Manual Training The Governors of the University are

providing the Town of Wolfville with a well equipped Manual Training Department; paying the salary of the Teacher and paying for supplies used and for the heating and care of the room. Domestic Science

They are also providing a well equipped omestic Science Department, paying the salary of the Teacher, and paying for supplies used, and for the heating and care of the Room.

The number of pupils from the Town Schools receiving instruction in the Man-ual Training Department this year is forty-two. Those who complete the course, if taking the Engineer Course in the College, will have the credit for this work, and will be saved the time and expense incident to doing it as a part of their College Course.

The number of pupils from the Town Schools receiving instruction in the Domestic Science Department is sixty. In both cases, the time is 2½ hours per week.

The Town of Wolfville received for last year, from the Nova Scotia Government \$264.99, for Manual Training, \$136. 20 and for Domestic Science \$128.79. This \$264.99 was passed over to the University. Nothing whatever was paid from the Town's Treasury.

As to whether the University is con ferring any benefit on the Town of Wolf-ville in thus supplying instruction in ville in thus supplying instruction in Manual Training and Domestic Science, statement of what it costs the Town of Kentville to provide instruction in these subjects may help to decide.



CANADA'S MAPLE PRODUCTS

The manufacture of sugar and syrup from the sap of the sugar maple is an important farm industry in the Eastern Provinces of Canada, and particularly in Quebec. Long before the white man set tled the country, maple syrup was known to the aborigines and apart from the wild honey was the only intensely sweet product at their command. The methods of procuring it were naturally of a very crude description. Modern methods have greatly improved the product and have lead to an ever increasing demand. Province is the centre of the industry Of the 20,000,000 pounds, or thereabouts, produced annually in Canada, more than two-thirds have to be credited to Ouebec. Ontario is officially reported to be responsible for five million pounds, and the Maritime Provinces for half a million pounds only. The other provinces of Canada do not figure in the calculations. These facts are gathered from a timely pamphlet just issued by the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa, of which J. B. I was taking probably his prettiest production, as it is the average yearly production was about 13,500,000 pounds, from 1861 to 1871 about 17,500,000 pounds, from 1871 to 1881, 19,000,000 pounds and from 1881 to 1891, 22,500,000 pounds. The latter was the pinnacle of annual production for in the next decade the average per year was 21,200,00 pounds, and in later years the average has been little less than 20,000,000 pounds. It is thought that perhaps with the increase in price that has taken place recently, greater production may be looked for. It is estimated that the value of the yearly manufacture of sugar and syrup is \$2,000,000, and that 50,000 people are employed in the industry at the height of the season, which is of very short duration, extending ove only five or six weeks at the most. String ent laws against the adulteration of the product have been passed, expecially in Ouebec, where schools of instruction have been established and the Pure Maple Sugar and Syrup Co-operative Agricultural Association has been organized.

BIRDS' TONGUES

A naturalist has gathered some curious data with reference to the tongues of birds. As he points out, many persons suppose that woodpeckers use their sharp-pointed tongues as darts with which to trasnfix their prey. It is true that the woodpecker, like the hummingbird, can dart out its tongue with extraordinary rapidity and that its mouth is furnished with an elaborate mechanism for this purpose, yet investigation shows that the object of their swift motion is only to hard lot. catch they prey, not to pierce it. For the purpose of holding the captured victim woodpecker's tongue is furnished with a sticky secretion.

Inasmuch as it possesses the power of imitating speech, it is not surprising to learn that the parrot's tongue resembles that of man more closely than any other bird's tongue does. It is not because the parrot is more intelligent than many other birds, but because its tongue is better suited for articulation than theirs, that it is able to amuse us with its mimicry.

In some respects the hummingbird's tongue is the most remarkable of all. It is double nearly from end to end, so that the little creature is able to grasp its insect prey very much as it its mouth were furnished with a pair of fingers





Wolfville in 1865

Nearly sixty years ago, before the Windsor and Annapolis Railway was in operation, Wolfville was a busy center of trade and through its institutions of learning was well known. Fewof the men who were alive at that time are with us. None of the business places, except Rand's Drug Blois, who for more than a quarter of a store, are associated with the activities of the year 1865.

A bfier statement of the residents of Wolfville at that time may be of interest to readers of The Acadian.

Beginning at the Tannery Brook on

the North side the first place was occupied by the late Enoch Neary. This place was afterwards owned by the late James Elderkin and is now occupied by Harry G. Parker.

The next place was that now occupied by Mr. R. A. Jodrey. The old dwelling which stood on that site was then oc-cupied by the late James Elder. It was afterwards owned by Mr. A. C. Johnson who built the new house afterwards remodelled by the late W. M. Black after

he became the owner of the property.

The late J. W. Bigelow occupied the next place, now the home of Mr. and Mrs. D. G. Whidden. This was formerly the home of Mr. James Johnson. Mr. Johnson received such injuries from a vicious bull as to cause his death. Mr. Bigelow was interested in big shipping enterprises and after coming to Wolfville was an enthusiastic orchardist. He was one of the

The double house now occupied by Mr. A. C. Cox and Mrs. A. N. Johnson was the The next place in those days as it is at present. It was then the home of Capt. George lived in the house recently vacated by H. Johnson on the last side. Both were by his brother, the late William Brown, progressive and worthy citizens

Mr. William Fitch, the grandfather of the present Mr. William Fitch and Mayor Fitch, then occupied a dwelling which stood near the site of the fine residence erected by the late George Thompson.

The latter had several tenants, our townsman Mr. G. H. Wallace carrying on a successful grocery here for years. Mr. Chase was the local expressman and a general favorite with tourists.

The next building was the Acadia Hotel, which stood where is now the Royal. This


