Cranbrook, B. C. Oct. 19.—Hon. W. L. MacKenzie King spent Thanksgiving Day on the final lap of his tour through British Columbia. He arrived here early last evening and his party ate their Thanksgiving dinner as the guests of Hon. Dr. King, Provincial Minister of Public Works and a number of prominent Liberals of the city and district, who had gathered to honor the head of the Liberal Party and his lieutenants.

At last evening's meeting, Mr. King was supported by W. S. Kennedy, M. P. for North Essex, and E. A. Lapointe, M. P. for Quebec East.

Mr. King confined himself to a criticism of the financial policy and methods of the present administrations at Ottawa. One of the causes of the present unrest was the extravagance in national methods of government, he said. He pointed to the fact that commissions without number are appointed and stated that during the present tour of British Columbia the sleeping car in which Mr. King and his party were travelling, was either sandwiched between or hitched behind a long array of private cars carrying various government officials about the country, an enormous expense to the taxpayers, who are looking for relief and not for additional burdens.

Paris, Oct. 19.—Members of the National Council of the French Miners' Federation will meet here Oct. 22nd to consider demands for an immediate advance in wages. The rate to be demanded is as yet unknown, but it is understood to vary between four and five francs per day. It is indicated the companies will be given a very brief time in which to answer and that in case of refusal a strike will be called.

Stewart and Henry Diotte, the successful opposition candidates were present. G. Earle Logan, St. John, and J. Allen

LeBlanc, Dalhousie, were also present for the opposition candidates. With one poll missing the vote stand: LeBlanc, 1,630; Hargrove, 1,632; LeBlanc, 1,666; Duncan, 1,400; Stewart, 2,112; and Diotte, 1,638. The missing poll, which is Elton, according to the unofficial returns, gives LeBlanc 15, Hargrove 14, LaBlanc 24, Duncan 12, Stewart 87, and Diotte 80.

During the count it was discovered that one poll in Durham gave Diotte ninety more votes than the unofficial returns.

The sheriff adjourned his court until Friday next at 2 p.m. when the returns from the Elton poll will be counted and Messrs. Stewart and Diotte, opposition, will be declared elected.

Arthur Culligan was elected chairman and speeches were delivered by all the candidates in both English and French. The speakers thanked the audience for their presence.

Ottawa, Oct. 19.—Wireless telephones, wireless telegraphy as well as aeroplanes would do more to open up Labrador than any other modern means of communication, according to Dr. Wilfrid T. Grenfell, the celebrated doctor-missionary of Labrador.

Dr. Grenfell stated here to-day that lack of communication during the winter months was one of the greatest drawbacks of the country. Aero-

planes have been successfully flown over portions of Labrador and aviators claim that the country is dotted with natural aerodromes. Wireless telephone and telegraphy also would be a great boon for the residents in the outlying districts of the country.

A most distressing accident occurred on Wednesday morning at 5.30 at Tide Head in which Mr. J. R. Fournier, son of Mr. Fabien Fournier of Val Brilliant, was the victim. Fournier was brakeman of train No. 24, going south, and as the train was pulling into Tide Head going at the rate of four miles an hour, got off upon the platform and slipped under the train. Both legs were cut off, the right between ankle

and knee and the left between knee and thigh. The victim was brought to Campbellton and removed to the Hotel Dieu hospital where everything possible was done for him, but without avail, passing away at 3:30 some three hours after the accident.

The train was in charge of Conductor J. DesChamplain with Engineer J. R. McKenzie at the throttle.

Deceased who was in his 33rd year, was highly regarded and much esteemed and the news of his untimely death will be heard with feelings of deep regret by a large circle of friends.

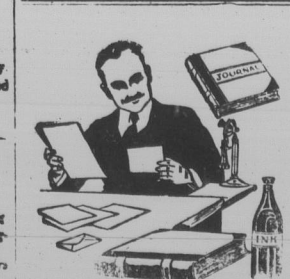

Great care is being taken of the guns, of which there are large numbers of all calibres, from Lewis guns to the biggest siege artillery. These are receiving proper attention, and a considerable amount of repair work is in progress.

mill is full of scientific instruments for wireless and other installations, and the laboratory is a gigantic museum of watches and clocks. Bicycles are also to be found by the thousand, many of them quite new.

The quantity of barbed wire is incredible. There is more than enough to fence the whole coast of England. Why this should be retained at a time when barbed wire is fetching three guineas a hundred

The thousands upon thousands of tents, camp kitchens, many uncovered and hose pipes, and miles upon miles of rope, hemp and other stores are also to be seen. In addition, there are lying idle boilers, engines and dynamos of enormous capacity. The switchboard is 90 feet long, the largest of the engines has 1,080 h.p.

Britain's Census Next Year.
The matter of next year's census already has appeared in Parliament, and in a few months we shall all be finding an interest in our decennial numbering of the people. Had we not been plunged into war we might have had a census in 1916, for there was a strong conviction in many quarters that, as the factors which cause fluctuations in population have greatly

The expense of a census in these islands usually works out at about 1d. a head. To be exact, the 1931 census cost £196,000, or £5 8s 8d a thousand of the population. We appear to do this more cheaply than some of our continental neighbors. In the Netherlands the census cost £7 2s 4d a thousand, in Norway £8

Our first census was taken in 1801, and it may be noted that at that time the total population of Great Britain was found to be 10,942,646. —Manchester Guardian.

Story of the Welsh Guards.

In his elaborate tribute to the history of the Welsh Guards, Major Dudley Ward, D.S.O., M.C., tells

relating to the mercenary major Humphrey Dene:
