NEW SYSTEM OF LICENCING TIMBER.

Proposed System to be adopted in granting Licences to cut Timber on Crown Lands, to continue in force for Five Years.

1. The applicant to file a Petition agreeable to the form A.
2. The sum of One Pound for every square mile comprised within the bounds described in the Petition, to be paid when the Petition is filed, towards meeting the expense of the Survey - the same to be returned, with the exception of Five shillings, if the petition be not complied with; and the external lines of the Berth to be extended, with all discharges of the petition be complied with - the petitioner furnishing assistance, for which 5s. per diem will be allowed for each man, the remaining expenses of the survey to be defrayed by the Crown.
3. In addition to the sum paid on filing the application, the rates of duty to be 2s. 6d. per ton, on Red Pine; 2s. per ton, on White Pine; 4s. per Thousand superficial Feet, on Mill Lumber; and 10 per cent. on the estimated value of all other descriptions of Lumber.
4. The applicant will be required to pay duty on a certain quantity of Timber or Lumber annually; such a quantity to be named by the Commissioner of Crown Lands, according to the extent of the Berth, but in no case less than 10,000 feet of Lumber, or 200 tons of Timber; one-fourth part of said duty to be paid on the 24th day of September, one-fourth part on the 24th day of December, and the residue on the 24th day of June following, and on the last mentioned day he must produce a satisfactory account of the quantity of Timber and Lumber manufactured upon and removed from the said Berth up to that period, and pay up all arrearage of duty thereon.
5. The applicant will be allowed to resign his Berth on any 1st day of May, by giving three months previous notice and producing certificates that the Timber is exhausted on the said Berth.
6. Persons wishing to obtain smaller quantities of Timber or Lumber may take out Licences under the present Regulations, but subject to the advanced rates of duty.
7. Bonds, with one or two sufficient Sureties, to be taken for the payment of the duty and for the due performance of the conditions of the Licence.

That he is a British Subject, and prays that a Licence may be granted him to cut Timber on the undermentioned Tract of Crown Land; such Licence to continue in force for the term of Five Years, from the 1st day of May, 1835 - and during the said term your petitioner pledges himself to pay the duty on not less a quantity of Timber than annually, unless the Timber becomes exhausted, when he will resign the Licence.

The mark he intends using to distinguish the Timber and Lumber is - And he as in duty bound will ever pray.

The Lion, which was presented by the Emperor of Morocco to the President of the United States, has been presented by him, in pursuance of the Resolve of Congress, to the Orphan Asylum of Washington and Georgetown. These institutions have offered him for sale by public auction; the sale was to take place on the 21st of this month.

There are about 3000 dram shops in the city of New York. Their licences bring in to the city \$30,000. The public tax for the support of criminals and paupers, amounts to about \$300,000. - The number of vagrant paupers and criminals, committed in 1833, was 30,395.

The French are building a steam navy - Five vessels of 150 horse power are already completed, and six more in a state of forwardness. At the end of the present year is expected they will have a steam navy of 24 vessels, with the aggregate power of 3172 horses.

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Six Months in a Convent.

We understand that Messrs. Russell, Odiorne & Co. of this City, have in press and will very soon publish in a handsome volume the narrative of Miss R. T. Reed, a highly respectable young lady of this city, who two or three years since was induced to become an inmate of the Ursuline Convent in Charleston; but who after a residence there of five or six months, became unhappy and found means to effect her release and return to her friends. We are told that she has not attempted any logical argument for or against the institution; - that she has not indulged in any harsh language or abusive epithets, nor aimed at a display of elegant composition; but in a plain and simple manner, she has told the story of what she saw, and heard; and was required to do while within the walls of the cloister. Convents hitherto, in this country, have been literally shrouded in secrecy. None but the inmates are ever allowed to witness their ceremonies; and no one who assumes the veil is ever permitted to report to her friends what transpires within the secret place. This first attempt, then, to present an accurate picture of the interior of the establishment whose wanton destruction has caused so much excitement in the community, will it is presumed receive from all classes, the welcome it deserves, and be duly appreciated by an inquiring public. - Boston Traveller.

We are happy to hear that GEORGE DALRYMPLE Esq. has been elected Speaker of the Assembly of Prince Edward Island. We derived much pleasure from a brief acquaintance with that gentleman, who accidentally visited Sydney, Spring before last; and admired him for his intelligence and bland manners. - Cape Bretonian.

New-Brunswick. PROVINCIAL PARLIAMENT. HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

An Act to authorize the GRAND JURORS of the several counties within this Province to inspect the PUBLIC ACCOUNTS. - Whereas it is desirable that full publicity should be given to the accounts of the receipts and expenditures of public monies within the several counties in this Province with a view to prevent abuses therein.

1. Be it enacted, by the Lieutenant Governor, Council and Assembly, That once in each year at the General Sessions of the Peace in each County at which Parish Officers are appointed, it shall be the duty of the Justices at such General Sessions to cause a full, detailed and particular account of all the Receipts and Expenditures of public monies within such County for the past year to be laid before the Grand Jury for their inspection and examination; and such Grand Jury may make such representation and presentment to the Court thereupon as to them shall seem meet.

2. And be it enacted, That this act shall continue and be in force until the first day of April which will be in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and forty.

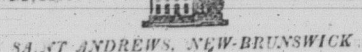
