The Ceremosez broke over its bank at Wiznitz last night and ran in torrents through the streets of the village. Sixteen houses collapsed and many others were rendered uninhabitable, Eleven persons were killed by falling timber or were drowned in the flood. Scores of families had to flee for their lives.

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 5.—Reports from several cities of Asiatic Turkey say that several cities of Asiatic Turkey say that the cholera has appeared in many districts and is spreading rapidly. Along the lower Tigris and the Shat-el-Arab River, people are dying by the thousands. Whole villages have been deserted by those flee-ing from the pest. The panic has become so great that few families wait to bury their dead or even to nurse their sick, but flee to the next towns to escape the infection. The fugitives from stricken towns are apreading the epidemic with appalling apreading the epidemic with appalling rapidity. Letters from Bassora city say that 70,000 persons have fled from Bassora province alone.



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

THE KEARY INVESTIGATION.

When the prisoners Burke and Wilso were found guilty of killing Detective Phair, and before they were sentenced, the ADVERTISER made a strong plea in favor of sending such characters as they are to the penitentiary for life. Men with no visible means of support, who live by their wits and decline to give any information as to their antecedents, need to be closely watched. And, when they are arrested with loaded firearms or other murder ous weapons in their possession, as was the case with these prisoners, the executors of the law may rightly conclude that they are murderers as heart, and mean to kill any one who comes between them and their object. For these reasons Burke and Wilson, even if they had not been guilty of the murder of Phair, would not have been very harshly dealt with if they had been sent to the penitentiary for double the length of the term awarded them by Mr. Justice Street. To us, as to many others, it was disappointing that Judge Street, seeing he had to instruct the jury to bring in a verdict of manslaughter because of a defect in the evidence, did not give the prisoners a life sentence. But the judge in the exercise of his perogative, took a different view, and as we know him to be a man of unassailable char acter, it can only be suggested that his lenity came from a mistake in judgment.

A good deal of feeling has existed in the community with regard to the way in which the case was presented to the court. After a case has been tried, and the lawyers and judge have shown where its weak points were, it is easy to cavil at the authorities, and nothing is more common than to look around for a scapegoat on which to lay all the sins of omission and commission. The victim on this occasion is Mr. Keary, the police clerk. The evidence in his case has lready been given fully in the ADVERTISER. After listening to it, the council, by the casting vote of the mayor, has dismissed Mr. Keary in disgrace.

Mr. Keary has never had any very friendly feeling towards the ADVERTISER. He has invariably been found supporting the political cardidates to which this journal has given its opposition; but in the absence of all motive, and of Mr. Keary's regretful statement to a representative of the ADVERTISER the day after the trial, we should hesitate long before we would condema this old public a ervant to ignominy.

The condemned man has been blamed because, until such time as the case reached the court, and it was beyond his power to make amends, he withheld the one vital link in the chain of evidence against the prisoners. Had he any motive for so doing? No Had he any motive responsible person has alleged that he had. Neither the mayor nor any of the aldermen who voted with him have so contended. In fact, the chairman of the inquisitorial com-mittee that, after sitting in star chamber to discuss the matters at issue, brought in the condemnatory report, distinctly stated that he did not believe the police clerk willfully withheld the evidence. By the silence of the other members of the committee and of the council, we reach the nclusion that they agree in that view. Then it resolves itself at the worst into a case of mistaken judgment on Keary's during the part. Is it British fair play to discharge district! part. Is it British fair play to discharge an old public servant on his first offense for the wrong exercise of his judgment, even in so important a matter as this legal technicality regarding the value of evidence? If mistakes in judgment were to demand the vacation of office, the mayor and aldermen of Lon-don would have to hand in their resignations before nightfall, for they are not immaculate any more than the remainder

And while the mayor and nine aldermen arrived at the conclusion that dismissal in disgrace was the proper treatment of shortcomings in judgment on the part of Keary, they have regarded it as absolutely unnecessary to take any cognizance of what seems to be a greater "lack of head" on the part of his greater "lack of head" on the part of his superior officer. Chief Williams has deposed that in this important murder case he left the accumulation of evidence to Detective Rider. Mr. Rider is a capable officer, but there are many of us when think that it would not have been derogatory to the dignity of the chief of police to have taken in hand the compilation of evidence himself. In ordinary county cases, in which it is supposed that the city constabulary have little or no the city constabulary have little or no jurisdiction, Chief Williams has repeatedly jurisdiction, Chief Williams has repeatedly taken the accumulation of evidence into his own hand, and has worked up the prosecution with preserve the project of that description and the work of that description and the work of own hand, and has worked up the prosecution with praiseworthy ardor. But in this
most important ease the chief seems
to have been contented to let the
work of piecing the evidence together be carried out by his subordinate.
If he had not done so, if he had not believed

as we all did that the apparently over-whelming evidence against the prisoners was such that there was no loophole for them to escape, no inquiry into the murder

case would have been now necessitated.

We do not assert that t willfully fell short of doing his whole duty; on the contrary, we do not doubt that he conscientiously believed that nothing was left undone to secure the conviction of the murderers. But if his foresight had been as acute as the hindsight of the men who have sent his subordinate adrift in disgrace, he would not have left his case without the missing link that Keary is accused of having withheld. Let us prove our position. Two days after Phair was shot he made his will. He disposed of a considerable quantity of property. He deeded articles even as minute as his watch to children and to grandchildren. He kept up conversation for a considerable time and he finally signed the will. Now if Chief Williams had believed that it was a vital link in the chain of evidence necessary to convict the prisoners, he would surely have cautioned the friends of the family that before all this conversation took place it was absolutely necessary to have the wounded man answer three simple questions so that justice might be done. These questions would simply have been:

you see either of the prisoners committing a breach of the law?

Did Keary or any one else, to your knowledge, see either of them offending? Did you inform the prisoner Burke that you were an officer of the law before you

Does any one suppose that if these ques tions had been asked and answered, as it now appears they could have been asked and answered, there would now have been any occasion for condemning John M.

We do not accuse the chief of dereliction of duty, but we desire to show how easy it is, after the case is tried, to prove wherein every one connected with it, from the judge and the chief down, might have done better. It is left for the City Council, by the casting vote of the mayor, to say that the man with the least responsibility should alone suffer for these shortcomings. This is not an equitable decision, nor one that will commend itself to the fair-minded in the community. If, as now seems apparent, Keary's office was an unnecessary one, then the proper thing was to discharge him in the usual way, and not, for what is confessed to be at worst unintentional poor judgment, take away his hitherto

There is absolutely no excuse for longer continuing the canteen system, Intoxicating liquors are not necessary to promote the health or fighting qualities of soldiers, either regular or volunteer, as was proved by Gen. Wolseley in the Red River expedition. That distinguished soldier found that his men were able to bear greater hardships on the march by simple drinks of tea than if

they had been served with daily grog.
It is a shameful thing that the Government should cause unnecessary anxiety to the parents of many young fellows by throwing this standing temptation in their path Doubtless the London Congregationa Union, which meets in this city, will also condemn the practice. Indeed, the con demnation should be general, and if it were, the Government-indorsed canteen would speedily be a thing of the past.

PROFESSION AND PRACTICE

As many as 90 to 100 amendments are proposed many of the clauses, and every time it is proposed to accelerate progress by curtailing long-winded orations by small-fry politicians, Mr. Balfour and his coadjutors raise an outcry against "closure," though he and his friends themselves enacted that method of regulating discussion. There are, the cable informs us, about 1,500 mendments to the bill, most of them senseless under any circumstances, and all unnecessary if Lord Salisbury tells the truth that he is prepared to ask his servile majority in the hereditary chamber to throw it out, no matter how it is amended.

The truth seems to be that the Tories in the House of Commons desire to tire ou the members by persistent haggling over insignificant details of the measure. Their policy is delay. They know that so soon as the Home Rule Bill is sent to the Lords, the other reforms of the Newcastle programme will be entered on, and that even If the Lords throw out the bill relating to Ireland, the Ministry will not resign, but will continue to enact the beneficent legislation promised in the Liberal programme unti the leading measures have been completed and passed upon by the Upper Chamber. Not till then is there likely to be a dissolution. Nevertheless, what Mr. Balfour wants is to keep the House occupied with the bill for granting Ireland local self-government for a sufficiently long period to tire out the Gladstonians and to prevent the early enactment of the other radical reforms. It is thus made evident that when lord Salisbury expressed the anxiety of his party to have the bill reported to the House of Lords in its present shape he was "talking through his hat," as the vulgar ex-



The Murderer of Giovanni Parrello To Be Electrocuted To-Day (Tuesday).

Dannemora, N. Y., June 5.—Seipione Martella, who has been confined in Clinton prison since Nov. 22, 1892, awaiting the execution of his death sentence for the brutal murder of a fellow-countryman, will be executed about Tuesday noon. The murderer of Giovanni Parrello will then have been legally disposed of. Parrello's murder, which occurred in the street in Saratoga on May 5, 1892, was the result of jealousy in connection with Martella's mistress and was a horrifying act in which Parrello's throat was out. Up to a week ago last Friday he had been feigning insanity; but he stopped that after an examination. Not a friend has visited Martella since he came here, and he has been alone in his confinement. He is unusually illiterate, being unable even to read or write his native language, A test of the death-dealing apparatus has been made, and everything was found to work satisfactorily. This will be the third execution to take place at Clinton prison under the new law, and the fifteenth since the law went into effect. The same chair in which Wood and Loth died will be used on Tuesday.

Cleveland's Cabinet Will Discuss the Matter.

Washington, June 5.—At no time since specie payments were resumed on Jan. 1, 1879, has the net gold in the treasury of the United States been so low as it is today. The amount is \$89,039,217. In March, 1888, it reached \$218,818,000, which was high-water mark. Since Jan. 1, 1889, the net gold holdings of the treasury have been on the declining scale, decreasing from \$194,000,000 in January, 1894, 600,000 in January, 1899, \$441,000,000 in January, 1891; \$119,000,000 in January, 1892. and \$108,000,000 in January, 1893. While no uncasiness is felt at the Treasury Department because of the continued loss of gold from the treasury, still Secretary Carlisle is not unmindful of the fact that a limit may be reached where the confidence reposed in the treasury by the people may be shaken.

It is understood that the question which will be discussed at the special meeting of the Cabinet to be held on Monday morning will be that of the condition of the treasury.
