Servian Government UNTIL INFORMED AS TO CRIMES

Diplomatic Relations Broken Off at Alexander's Death Have Not

Yet Been Renewed.

London, June 17.-In accordance with his promise Premier Balfour, in House of Commons today, amplified the information regarding the attitude of the British Government towards Ser-He said the diplomatic relations with Servia, which ended with the death of King Alexander had not been renewed. The Government had considered whether it should mark its reprobation of the crimes which had disgraced the Servian capital by withdrawing the British minister. It, however, had been thought better that Sir George Bonham remain at his post and protect British interests. He would not be accredited to the new Government until further information was re ceived regarding the circumstances under which it had come into power. London, June 17 .- On the resumption of the debate on the Irish land bill in the House of Commons yesterday the amendment of John Redmond, the Irish leader, which seeks to abolish the minimum price at which the landlord may sell, even though the landlord and health, estimates that at the present tenant might agree on a lower price,

Chief Irish Secretary Wyndham said he was unable to accept Mr. Redmond's proposal to raise the minimum reduction to 15 per cent in the case of second term rents and to 25 per cent in the case of first term rents.




