THE BANKING BILL
There seems to be a great deal of opposition to the government's banking bill generally, by those who think with one of the great Canadian banking institutions, the Bank of Montreal.

It is not unlikely that it will be passed in something like its present form, and an opportunity will be afforded during the next ten years of thoroughly testing the soundness of the views which have been put forward by the bankers for the purpose of retaining the present system.

It is well, however, to remember that a very considerable portion of the difficulty in regard to the banking bill has been directly the result of the acts of women themselves. So long as it is not

THE ALLEGED EXODUS
We observe that the Telegraph this morning is returning to its old system, writing articles on the alleged exodus from the Maritime Provinces. It quotes the Boston Journal in declaring that there came from points east of Vancouver, over the Maine boundary by railroad alone in 1888, 28,889 passengers, the majority of whom were seeking employment in the States.

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From the Capital.
OTTAWA, March 23.—Hon. C. H. Tupper, minister of marine and fisheries, arrived here from Washington today. Since Wednesday he has been suffering from a severe sore throat, contracted from sewer gas entering his room at the hotel he was staying at in Washington. He is, however, much improved in health, although very weak. In conversation tonight he said he did not go to Washington in a diplomatic capacity, but simply for the purpose of assisting Sir Julian Pauncefote in any way that was possible to do so in connection with matters concerning which his department was particularly or special knowledge.
