DISTRESS IN EUROPE

British Empire Effort to Help Smaller Nations.

Canadian Red Cross to Organize Appeal on Behalf of Orphan-Orphan to Be Made in Armistice Week.

An urgent appeal for aid to combat the widespread disease and distress in the war-stricken areas in Europe has been made by the League of Red Cross Societies to the nations which have suffered least from the war. In response a War Relief Fund has been undertaken in Great Britain with an Empire-wide appeal for contributions. The Fund is under the immediate patronage of His Majesty the King and has the support of all parts of the Empire.

His Excellency, the Governor-General of Canada, having received communications from London upon this matter, consented the Prime Minister, and with his approval referred the question to the Canadian Red Cross Society, and it was arranged for an appeal to be made in Canada during Armistice week in November. The Fund will be known as "The British Empire War Relief Fund."

To Make Known the Need.

The Canadian Red Cross Society organized this appeal in Canada only in view of the reticent circumstances of the war-stricken areas to help to alleviate the terrible suffering of a large number of people. The ravages are numerous and compelling. Large populations are suffering from distress and disease. Millions of innocent children are orphaned. Even in time of peace great numbers of their people find close to the bread line. The war drained them of all their surplus resources. Through the years of strife they were denied but the bare necessities, and their condition now is pitiful indeed. Millions are in want of food. The diseases which took such fearful toll of human life after the Thirty Years' War, the Napoleonic War (1792-95), and the Napoleonic Wars are again widespread, and now there are millions of children in Galicia, Poland, Jugoslavia and Roumania who, in addition to being poverty stricken, are in the direst misery and despair on account of disease. In some twelve countries, most of which were either Allies or friendly to the Allied cause, modern civilization is faced with the inevitable consequences of a war through partial famine and pestilence.

A Previous Epidemic.

That the epidemic is now one of alarming proportions and terrible in its effect may be noted from the following statistics: "At present the worst results of epidemics are confined to Galicia, where the epidemic disease typhus is a standing, and acute life is evaded. The whole community is faced with starvation, whilst the absence of clothing and drugs makes it impossible for the authorities to make any headway against the epidemic. Here we have a country into which the idea of modern sanitation has never penetrated; for the most part there is no water supply in the smaller towns and villages, and whilst the work of sewers is done by open gutters running through the streets. There are no doctors, and no hospitals, and the miserable typhus-stricken patients lie unattended on the bare floor. The crowded rural districts where families exist in miserable one-roomed huts, their diet consisting of potatoes, and most of the time, and in many instances where families are crowded with the disease, and are perforce left to die unattended."

Many Communes are Suffering.

What is said of Galicia is true of other countries of Europe, such as Belgium, Lithuania, Latvia, huge territories of the Ukraine, Soviet Russia, Jugoslavia and Czechoslovakia. Nor is typhus the only affliction. Tuberculosis, smallpox, dysentery and relapsing fever are also ravaging large areas.

Lack of Medical Aid.

These terrible conditions have been called to the attention of the people of the British Empire in a statement by the Right Hon. Arthur J. Balfour, who, speaking for the Council of the League of Nations, says: "Men, women and children are dying by thousands, and over vast and civilized areas there are neither medical appliances nor medical skill sufficient to cope with the horrors by which we are faced. Governments have in certain cases done all in their power to bring relief, but there remains a vast field for charitable enterprise which can be dealt with only by voluntary effort."

Seven Million Orphans.

Dr. Livingston Farrand, chairman of the Central Committee of the American Red Cross, who has just returned from Europe, states that there are 11,000,000 fatherless children in Europe who face the next few years without hope of adequate care unless outside assistance is given.

For Suffering Children.

No stronger call would be made to humanity than that of suffering children, and on their behalf particularly the Canadian Red Cross will appeal throughout Canada during Armistice week. Each provincial division of the Red Cross will have charge of the arrangements in its own province, and all Red Cross workers should put themselves into touch immediately with their local branch or with the headquarters of the Provincial Division if no local branch is organized.



BARDON PETER WRANGEL

FIN SKETCH OF NEW RUSSIAN LEADER.

Canadian Airman Who Was Formerly a Well-known Long-range Fighter Gives His Impression of the Man Selected by the French as the Man Best Able to Oppose the Power of the Bolsheviks.

BARDON PETER WRANGEL is the man nominated by France to apply the Allied pressure against Bolshevism. A more capable man could not be chosen in Russia. Just before Denikin's final evacuation of South Russia, Gen. Wrangel had been relieved of his command, because he had dealt too severely with a looting officer who was also assaulting Denikin, and Collishaw's 47th Squadron, which had done most of its work under his command on the Volga river, gave him a dinner in Novorossk.

I shall never forget the splendid appearance Wrangel made at this dinner. A man over six feet three inches, coming to tower much higher with his huge Cossack fur cap, with piercing features, eagle nose, flashing eyes, he looked every inch a leader. Ruthless? Yes! but in a country where to be not ruthless, to stay the head of punishment, is to fall.

Dressed in his picturesque uniform of Don Cossacks, he made a speech of half an hour (through an interpreter), which he delivered in a way that was not without effect. To appreciate Wrangel, the impossibility of getting anything done must be borne in mind. The Russian is a naturally procrastinator and will promise indefinitely if not forced to act. Wrangel found that the surest way to secure promptness among the station masters along the railways, many of whom had Bolshevik tendencies, was to hang them from their own station. His fame soon spread and he was able to get troops trained with speed.

I happened to be in Skatostode when there was a conspiracy of some of the Khas Cossacks, to drive Denikin's adherents out of the state. Wrangel was present at the time. A secret meeting was a surprise to the leaders who captured the conspirators. The conspirators were taken to the front again.

At another time, when Wrangel was south of the Caucasus, he was near Tzaritsin and the town was impeded. Wrangel was sent for. He arrived in time to have a couple of his subordinate officers who were quarrelling over loot, and by the time he had checked the quarrel, the army and pushed them back in two days.

It is often asked, "How did Wrangel survive?" A glance at the map of the Crimea will explain. Landing in Theodosia with a few followers he was shortly in command of a considerable number of refugee officers and men. Happily he was able to re-equip at Theodosia from the British base there. In so long he had achieved the Crimea, which is sparsely inhabited, and could easily defend the narrow isthmus which joins the peninsula to the mainland against all the attacks of the Bolsheviks.

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

Burns, Mr. Peter Hythe and Fellow Workers of the Soldiers' Memorial Hospital; Pillow, Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Harker and family; Mrs. M. M. O'Sullivan; Mrs. J. H. Gray, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Harker; Cross, Mr. and Mrs. John Gillet. The remains were committed to their last resting place by Messrs. Chas. Alexander and John E. Reid of the Masons, Messrs. E. McEwen and A. E. O'Donnell of the Oddfellows, H. B. Burns and A. H. English his friends, Arthur Smith and Clifford Vye from his fellow workers. The services were Messrs. 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**AS CANADIANS**  
SEE AMERICANS  
William Stevens McNutt, in Collier's has an article on "As Canadians See Us." He got started on the article by meeting a business man who told him that the Canadians were boycotting American goods, so he interviewed New Yorkers who had business dealings with Canada. One of them told him that the United States in 1919 did business with all the countries of South America to the value of \$969,276,505, and the balance of trade was \$167,473,303 against the United States. With Canada, in 1919, the United States did business to the value of \$1,282,667,949, and the balance of trade as in favor of the United States to the amount of \$344,768,213. The United States sells more goods to Canada than to any other country in the world except Great Britain. These facts impressed Mr. McNutt and he interviewed others.

He met a travelling man just back from Canada, who said the Canadians hated the Americans, and that he had had a terrible time. Another on being told of this, exclaimed:

"I know just what happened. He went over to Canada and started to tell over again how America was the war. I'd bet anything that's what got him in wrong, and I wish they'd hanged him before he got back! It's fellows like him who have made it hard for all of us in Canada. Americans go up there and blab around how Americans won the war, and naturally the Canadians who were in the war for more than four years, hear it and get sore at all Americans."

Mr. McNutt decided to come over to Canada and see what the state of feeling is and he visited Toronto,

Ottawa, and Montreal. He finds that nearly all Canadians have been weary of the boastfulness and spread-eagles shown in American movie films in Canadian picture houses; that they resent the abuse directed against Great Britain in certain American newspapers; that there is no boycott of American goods, although there is a campaign under way urging people to buy made in Canada goods. Every Canadian he met resents the fact that the Canadian dollar is rated away below par in the American market. He hates to lose the exchange, feels it to be a dead loss, and in some way or other an injustice. In England people are familiar with the fluctuations of exchange; in Canada people are not, and as they are buying American goods all the time this discount on their own money is a constant annoyance.

The conclusion at which Mr. McNutt arrives is that the friendship between Canada and the United States will long out-last the friction. He thus advises Canadians "Be a little patient with the seeming American
