BRITISH ROLLING UP END HE HINDENBURG LINE

GUATEMALANS JOIN BATTLE FOR FREEDOM

Little Central America Republic **Breaks Off Relations** With Germany.

Washington, April 28.—Guatemala has broken off diplomatic relations with Germany, handed to the German minister his passports and cancelled the exequaturs of German consuls there.

Official advices of the break, coming from the American legation in Guatemala City, say Presicant Estrada Cabrera assigned the reason for his act his desire to stand with the United States in the fight for democracy and the preservation of international law.

For some time President Cabrera's advisers here have been urging him to take the step and join the family of nations against Prussian autocracy.

Two German Positions Carried FIGHTING FOR LIFE AGAINST British and German Armies After

PRISONERS COMING IN

Germans Making Most Stubborn Resistance, Fighting Desperately.

London, April 28.—Reuter's says:

great distinction, however, is pointed reat distinction, however, is pointed out by the correspondent in that the British are now spared the pestilential mud which made progress quite impossible in the fall.

Stubborn Resistance.

THE WAR SITUATION

Haig Strikes Fast and Heavily

To Turn the Enemy's Defences;

New Tremendous Battle Raging;

Another smashing drive by the British on the French front was begun today. Gen. Haig reports an advance on an extended front north of the Scarpe. The attack already has scored good progress and is continuing. Heavy fighting has developed, the Germans throwing fresh divisions into the fray.

The field of the new push lies within the ten-mile front from the Scarpe to the coal city of Lens, which the British have had under their gurs on three sides for their guns on three sides for nearly Gen. Haig already had pushed a deep wedge into the German line

three miles north of the Scarpe, at Gavrelle, and was figting today to enlarge this opening. Every yard he gains there is making the German front between that point and Lens more difficult to hold A considerable part of the force of the present heavy attack seems to be aimed at this part of the line. At two points along this stretch the British are reported to have advanced more than a mile, as far as Arleux and Oppy, but definite possession of these villages appar-ently was a question for the furious fighting of the day to settle

French Batteries Busy. While the British are thus giving successfully cope with in the northern sector of the great battlefield, the French are keeping up a heavy artillery fire south from St. Quentin all around the curve in the line into the Champagne.

Germany Theatens Reprisal If Huns On Hospital Ships

Object to Their Being Exposed to the Danger of Torpedoes.

Copenhagen, April 28—Via London.— Announcement was made before the Reichstag main committee in Berlin yesterday that Germany will adopt the sharpest reprisals if German prisoners are embarked on hospital ships of the Allies and exposed to the danger of torpedoes.

All Night Battle Are Surging Back and Forth In Titanic Combat, British Having Launched New Smashing Attack on Vast Scale

STAGGERING LOSSES FOR HUNS INMANY DESPERATE COUNTERS

[BY WILLIAM PHILIP SIMS.]

[Special Cable to the Advertiser.] With the British Armies Afield, April 28 .- British troops have turned the German "Wotan line."

Half of the village of Oppy, believed to be the northernmost town of this German defence front, was captured today in desperately hot fighting. Arleux, a trifle further to the north, also fell to the tremendous British assault.

Information from other sections of the British front reaching the spot from which this dispatch is written detailed fighting on a tremendous scale of

FOUGHT ALL NIGHT.

Around Oppy and Arleux it was still progressing after a night of never-ceasing clash. The armies on both sides swayed back and forth in the struggle. The latest report today showed the British still in possession of half of Oppy and all of Arleux, and beating back desperate German counter-attacks.

STRUCK HARD AND FAST.

Around Gavrelle Haig's offensive was still gaining ground. A steady stream of prisoners from this bloody angle were being shifted back of the lines to the south, as part of his gigantic push, Haig's troops were thrown toward Greenland Hill. They struck hard and fast at massed German forces, and swarmed over into a German trench running south of the Scarpe.

GERMAN LOSSES STAGGERING.

There they stuck fast, despite tremendous blows launched by the Germans. Not even literal melting away of the German attackers in the face of murderous machine gun fire and the steel curtain of British artillery stopped the desperate enemy counter-thrusts. The German losses are staggering in their attacks.

At the present moment the most bitter fighting, however, was apparently in progress in the woods to the west of Roeux-just above the Scarpe. There the front was literally being mowed down by artillery fire, and the moss stained red with rivulets of blood as the Germans madly attacked; were locked in bitter conflict; then thrown back, only to reform and attack again. Meanwhile the British inched further and further forward.

GERMAN TRENCHES RAIDED.

Paris, April 28 .- Heavy artillery fighting occurred last night between St. Quentin and the Oise and in the Champagne, the war office reports. On the Verdun front the French raided German trenches west of the Meuse and brought back prisoners from the sector of Hill 304.

Since April 16 the French have captured 175 cannon of all calibres, 412 machine guns and 119 trench mortars. The number of prisoners has reached 20,780.

Ask All to Show Their Permits, is City

Some difficulty is being found in the city regarding the bylaw to prevent the collection of subscriptions, etc., The police claim that there is no penalty attached to the bylaw, and as a result, there will be much trouble in trying to enforce it. However, the remedy is in the hands of the citizens of London, and if no penalty can be levied, the people can prevent all solicitations unless a permit from the police is furnished. BRITISH AIRMEN IN **WONDERFUL STUNTS** ON FLANDERS FRONT

Combat Single - Handed and Defeat Germans in Flocks.

WONDERS FILL THE AIR

Thrilling Battle on Thursday Evening-Running Fights and Melees.

[From a Staff Correspondent of the Associated Press.]

WITH THE BRITISH ARMIES IN FRANCE, via London, April 27.—The German airmen had one of the greatest surprises of their lives late vesterday. The day had been heavily overcast until nearly 6 o'clock in the evening, when the clouds suddenly thinned and the sun broke through. A few German machines had been sighted well back of their lines during the obscured period, but when the sun shone out several enemy squadrons which had been housed all day came out to stretch their wings in the slanting afternoon's rays. They had scarcely taken the air when the British machines pounced upon them, and in the after-tea-time fighting that ensued, several German machines were seen to crash and eight others to be driven down completely out of control, which are believed to have been destroyed.

Air Filled With Wonders.

Between 6 and 8 o'clock the air was filled with wonderful incidents of deeds of daring. There were running fights and general melees. One distinguished young Britisher, who recently returned to the air after several months of rest, deliberately "sat over an enemy airdrome." and watched six enemy machines leave the ground and begin to climb towards him. He was sitting at 13,000 feet, and calmly remained there until the leader of the challenging planes had attained about 6,000 feet.

In the meantime he had noticed that one of the hostile birds was something of a stranger. It had a very long tail and a very short nose. The Britisher, however, did not stop to worry about it. He dived at the highest of the climbers, and gave him two bursts from his machine gun. Down went the German in a crash just outside a bit of wood. Air Filled With Wonders.

Attacked by Five.

Not content with felling fifteen hostile machines during their brief flying interval yesterday, the British airmen also downed one observation balloon and sallied forth under the stars last night on a great bombing expedition, during which they upset three German trains bringing troops toward the front. Two of the trains were completely derailed and the engine of the third approximation. Go Bombing by Starlight. ailed and the engine of the third appeared to explode.

One of the British pilots during the raid temporarily lost his bearings. He was fired at from the ground, some of the projectiles being in the nature of greenish-colored rockets. In the glare of these he hamily saw a summy green of these he happily saw a supply

of these he happing saw a supply depot just beneath him, whereupon he let go one of his bombs and obtained a direct hit, the depot disappearing in a great flame. All the British machines returned safely, despite the darkness of the The German machines recently have taken on variegated hues. Meeting Germany's Best. The Germans have evidently brought more of their best pilots opposite the British front to meet the determined aerial offensive, which has been in progress since early in April. Assalled by a Flock.
One of the most thrilling of recent adventures was that of a young naval airman who is attached to the army service. With several other machines he was escorting some bombing 'planes over the German lines, when seemingly a flock of Germans dashed at them from the clouds. For five minutes there was hot fighting. In the general melee the naval man selected one particular apponent, and after a brilliant duel he drove him down in flames.

During this fighting the Britisher had become entirely detached from the remainder of the formation. Seeling this, three of the hostile machines made for ontrol, but the other two Germans keept up the battle. In a few minutes, however, one of these suddenly flew away, and the combat again became a duel, with the machines wing to wing. Finally the naval filer manoeuvred into a position which gave him the vital apportunity. There was another burst of fire, and down crashed the last German machine.

During certain periods of the fighting the machines were less than 50 feet from the ground. The Britisher managed to struggle back to his lines, Exhausted from the fury of the fighting he had been fred on not alone by his aerial opponents but by German infantry and cavalry as well.

Photographers Not Immune.

While the fighting scouts ordinarily

While the fighting scouts ordinarily have the most interesting experiences to relate, the poor, old, hard-working photographing machines also have their desperate moments. One of these recently was attacked by eleven hostile fighting scouts. Nearly all its controls were shot away and the observer seriously wounded, fell half out of his machine. Although still manoeuvring his machine in an attempt to escape the direct fire of the surrounding Germans, the British pilot grasped the wounded observer to prevent him from falling out and brought the plane safely down inside his own lines just as it burst into flames. Then, under a heavy shell fire, the pilot carried the observer to safety.

Another photographer aviator brought Another photographer aviator brought his machine down under a heavy attack, and, as usual, the German artillery began to shell it. Despite this, he managed to remove all his exposed plates and scamper away just before a heavy shell tore the plane to bits.

While this little action was going on five other Germans had formed between the British plane and his home line. Firing as he came, the Britisher tried to break through the formation, but falled. Then he turned away, as if about to attempt an escape toward the south All the Germans started in pursuit. One of them soon outdistanced the others, and was approaching the Britisher, when the latter whirled about and fired into the German at point blank range, and saw him burst into flame. Next in line was the long-tailed, short-nosed stranger.

"I drove him down, too," said the pilot's report, "but after falling a great distance he flattened out, and was apparently all right."

A young khaki-clad pllot was carried far from his own airdrome, but managed to cross the British line sately just before nightfall. His machine was absolutely riddled with bullets, but he was unnurt. Asked to tell about his adventures, the airman merely shrugged his shoulders and said: "Oh, I just had a bit of luck, that's all."

This young flier, according to his companions, holds the absolute belief that he will never be killed while flying, and with that fatalistic assistance takes the most desperate chances, the resuit being that he is rolling up one of the most brilliant records of the war.

THE CRISIS

France, England and Italy in peace times did not depend upon America, but on Russia, Roumania and Bulgaria for most of their breadstuffs. With these sources closed, the crisis of the hour demands that we see that our soldiers and the Motherland are fed.

Everyone in Great Britain has been put on limited rations! Meat is prohibited one day a week, and the making of cakes and pastry has been stopped. Further restrictions are anticipated.

Bread has gone to 28c per four-pound loaf in England, for the first time since the Crimean War.

Lord Devonport, British Food Comptroller, proposes taking authority to search the houses of Great Britain to prevent food hoarding.

Forty million men, less the casualties, are now on active service.

Twenty million men and women are supporting them by service in other war activities.

In the last analysis the land is bearing this burden.

One million tons of food-carrying ships have been torpedoed since February 1st, 1917.

Germany's hope for victory is in the starvation of Britain through the submarine.

World-Hunger Stares Us in the Face

David Lubin, representative of the United States to the International Institute of Agriculture—maintained by forty Governments—reports officially to Washington that the food grains of the world on March 31st, 1917, showed a shortage of 150,000,000 bushels below the amount necessary to feed the world until August, 1917. He declares it is beyond question that unless a greater acreage is put to crop in 1917 there will be WORLD-HUNGER before the 1918 crop is harvested.

The failure of the grain crop, in the Argentine Republic, which is ordinarily a great grain-exporting nation, resulted in an embargo being placed, in March, 1917, upon the export of grains from that country to avert local famine.

The United States Department of Agriculture, in its official report, announces the condition of the fall wheat crop (which is two-thirds of their total wheat crop), on April 1st, 1917, to be the poorest ever recorded, and predicts a yield of 244,000,000 bushels below the crop of 1915. The 1916 crop was poor. Even with favorable weather, the wheat crop of the United States is ikely to be the smallest in thirty-five years, not more than 64% of the normal crop.

Under date of April 10th, Ogden Armour, executive head of Armour & Company, one of the world's largest dealers in food products, stated that unless the United States wishes to walk deliberately into a catastrophe, the best brains of the country, under Government supervision, must immediately devise means of increasing and conserving food supplies. Armour urged the cultivation of every available acre. The food shortage, he said, is world-wide. European production is cut in half, the Argentine Republic has suffered droughts. Canada and the United States must wake up!

Famine conditions are becoming more widespread every day.
On these alarming food conditions becoming known, President Wilson immediately appointed a Food Comptroller for the United States. He selected Herbert C. Hoover, to whom the world is indebted, as Chairman of the International Belgium Relief Commission, for his personal direction of the distribution of food among the starving Belgians.

Mr. Hoover is already urging sacrifice and food restrictions, for, as he states, "The war will probably last another year, and we shall have all we can do to supply the necessary food to carry our Allies through with their full fighting stamina."

Food Production is the Greatest Problem the World Faces To-day

Owing to destruction by submarines, ocean ships are scarce. It is much easier to protect shipping between Canada and England than on the longer voyages from India or Australia.

One vessel can make twice as many trips from Canada to Britain as from India, and four times as many as from Australia.

Why the Call to Canada is So Urgent

If this country does not raise a big crop this year, not only will the people of Canada suffer, but the Motherand and her Allies will suffer, and their military power will be weakened if not paralyzed. Therefore, the right solution of the present war problem comes back to the farm, as to a foundation upon which our whole national and international structure must be built and maintained.

The farmers know that they are the last reserve, and that the soil on which crops are grown is the strategic ground on which wars are decided. To their care is entrusted the base of The Second-Line Trenches

To enable the farm to do the work two factors are essential. The first is Time. Whatever we are to do must be done at once. Nature waits for no man. The second is Labor. Many farmers cannot plant the acres they would because they cannot get the necessary help. Many are afraid to increase their acreage because they fear they would not be able to cultivate and harvest an unusual crop after they had raised it. If they are to do the work that is essential for them to do, the last man in each city, town and village must be mobilized at once.

Every man not on Active Service can help. In every city, town and vilage are men who, by their training on the farm, or by their present occupation, can readily adapt themselves to farm work. These can render no greater service to the Empire at the present time than by answering the call of the farm. Capable men and boys willing to learn should not allow their lack of farm experience to stand in the way.

Can the employer render a more signal service in this crisis than by encouraging these men to help the farmer to cultivate every available acre, and by making it easy for them to go?

Ontario's farm lands are waiting—the implements are ready—the equipment is complete—the farmer is willing—all he needs is labor.

So short is the world's food supply that without increased production many in Canada must go hungry, and even with enormously increased production we cannot expect cheap food. The world is waiting for our harvest.

If peace should be declared within a year, the food conditions will be no better, for the accumulated hunger of the Central Empires must be met. This will absorb a large part of the world's supply.

We do not know when this war shall cease. It is endless—its lengthening out has paralyzed the thought and conception of all men who thought about it and its possible time of conclusion. Three months—six months, we said; nine months, a year, we said; and yet two years and eight months have passed their long, dreary and sanguinary length, and there is no man who can tell how long this gigantic struggle may yet last.

Lloyd George, in a letter addressed to farmers throughout the

Empire, said:

"The line which the British Empire holds against "the Germans is held by those who WORK ON THE "LAND as well as by those who fight on land and sea. If "it breaks at any point it breaks everywhere. In the face "of the enemy the seamen of our Royal naval and mero" cantile marine and the soldiers gathered from every post "of our Empire hold our line firstly. You workers on land "must hold your part of our line as strongly. Every full "day's labor you do helps to shorten the struggle and "brings us nearer victory. Every idle day, all loitering, "lengthens the struggle and makes defeat more possible. "Therefore, in the nation's honor, heed! Acquit your "selves like men, and as workers on land do your duty "with all your strength!"

So, for the honor of Canada's soldiers in France—and for the glory of our New-born Nationhood—let it be said of Ontario's citizens that, in the hour of our greatest need, their response was worthy of their sons.

We owe a great debt to those who are fighting for us.





The success of the bureau will depend to a great extent upon the assistance and co-operation that the other provinces will lend.

EVEN PRUNES FEEL URGE OF SOARING PRICES

Canadian Grocer Outlines Foodstuffs Markets at Glance.

The following comment on the market situation as regards foodstuffs will appear in Canadian Grocer this week:

There has been continued activity in the flour market during the week, a further advance of 50 cents per barrel having been recorded on the price chronicled last week. Wheat prices held up well during the week and flour was naturally strong in sympathy with the grain. Sugar held steady at the advance recorded last week, but there was a weakening in the raw market in New York during the week. Wholesalers report the demand for sugar has been exceptionally heavy from the consumers, which to them indicates that householders have been stocking up in anticipation of high prices. They point out that until these supplies are used up there may later be a light demand.

Meais of various kinds have been in a generally firmer market. Eggs have advanced slightly in view of the fact that commission men have started to place some in storage. There is a disposition on the part of some commission men not to place eggs in storage this year, owing to the uncertainty of being able to export them through lack of tonnage. Maple syrup is reaching the market in larger quantities and prices. pear in Canadian Grocer this week:
