BRITISH MINERS TAKE STRIKE VOTE.

Delegates of the Miners' Federa tion met in conference on Friday to consider the Government's reply to consider the Government's reply to their demand for reduction of 14 shillings and twopence per ton in the selling price of coal and two shillings per shift increase of wages per adult miner. Smillie, the federation's precident, had returned a blank refusal to their claim and this conference would be required to decide the next step. By 168 votes against 3, a resolution was passed ordering the executive to make this issue the subject of a strike ballot of all coal fields, the minority representing the view that the demand for a decrease in the selling price of coal should be dropped and a claim for four shillings wages advance substituted.

Ballot papers will be returned by anyout 20th, and as a bage strike majority is certain, a national stoppage of the coal mining industry will commence on expiration of 14 days notice from the day the ballot is complete. It was also decided to ask the two other parties to Sectional Union of Railwaymen and the Transport Workers' Federation, to co-operate with the minere in event of a national stoppage. Finally, the conference strongly recommended their members to vote in favor of a strike.

RECORD OF PROGRESS.

WITH the closing of the Convention of the International Typographical Union, held at Albany, N.Y., last week, an opportunity is effered through the actual presentations of the reports to prove conclusively that the past year has, from the point of success, been the banner period of the organization's existence. From whatever angle this deduction is reached the justification is forthcoming, whether from a resume of Presilent Scott's records or increased membership and financial gains as given by Secretary-Treasurer Hays, the story is one of unprecedented success, and pride in membership thereto should be the lot of every individual card carrier.

The financial report shows that the mortuary fund increased to \$288,486.66, and the old age pension fund an increase of \$245,393.39, placing to the credit of the latter fund on May 31, 1920, a total of \$986,859.76. With such a surplus and recommendation from the financial officer, the convention delegates preached and acted progress, reducing the pension age from 65 to 60, and an \$8 a week pension to all members taking advantage of this fund, having twenty years of continuous affilia-tion. The old age fund has been aptly termed a "teartrying pension," and this splendid branch of the union's service paid to its old-timers, numbering 1,510, for the past twelve-month term the sum of \$3,022,449.00. Another record was established in membership growth, with 71,849 members in good standing, an increase of 5,742 for the twelve-month term. CALIFORNIA WOMEN BENEFIT BY MINIMUM WAGE LAW.

Many thousands of women en

In its findings the commission sets the least wage adequate to supply to women and minors employed in industry the necessary cost of proper living at \$16 per week. The commission has also established a standard for conditions of employment for the comfort, health and safety of employes and they are vested by the state Legislauge with power to emforce these regulations, and to inflict a benalty for violation.

The scales of wages and hours

commission or bonus must equal minimum.

No person may employ a woman in any occupation at less than 23 1-2 cents per hour, or minor at less than 25 cents per hour, except fearners whose time of apprenticeship is provided for. No employer may construct tips or gratuities as being part of the legal minimum wage.

Records must be kept of all employes for a period of one year, also the printed schedule of wages prepared by the commission regarding wages and hours and the conditions of sanitation must be posted in a conspicuous place in the workroom, violation of any of its provisions will constitute a misdemeanor. The Industrial Weilare Commission exercises exclusive jurisdiction over questions arising as to the administration and interpretation of the wage regulation.

Fair Rates To Pay Fair Wages



"The national industrial conference board, composed of a score of manufacturers' associations, recently conducted a nation-wide investigation of profit-sharing, wage bonuses, stock selling to employes and other plans, and in its report said this:

"Profit-sharing is no panacea. It is no solution of the wage problem."

"Profit-sharing is no panacea. It is no solution of the wage problem." The report advised employers that efforts along this line would not result in establishing permanent satisfactory relations with the workers and that their efforts might better be turned in other directions.

"Out at the harvester works an employe is free in one respect, and one only. He is free to quit his job. But if he shows any marked activity in agitating a change of the conditions fixed for him by the company, he may be denied this one opportunity. If the boss gets to him first he may be relieved of the necessity of quitting. In that case he is separated from his job and the profits from his labor stay with the company."





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
