How to retain our ministers, or how to draw men to us to supply the lack of laborers is a very grave question indeed. It merits and should save the mest serious commideration. For ourselves, we believe that it would jusy to have some arrange mean made by which churches needing means might be brought into communication with pasters who are available.
