

None of the territorial claims of Belgiun have been granted, except that for Malmedy in Rhenish Prussia, short distance south of Aix la Cha pelle, the population of which be fore was largely Walloon. Malmedy will revert to Belgium. The erritory on the left bank of the Scheldt river and Maastricht and the Limburg penisula are not mentioned in the terms.

Of the \$500,000 already men ioned as an immediate financial indemnity for Belgium more than half the amount has merely been placed to Belgium's credit in allied ountries as part repayment of war loans. No provision has been made for the recall by Germany of the six billion marks which were left in Belgium and now are lying in Belgian banks and vaults, bear ing no interest and unproductive, as the circulation of the mark in Belgium is not permitted. 


