THE KAISER CAUSE OF ANXIETY

P.ans of the Intriguing German Emperor Suggest a New International Crisis.

London, May 22.-Public interest centers largely in the impending naval battle in the far east, but the attention of the diplomatic world continues to be concentrated on Berlin. It is the general opinion that the rival fleets will meet within a few days, but it is doubted in some quarters if a general engagement will follow immediately.

Russia's latest misfortune—the illness of the two admirals with the fleet -strengthens the impression that her greater weight of metal will not avail tion, especially on the bourses, to discount a Russian defeat. The effect of his issue a month ago would have been to strengthen all the markets, for it would have been regarded as a precursor of peace. Now its influence is quite the opposite, and a depression deeper than for many month prevails

TRAINS CRASH

Narrow Escape From Terrible Disaster On the New York "L."

New York, N. Y., May 22.-Twenty persons were injured, six of them so seriously that they were sent to hospitals, and more than 100 persons narrowly escaped death or serious injury today, when a swiftly moving train crashed into two other on the high elevated structure on the Third avenue line at One Hundred and Thirty-third street and Alexander avenue.

Only the best of good fortune prevented a terrible tragedy. After the crash the ends of the shattered cars hung far over the side of the elevated structure at one of the highest points on the line. Had they moved a few inches more they would have pitched to the ground far below with awful results. Good fortune also kept the wrecked cars free of the heavily-charged third rail. As they bounded from the track they rolled away from the deadly rail and settled down, safely but insecurely at the most distant point possible on the narrow trestle.

Two trains were standing on the trestle waiting for the drawbridge

over the Harlem River to close, when a third train and the rear car of the second train were smashed and thrown half around and the other cars were tossed about, and some of them overturned. Passengers were thrown and many of them were severely cut by glass which flew from the shattered vindows.





A Double-Barreled Campaign.

The western view of the school clauses of the autonomy bill is perhaps reflected accurately in the statement, published elsewhere in this issue, of Rev. Dr. Andrew Browning Baird, pro- road, fessor of church history in Manitoba College. Dr. Baird, we are told by the Toronto Globe, was the pioneer Presbyterian missionary in the Saskatchewan, and was the minister of the first congregation in Edmonton in 1881. He was for years a member of the Board tories. He is one of the foremost men of the Presbyterian Church of Canada. Dr. Baird points out that the revised clauses of the autonomy bill simply continue the Territorial school system which the people have for years approved and sustained. The clauses commend themselves to him as a satisfactory compromise, which inflict injustice on no one, and he believes they will be accepted by the people di-

rectly affected. Mr. Borden, during his stay in London, was very careful to say that the question of separate schools was not involved, but that the issue was purely the constitutional one of provincial rights. But many of his followers choose to regard it as a question of separate schools, and persist in placing is on that basis. If Mr. Borden is sincerely desirous of lifting the controversy above the dust and heat of sectarianism, others, who pretend to speak for the Conservative party, are pursuing different tactics. They are the most aggressive elements in the party in Ontario, and they profess to be spoiling for a fight. A dispassionate discussion of the autonomy bill they denounce as cowardice. Their newspapers publish inflammatory eartoons, and are busily manufacturing race and creed combustibles. They cry that the Federal Government is the tool of the hierarchy and is "coercing" the new provinces. In Quebec a different story is heard. It is surprising that the Montreal Gazette, usually so fair and moderate, should lend itself to this double-barreled campaign against the Government. The Gazette finds fault with the Government, not for subserviency to the Roman Catholic hierarchy -quite the centrary. It complains that the amended clauses of the autonomy bili are a concession to "Liberal intolerance" and will have the effect of "modifying and not of creating a privilege in the interest of religious minorities." The Gazette continues:

"The question is now, not whether there shall be separate schools, but offered. Have you got it? whether the separate schools shall be such as the representatives of the Catnolic minority ask for, or such as the prejudices of the Protestant majority (in this case represented by e majority of the Liberal party in Parliament), will permit it to give. "So far as Parliament is now con-

A First Class Road Is Assured

The preliminary surveys for two sections of the eastern division of the new transcontinental railway have been completed. These cover the territory between Moncton, N. B., and Clear Lake, which is about 140 miles west of the city of Quebec. The commissioners now have sufficient data to enable them to decide whether to run the line diagonally through the Province of New Brunswick from the Quebec boundary, or via Fredericton and the St. John River Valley, north and south. It is encouraging to learn that there are no insuperable engineering difficulties in either route, and that the line, all the way from Clear Lake to Moncton, will traverse valuable country, most desirable for settlement.

WEST SATISFIED, SAYS DR. BAIRD

Noted Presbyterian Commends Fatal Boiler Explosion Near the the School Clauses of the Autonomy Bill.

> Toronto Globe, May 20.: "Rev. Dr. Andrew Browning Baird, professor of church history in Manitoba College, and formerly a member of the board of education for the Northwest Territories, talked briefly to The Globe last right about the school clauses of the utonomy bills. He said he was a nember of the board from 1885 to 1888 inder the old school law, and had to esign on coming from Edmonton to reside in Manitoba. The people in the west, he said, were not so stiffly bound by denominationalism as they were in he east, and this explained why more was not heard in the Teritories about

he school question. "The school laws of 1892 were those which the people had sanctioned, a sysem with which all were satisfied, and which had practically never been assailed by the electors of the Northwest since enacted. The revised clauses of the bill simply continue this system, which the people had for years approved and sustained.

"The people recognize that in this country there must be conciliation and compromise on some things, and here was the basis for a satisfactory compromise which does not inflict injustice on anyone. He did not pretend to a complete knowledge of the constitutional questions raised about these clauses, but as revised they commended themselves to him as a reasonable ettlement, which would be accepted as satisfactory by the people directly af-



PROCTOR TRAGEDY HYDRANTS ARE FAR IS RECALLED AND FEW BETWEEN

Charged With Perjury, Found Not Guilty.

John Hall and Joseph Delarey, the Indian youths accused of giving false estimony in the recent trial of Robert Proctor for murder, were this morning acquitted by Judge Macbeth. The evidence given in the examination was repeated, Crown Attorney McKillop conducting the prosecution, and Mr. E. W. M. Flock the defense.

The prisoners, it will be remembered. testified in the assize court that Goddu and Shanks, the two chief crown witnesses, had confessed, while in conversation with witnesses in the jail yard, that they were being given inducements to testify against Proctor. The witnesses stuck to their story, and the crown was unable to show any special inconsistencies in it. The evi dence undoubtedly helped to throw discredit upon the testimony of Goddu and Shanks, in the eyes of the jury. Not long after having descended from the witness box, however, Hall and Delarey found themselves under arrest.

The court said this morning that the evidence of Turnkey Stickles for the prosecution was inadmissible. Stickles, it will be remembered, swore that no such conversation as that described by the prisoners could have taken place. The case simmered down, said the court to the question as to whether Goddu and Shanks, on the one side, or Hall and Delarey on the other, were to be believed, the evidence on the one side being directly contradictory to that on the other. His honor did not think that the prisoners could be convicted on the evidence of Guddu and Shanks, any nore than Proctor had been.

Arrangements Completed for Maneuvers of Seventh Regiment.

Full arrangements for the field maneuvers of the Seventh Regiment at Springbank tomorrow have been completed. A general outline of the sham battle has been drawn up, but, while keeping to the general idea, each party will, of course, be free to move at will. The general idea of the battle is: An eastern force, consisting of Companies A, E and H, having occupied London, as a portion of its force protecting the rater supply at Springbank.
