

EARTHQUAKE SHOCKS FRIGHTEN FRANCE

Eight Persons Killed When Houses Gollapsed

Violence Greatest Near Toulon Where Warships Were Torn From Moorings -Two Separate Shocks.

MARSEILLES, June 12 — Two earth shocks running from northeast to southwest were felt through the Riviera between 9 and 11 o'clock tonight. While the damage done here was not great, reports from smaller cities show that the effects of the second shock were serious.

At Lambeso, a town of 2,500 inhabitants, twelve miles northwest of Aix, several houses collapsed and eight persons are reported to have been killed. Several buildings also fell at Eugilles. The observatories report that the disturbances were very grave. Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must app ar in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.
