has protected, guided, and blessed me, cheering me with indications in many places of increasing interest taken in the circulation of his own blessed word. To Him be all the praise and glory.
