RUSSIAN SUCCESS ON LAKE VAN

London, Dec. 24—There is a recrudescence of activity in the vicinity of Mount Ararat, near the spot on which the Ark rested. Today's Russian official referring to operations on the Caucasian front states that near Atkune Russian scouts conducted a reconnaissance which resulted in the capture of some prisoners. South-east of Lake Van their detachments drove the enemy out of the settlement situated to the north-east of Vustan.

PATRIOTIC RALLY OF KINGS COUNTY AGRICULTURISTS IN PASTIME HALL, JAN. 10

Morning Session at 10.30 Afternoon at 2 o'clock

This meeting is being called by the Kings County Farmers' Association. The object is to develop an Agricultural policy for Kings County that all agriculturists may adopt as best calculated to give the most needed help to the nation in the present struggle for freedom and right. The aim is to bring together representative farmers from every section of Kings County. These men will include the members of the Municipal Council, the Kings County Farmers' Association, directors and members; the officers and directors of the different agricultural societies of the County and officers and members of the Nova Scotia Fruit Growers Association in the County. Through these men it is hoped a definite line of agricultural endeavors for the County as thought best calculated to meet the requirements of the Empire may be decided upon.

their responsibility and have a desire to do their "bit" in the most effective way, but as yet there is no concerted action, or definite policy as to what might best enable them to do their full share in helping in the most effective way to bring the present war to a victorious conclusion.

From what can be seen at present the war is likely to continue for several years, and even with the best organization by farming communities the agricultural resources of the country will be taxed to the utmost. Certain lines of agricultural production may be of paramount importance in bringing final victory, and on the whole these may not be the most profitable for Kings County agriculturists, it is our duty, however to turn our energies in the direction that will give the best aid, even should it mean a great sacrifice, the greater the sacrifice the greater the part we play, as a County, or a people in helping to win the war.

Let Kings County lead the way, and start a wave of enthusiasm with definite action. Call it the "Kings County Farmers' War Policy" if you will, let us be a potent factor in helping to

All the agriculturists feel

furnish food products more essential for the successful prosecution of the War.

Only by taking joint action can we hope to do our best as a County. Only by having a definite object in view can we turn our agricultural effort to the best advantage. Sink the thought of self, and look at the matter from the standpoint of those who are looking to us for help. Come see us. Have a talk together to decide what is best from the standpoint of present requirements and our agricultural possibilities. Keep this date in mind and let Kings County farmers make this a grand success by their active participation.

The matters discussed will have a bearing entirely upon farm production as related to war conditions and the question will be taken up entirely by Kings County farmers.

Matters of policy which may be decided as desirable under present conditions are the following:

As all Canadian exportable wheat will be required until the end of the war and probably for sometime after, by the Empire and Allied Countries at war, we as farmers of Kings County believe it is our duty to grow the wheat necessary to meet our requirements as far as possible and that this association should effect the organization so that seed wheat as required may be secured at an early date at the most reasonable prices possible.

That all live stock should be conserved until such time as it can be utilized to best advantage to furnish meal or dairy products; That the killing of calves which could be reared for meat or dairy, and the doing away of heifers for beef, and the putting off of dairy cows because exportable feeds are so high is not in the best interest of the nation at the present time. The aim should be to grow more fodder crops so that livestock may be increased rather than decreased.

As clover hay comes next to grain as a feed for stock we as farmers consider it is desirable to make a general increase in areas seeded to clover and as reliable tests show that the clover crop may be doubled in yield on Kings County soils by the use of ground limestone, we are convinced that efforts should be made to utilize this means in the most effective way to increase the clover crop, thereby relieving feeds for export otherwise required to take the place of clover.

As compared with the present value of feeds turnips are worth 15 cents per bushel for food value, and in addition they make it possible to utilize much rough fodder, that otherwise could not be used to profit without meal, we, therefore, believe it is in the interest of the national welfare that the root crops should as far as possible be doubled next season on the farms of our County.

The source of our potash has been cut off. The liquid from animals contain four-fifths of the potash voided by them, and, if this source of potash is not carefully guarded from loss, "may materially reduce our future crop yield. We, therefore believe it is our duty as agriculturists to use every effort to prevent such a loss by encouraging more care in the handling of manures made on the farm, and the collecting of all liquids by using absorbents such as straw or old hay.

We are of the opinion that more might be done in advancing agricultural knowledge through agricultural meetings of farmers being more generally held throughout the country and are prepared to give our support to any endeavors that will assist in spreading agricultural knowledge that will enable us to grow more and better crops, thereby assisting in the mighty task the Empire is now facing.

TO HELP BRITISH HELD BY GERMANS ALL FOOD PARCELS TO PRISONERS OF WAR MUST NOW GO THROUGH COMMITTEE

The detailed plans approved by Great Britain for the feeding of British prisoners of war in Germany have been received by an official of that Government in New York.

Germany, the statement reads, "ought to supply food enough for all prisoners of war but Germany has failed in this, as in many other humane considerations there has been organized a Red Cross prisoners of war committee.

The condition hitherto have been chaotic, and the results flowing from the kindly thoughts of thousands of sympathizers were not commensurate with their efforts.

The scheme will remedy many defects of the past. In the first place, some men unhappily receive at present few parcels while others receive many.

The Germans are not holding anything like as many war prisoners as are in British hands—not by nearly 14,000; but, still, the British naval and military prisoners number 31,000, of whom 1,079 are officers and there are also civilians.

The headquarters of the 'Adopters' Bureau for sending food to British prisoners of war is at 4 Thurloe Place, London.

MANY VACANCIES IN PARLIAMENT

Eighteen are in House of Commons—Thirteen in Senate Making Thirty-one.

There are today thirty-one vacancies in the two houses of parliament, 18 in the Commons and 13 in the Senate. These are the actual vacancies, but they do not comprehend by any means the measure below strength of parliament, for there has been enacted a law under which there will be 14 new seats in the Commons and 12 new members of the Senate after the next election.

Therefore parliament in its two houses is 58 under strength.

The 18 vacancies, in the Commons include 11 Conservatives, 6 Liberal and one Nationalist seats.

In addition to the vacancies, next season will be conducted without the services of a number of members of the Commons who are on military service.

Never since Confederation has parliament been so short-handed. The Commons vacancies are: Quebec—Bellechase, Brome, Montmagny, Nicolet and Stanstead.

Ontario—Carleton, East Gray, East Hamilton, East Toronto, Lincoln and London.

Nova Scotia—Kings, Yarmouth Antigonish.

Prince Edward Island—Prince. Manitoba—Brandon and Lisgar New Brunswick—Restigouche Saskatchewan—Regina.

KING'S COLLEGE PLANS PROGRESSIVE MOVE.

Will Put on a Campaign to Raise \$100,000 For University

The Governors of King's College, Windsor, are planning a special effort to improve the financial standing of the University and to increase its usefulness after the war. A determined effort is to be made to keep the College thoroughly abreast of the times and to meet the general expansion that is looked for throughout the Provinces. At meeting of the Board of Governors was held lately at which representatives were present from both Provinces. His Grace the Archbishop, presided. Arrangements were made for a new campaign for increased endowment. It was pointed out by the President that such a campaign is absolutely necessary to enable the College to carry on its work efficiently and provide for the needed expansion. With this in view it was decided to inaugurate a vigorous effort in the three Provinces.

A special committee was appointed to make the preliminary arrangements. Mr. R. A. Cassidy, who is already well known to the public in connection with College and philanthropic movements, has been engaged to assist. The amount required, and which there is every expectation of obtaining, is \$100,000.

Plans are being formed to bring the claims of the College before the public. Lectures will be delivered in various centres descriptive of King's historic associations and the part played by distinguished Kings men, past and present.
