He then proceeded to the Palace, and effected an entrance through one of the windows. He had not, however been there bong before he considered it unsafe for him to stay, as so many persons were moving about, and he left by the same mode as he entered. The next day, (Tuesday, about nine o'clock in the evening, he again effected an entrance over the wall on Constitution-hil, and by a window, in the same manner as on the previous night; and he went on to state that he remained in the Palace the whole of Tuesday night, the whole day on Wednesday, and up till one o'clock on Thursday morning when he was discovered under a sofa in her when he was discovered under a sofa. In her, Wajesty's dressing-room, as above described.
