### REPORT

OF THE

### INDUSTRIAL ROOMS

FOR 1884-5.

The monthly meetings of this Society have been regularly held and well attended. Though nothing of a special nature has occurred during the year, a brief statement of the nature of our work may be interesting to those who are yet strangers to it. We aim at encouraging the poor to help themselves, by providing all grades of sewing for widows, women whose husbands are out of employment, and those who are dependent on their own efforts for support; as a consequence, during seasons of business depression, like the present, large quantities of material have been given out. Each week the homes of new applicants are visited, and their circumstances reported; cases of extreme poverty in this way often receive timely help. We would here tender sincere thanks to the members of St. Paul's, St. Andrew's and Emmanuel Church Ladies' Aid Societies, to the Ladies of the Cathedral and Miss Allan, of the Y.W.C.A. for help in the visiting.

The usual Christmas tea, to which women employed during the year are asked, took place on the 23rd December, and a bountiful table was spread. After tea the Rev. J. G. Norton, J. Edgar Hill and J. Barclay addressed the women, hymns were sung, and all dispersed, seemingly well pleased with the entertainment provided.

For the disposal of the women's work a special sale was held in December at the rooms of the Natural History Society, realizing \$874.85; also the annual bazaar on the 17th and 18th

March at the same place, which brought in \$2,676.23; at these sales a quantity was most excellent needlewerk, though a large proportion was necessarily of a coarse nature, many of the employees not being competent to do fine sewing. This year, though thankful for the measure of success these sales met with, there still remains a very large stock of coarse work, which could be made good use of by some of our charitable societies.

We take this opportunity of asking, those who have not yet helped us, to pay a visit to the Rooms, which are open each day till 5 p.m., Saturday excepted, when they close at noon, and where a supply of all varieties of underwear is constantly on hand. Mrs. Milne, our excellent manager, being in charge; she is aided by the ladies of the Executive Committee, who are most diligent in the troublesome task of arranging and examining work, and keeping of account and stock books.

The total number of women employed during the year is 145, and \$4,242.76 has been paid them for sewing.

### CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS.

### NAME.

This Committee shall be called "The Ladies' Committee of the Industrial Rooms, and of the Protestant House of Industry and Refuge."

### OBJECT.

The object of this Association shall be two-fold :-

First,—As a Committee of the Industrial Rooms. (a). To provide employment in needlework to as many poor women as possible, in their own homes, irrespective of age, nationality or denomination. (b). To visit these women in their homes, and one morning in each week to hold a Mothers' meeting. (c). To sustain a Provident and Gratuity Fund, in order to encourage the workers to save their earnings, and to afford relief in extreme cases.

Secondly,—As a sub-committee of the Board of Management of the House of Industry and Refuge. To provide regular lady visitors, who shall inquire into the condition of the inmates regarding health, comfort, cleanliness and general well-being; and who shall make such suggestions, from time to time, as they may deem advisable for the greater efficiency of the institution.

### OFFICE-BEARERS AND COMMITTEE.

The Committee shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary and Assistant-Secretary, to be elected annually, and of members chosen from Protestant Churches of all denominations. There shall be a separate Executive Committee of the Industrial Rooms, consisting of a Lady Superintendent, and members chosen from the General Committee.

### MEETINGS.

The meetings of the General Committee shall be held on the first Wednesday of every month (unless there is good reason for a change), from October to May. The Annual General Meeting shall be held on the first week of April, at which Reports shall be received, office-bearers elected, auditors appointed, and such other business transacted, as the interests of the work may demand. All meetings shall open with prayer.

### DUTIES OF OFFICE-BEARERS.

The President or Vice-President shall preside at the monthly meetings, and preserve order thereat. In the absence of the President or Vice-President the Committee shall have the power to elect a substitute. The Treasurer shall have power to receive and take charge of the funds, and to deposit the same, in trust, for the Committee of the Industrial Rooms in one of the Savings Banks of the city. She shall also present an annual statement to the General Committee. The Secretary shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the meetings, prepare and present an Annual Report, and perform all necessary duties of her office.

### GENERAL COMMITTEE.

The General Committee (including President; Vice-President, Treasurer and Secretaries, of whom five shall form a quorum) shall have the general supervision of the affairs of the Association, with power to make such arrangements as shall increase the number, profit and interest of all its members. Anyone desiring to propose a new member shall give notice a month previous to election by ballot.

### SUB-COMMITTEE.

Sub-Committees may be appointed from time to time for particular objects.

### HONORARY MEMBERS.

Honorary members may be elected at any regular meeting by a two-thirds majority of the members present. They shall enjoy all the privileges of ordinary membership, except those of voting and of holding office.

### MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The Executive Committee of the Industrial Rooms shall meet every Friday morning at ten o'clock, for the purpose of giving out work, etc., and for the general transaction of business.

### LADY SUPERINTENDENT.

The Lady Superintendent shall have the responsibility of regulating and managing the details of the business of this department.

### MODE OF APPLICATION.

Any person desiring work, shall bring a letter of introduction from her clergyman, or from some other responsible person, and apply on Friday morning between the hours of ten and twelve.

### VISITORS.

All applicants shall be visited in their homes by ladies appointed to this work, who shall report on or before the following Friday, as to their need and circumstances, and these statements shall be duly registered.

### NOTE.

No alterations or additions shall be made to this Constitution, without notifying the Secretary of the proposed change; the said notice shall be given in writing, and shall be presented to the Committee at the next general meeting.
