For the Standard.
Mr. Editor,
Being on a visit to a friend in St. Stephen last week, I was not a little surprised to hear him, with two or three others, talk of a measure in that Parish, of dividing the County, setting apart a division of the County, setting apart St. Stephen, St. James, and St. David, as the new one, this I thought rather a singular and premature measure, as I felt satisfied the inhabitants of St. James had never been consulted, and I had some reason to doubt if those in St. David had, and subsequently I have ascertained they had not, and upon very close enquiry I find this scheme to have originated from a few clerical individuals in St. Stephen, who fancy they can foresee their own advancement and that of a few of their friends by the proposed division, forgetting the misery they must entail upon all others residing in those three Parishes, the building of a Jail and Courthouse are but the minor expenses we must incur, should this unfortunate scheme be carried into effect: the County, large as it now is, is much smaller than several others in this and the neighbouring Provinces, and we are hardly yet out of debt for the new buildings lately erected in Saint Andrews, one of which, (for I have never seen either,) I have been informed is by no means a credit either to the County, the Contractor, or the Committee for the building, the other, the new courthouse, I have heard very favourably spoken of. In conclusion, Mr. Editor, I will only add, that if the Petition, which I understand is to be presented by Mr. Boyd, at the ensuing sitting of the Legislature, for the payment of Petit Jurors, should become a law, all possible reason for the separation of the County will be removed, and even that all the inhabitants of this Parish, and I should suppose, those of St. David, would rather attend the courts in Saint Andrews, and pay their own expenses, than make themselves liable to the innumerable taxes which a separation of the County would entail upon us. In Mr. Brown, necessarily entail upon us, as regards his opposition to the proposed measure respecting St. Stephen, as he well knows the misery likely to ensue from it, and he also knows the strong opposition it would meet with from the reflecting inhabitants of his own Parish. St. Stephen, from which we have been separated, only a few years, has my best wishes for its prosperity, but I very much question whether those who now most warmly advocate the measure, would not, within five years, as deeply regret it.
