



The astounding advances made by this famous athlete in baseball have furnished managers, owners, players and experts with an object lesson that threatens to overturn a lot of the traditions of the national game, and compel a radical change in existing and accepted methods.

If Thorpe keeps the promise he has given during the fall and winter, it will be a triumph for John McGraw far greater that the winning of a world's championship could be, and it will make him the greatest man of baseball—of all time. It will be a triumph for McGraw's method of developing baseball players.

Thorpe is the greatest athlete in the world. He has proved it at almost every style and kind of going. He won the all-round championship during the Olympic games. He had played some baseball, but was only a mediocre player, and a wretched hitter in school and in the little team with which he played and professionalized himself.

When the New York team signed Thorpe to play baseball it looked to many as if New York was merely putting over a press agent scheme. Thorpe earned his salary last season in advertising he gave the team. But McGraw evidently had other ideas. There is one thing about McGraw. If he has faith in a player he will stick to him longer than any other manager would. He calculated that Thorpe could run faster, throw harder, jump further and higher, and was stronger than any athlete in the world. With that material he set out to make a real baseball player.

Thorpe was an awkward fielder, erratic, a lunging, hard swinging, uncertain batter, and he had most of the faults that would be considered fatal ir young players. McGraw work ed patiently with the Indian and watched him. He was satisfied. Thorpe, he discovered, also had brailins, and the Indian was studying, watching the actions of others and adapting himself to certain methods of others.

Then the round-the-world trip started. Thorpe had the opportunity of watching different kinds of ball players, and he suddenly cut loose and commenced to execute the things he had seen the famous players do. 

## MILLINERY EXHIBITED A MARR'S OPENING TODAY

Contractor and Men Startled when Walls Fail to Fall-Blew Nice Hole

A few weeks ago the Salvation Army Metropole was gutted by fire. The three upper stories were completely gutted and the rear wall of the four story hytel fell out. The building has since been in a dangerous condition and as the Salvation Army has decided to rebuild on the site, the contract of gemoving the walls of the building was given to contractor Richard Dean. Yesterday afternoon about four o'clock, after Mr. Dean had the front of the building proped with scantling to prevent a fall, a man was engaged to blow out a portion of the northern wall with dynamite. It was not generaly known that there was to be an explosion and only the few persons who happened to be in the Vicinity at the time were aware of the fact. The dynamiters did not take very long to do their work. They made six holes in the brick wall on the northern side of the building and in each hole placed a stick of dynamite. The wires were attached and when all was ready the operator at the battery which was placed on Prince William street, pressed the button, there was a loud explosion but the walls of the old building did not even tremble. Cautiously the men employed to blow up the building, with the contractor and the citizens who were near, approached to see what damage had been done. Among those present were Building Inspector Carleton and Commissioner McLellan.

In every place where a stick of dynamite had been placed there was a hole about a foot in circumference blown out of the bricks, but the building was in no other manner damaged. There was considerable talk between the building inspector, the contractor and the men who handled the explosives, and it was finally decided to postpone further attempts at blowing the walls down.
