



When that Day Comes Austria Will Try to Conclude Separate Peace is Opinion-Big Russian Movement Expected at

Once.

London, March 23.—The size of the garrison at Przemysi and the number of men who surrendered to the Russians greatly exceeded all estimates. According to despatches received from Petrograd tonight the garrison originally consisted of 170,000 men, of whom 40,000 were killed. Just under 120,000 surrendered when the fortrees capitulated. Owing to the blizzard, which is interfering with telegraphic services to details of the surrender are coming through, but Lemberg reports that for seven days prior to the fail of the fortrees, the people of the town had nothing to eat, and the Russians, who took in large supplies of provisions, were welcomed as liberators.

TYPHUS AND CHOLERA.

Despatches from the same place say that fifteen thousand persons were found suffering from typhus or cholers, and that the work of dis-infecting the place is being energetically undertaken. The interior of the forts, it is said, were found intact, with a good deal of ammunition in

Everywhere in Europe, both inibelligerent and neutral countries, the greatest credit is given the Austrians for their long and stubborn resistance, which has greatly delayed and interfered with the Russian campaign in other directions.

campaign in other directions. Now that the Russians, whose numbers, like those of the Austrians, must have been greater than was heretofore understood, are no longer under obligation to invest this fortress, a big movement either against Craceow or in the Carpathians will doubtless be inaugurated. With their northern lines protected by the morass into which the greater part of Poland is converted during the spring months, the Russians are expect-ted to throw all their strength against the Austrians and attempt finally to cruck them to crush them.

CRACOW IN A MONTH.

Dne British military critic goes so far as to stake his reputation on the prophecy that Cracow will fail within the next month, and that when it does, or before, Austria will endeavor to conclude a separate peace. He is more optimistic than the majority of military critics here, who are of the opinion that the Austrians and Germans will likewise

who are of the optition that the Austrians and Germans will incluse make a great effort in the southern field, and attempt to prevent the Russians from crossing the Carpathians or reaching Cracow. Along the western front there have been a few attacks and counter-attacks, but nothing that in this war of big battles causes more than passing comment.

The juli in the Dardanelles continues owing to the unfavorable weather, which the Allies are taking advantage to effect repairs on the Gaulois, inflexible and other ships which suffered in the last bombardment.

BIG GUN FIRE.

Reports as to the effect of the big gun fire on the forts are contra-dictory, but one explanation of the fact that firing was continued from the land after the forts were presumably destroyed is that the Ger-mans had brought down howitzers, which were moved from place to place on rails.

The Turks have made another attack on the Suez Canal. A small force which crossed Sinai from Bir El Saba, having been observed op-posite Suez on Monday, the guns of the fortress opened on them. The Turks, who numbered one thousand, and were accompanied by three German officers, retired for about eight miles, where they were today attacked by a force under General Younghusband and were, according to the British official account, routed.

SUEZ IN EGYPT

PETROGRAD CLAIMS RUSSIANS CAPTURED 117,000 AT PRZEYMSL

Information furnished by late Conmander of Galician Fortress shows that Russian victory was most complete - Terrible conditions complained of.

Petrograd, March 23, via London, 7.55 p. m.—The Russian war office announced today that 117,000 men were captured at Przemysi. The statement from the war office follows: "According to figures given by General Kusmanek, late commander at Przemysi, the number of prisoners who surrendered to the Russians was 9 generals and 93 officers of the egneral staff, 2,500 officers and officials, and 117,000 men. The number of guns and other war material captured is being calculated." The lack of official details from Przemysi is said to be due to the heavy snow atorm that prevailed yesterday, and which broke down the telegraph lines.

CONDITIONS TERRIBLE.

CONDITIONS TERRIBLE. It is reported that nearly a quarter of the garrison had suffered with typhold and sourvy. Although the rations were growing more and more limited, none but a few of the higher officers, up to the end of January, knew that actual starvation was impending. The real condi-tion of affairs was learned by the troops when an aviator, who was starting with messages for Vienna, was shot down by the Russians and fell within the defenders lines. After that there was much grumbling in the garrison and almost a mutiny. Some of the Austrians slipped through the lines at night and aurrendered to the Russians. DRIVEN INSANE BY DISEASE

The Investing Russian forces increased the intensity of their bom-bardment and the strain on the defenders began to tell more rapidly during February. Many were rendered insane by privations and dis-ease. They filled every available place, but were without medical at-tention. The death list was very high. Civilian inhabitants, who had been unable to escape when the slege

Civilian inhabitants, who had been unable to escape when the slege began, swarmed about the forts begging food and refuge, but the com-mandent was unable to care for them. The death of two prominent generals in February from typhoid tended to weaken the determination of General Von Kusmanek, commander of the fortress. By the end of February, actual famine prevailed; scarcely a living animal was left. For weeks virtually the only sustenance was obtain-ed from small supplies of concentrated foodstuffs brought by aero-

planes.

A council of officers daily considered the situation, but not until they were convinced that there was no hope of help from an Austrian relief column did they reach the decision to surrender.
