STILL ASHORE. LONDON, Feb. 21.—The Canadian Pacific's Atlantic line str. Lake Michi-gan, Capt. Owen, from St. John, N. B., Feb. 5, for London, which collided with the British bark Matterhorn Fri-day last, is still ashore near Dungen-ess, in the Straits of Dover. A heavy wind is blowing, and if it continues it is feared that the vessel will become a wreck. Tags from Dover have suc-ceeded in getting water aboard for the cattle, but they were unable, owing to the heavy seas, to supply the Lake Michigan with pumps.
