

PORT ARTHUR SHIPS UNINJURED BY GUNS

Russians Opened Valves and Greased Guns

Examination Reveals That 203-Metre Hill Did Not Sink Them—Are Swelling Mikado's Fleet,

TOKIO, Aug. 22-It has been ascertained that the Russian warships at Port Arthur were not blown up or sunk by gunfire. The Russians opened the Kingston valves, having previously greased or otherwise protected the machinery and vital parts of the vessels. Evidently the capture of 203-Meter Hill exposed the ships to such danger that the Russians decided to danger that the Russians decided to sink them, pending the recovery of the command of the sea by the Baltic fleet. Their four battleships, one armored and one protected cruisef, will speedily form a serviceable addition to the Japanese fleet.



THE RUSSIAN CIVIL DISTURBANCE PART IN THE PEASANT'S

ulation. His first idea was to go outside of the empire proper, compelling
the conquered peoples of the non-Slavic
provinces to settle at the mouth of the
Neva. Finally, however, he made up
his mind to populate his city with the
peasantry of his own country. With
that end in view he permitted no one
who had ever lived in a Russian city to
dwell in St. Petersburg and filled his
town with country folk brought thither
by means of inducements or threats.
Thus it happens that the lower classes
of the capital, the descendants of the
rural pioneers, are still unlike those of
any other Russian city, especially those
of Moscow.

of Moscow.

Let it be borne in mind also that the Let it be borne in mind also that the Russian empire has the largest rural population of any country on the earth. It has been called "the biggest farm in the world," and the designation is not wide of the mark. It includes one-sixth of all the land upon the globe. In European Russia alone there are more than 80,000,000 peasants actively engaged in tilling the soil, the greater part of them with farming utensils as ancient as those mentioned in the Scriptures. Even in this enlightened age the Russian plow is little better

in recent years. Agriculture and all industrial pursuits have flourished amazingly, and the empire has supplied an excellent market. With the exception of the persecuted Jew, the Russian Pole has become more prosperous than any other of the czar's subjects. He has grown rich, while his brethren in Prussia and Austria are still in nor. has grown rich, while his brethren in Prussia and Austria are still in poverty. The war burden and industrial disaster may stimulate him to riot, but he is in no condition to accept sentiment as a cause for armed revolt. With the grand duchy of Finland the case is altogether different. One nose tells the ant whether it is in its own nest or that of an enemy; another nose discriminates between odors of ants of the same species, but of different colonies; a third nasal or-gan serves the purpose of discerning the scent laid down by the ant's own

the scent laid down by the ant's own feet, so that it may be able to retrace the way quite easily; a fourth nose smells the arvae and pupae; the fifth nose detects the presence of an enemy. If an ant be deprived of a certain nose it will live peaceably with enemies, but if it retains its fifth nose it will fight the aller to the death. These will fight the alien to the death. There is a difference in the functions of nose one and nose five, although they ap-

pear to be somewhat alike.

The first four—named Io, Europa, Ganymede and Calisto—are so large and so well defined that they are of immense use to the practical astronomer as fixed points from which to make calculations involving distance and direction. The first, second and fourth are about the size of the moon, but much lighter. The third satellite, Ganymede, has a diameter and weight about one and a half times those of the moon, with three times her bulk.

The two lesser satellites located by the watchful California scientists are in several particulars strikingly like the members of the great family of asteroids which have their orbits within the orbit of Jupiter and outside that of Mars. It has been suggested that these asteroids are the fragments of some great planet which exploded during the early days of the solar system. 
