



THE SECOND TOAST. There Was a Time When a Toast Held

Much Significance.

In Canada it is the general custom to use but o.e. loyal toast, that to "The King," which precedes all other toasts at banquets. There is a second loyal toast, however, used on formal occasions throughout the Empire, and the form of it has been recently de-cided on and announced officially as follows: follows:

the form of it has been recently de-cided on and announced officially as follows: "The Queen, Queen Alexandra, the Prince of Wales, and other members of the Royal Family." In this form, the King's mother pre-cedes the Prince of Wales, and gets the title Queen Mother," which was first brought into use, but to which the lady chiefly concerned promptly ob-jected. Pernaps it smacked a little too much of the Victorian era. The wording of a toast in these days is a simple enough matter, although there was a time when no loyal toast could be devised which many would not find ways of twisting out of its mean-ing. It was the habit of many to toast, not the ruling, but a fugitive monarch. In the seventeenth centary these "left-handed" toasts were com-mon. The puritans frowned on the cup, especially when used for political purposes, and so the King's man, de-siring to drink "deep damnation to red-nosed Noll." put a crumb in his mouth as he swallowed his liquor, and muttered the words: "May the Lord send this crumb well down." During the merry reign of Charles II. loyal toasts were drunk, without let or hindrance, but there came a change when James, his successor, had fied over the water and William of Orange sat insecurely on the throne. The Jacobites, greatly daring, were accus-ting" and "To the old man over the Water," two sentiments which an Act of Parliament declared to be treason-able, and for uttering which two Sejtimen were actually tried by the Privy Comcil. The supporters of King William favored the following: "To that glorious, pious, and immor-tal memory of the great and good King William tavored the following:

"To that glorious, pious, and immor-tal memory of the great and good King Willam III., who saved us from Pope

tal memory of the great and good King Willam III., who saved us from Pope and Popery, brass money, and wood-en shoes, the Pope on the pillory, and the Devil pelting him with priests." And if this were not enough, the sturdy loyalist who proposed the toast added these few words: "He that will not drink this, wheth-er he be bishop, priest, deacon, bel-lows-blower, grave-digger, or any other of the fraternity of the clergy, may a north wind blow nim to the east; may he have a dark night, a lee shore, and a leaking vessel to carry him over the River Styr." The Jacobites attained their purpose by less direct but equally understand-able methods, writes S. H. R. in T.P.'s Weekly. You will remember the mole in Hampton Court Park, and how the King's horse, Sorrell, stumbled over the molehill, throwing His Ma-jesty to the ground, and causing in-juries that led to his death. "To the little gentleman in the velvet waist-coat," said the followers of the exiled Stuart king, as they raised their glasses at the table. When they could not openly proclaim these sentiments, they adopted another ruse, as the toast of "The King" was given by passing their wine glasses over the water, rug, thus drinking to the king "over the water." What distin-guishes Hildenborough from every other village in England is the "Hil-denborough Club" and the "Village Players," which have freed the vil-lage from that deadly dullness that is characteristic of a majority of small settlements.

characteristic of a majority of small settlements. The "Village Players of Lilden-borough" are famous throughout England. Many noted actors have witnessed their acting. Among them have been Sir Henry Irving, Sir Squire and Lady Bancroft, Lady Beerbohm Tree and Mr. and Mrs. Kendal and others, all of whom have declared themselves amazed at the Kendal and others, all of whom have declared themselves amazed at the histrionic talent displayed. There were no women in the company at first. Later on they participated as the company grew capable of greater efforts. So great now is its skill that the London daily newspapers of con-sequence always send their critics to all first-night performances Yes these workingmen are their own in-structors, and have never had the assistance of either a professional actor or stake manager. 

The proceeds of the company's public performance in the six weeks following Christmas go a long way toward enabling the club to spend large sums of money during the whole of the year without much call upon the scantily lined pockets of the vil-lagers. There was a time when many of the villagers got drunk regularly in order to keep themselves from re-membering that there was nothing else for them to do.

It is a night school, a playroom for adults, a sick benefit and burial society, a library, benefit and burial society, a library, reading room, common parlor, a mis-hap benevolent fund, an orchestral society, debating society, cricket club, football club, chess, checkers, quoits, cycling, fishing and other clubs, a bank, and a taxpayers' association-all rolled into one. No villager has been known to get intoxicated effices the club got hold of the place. Be-freshments of all kinds are sold at the clubhouse practically at cost price. There are no paid servants. Even the cleaning is done in turn by volunteers on the weekly Cleanliness Committee. Committee.

The annual dues are 5s. (\$1.20). All the villagers belong, women as well as men. The institution has nearly a thousand members. All the members' savings

All the members' savings in the bank are invested in loans to mem-bers, and the bank conducts a build-ing society to enable members to own their own houses. The club is the soul of the village. There is no part of the village life in which it does not participate, from the grow-ing of the biggest potatoes and cab-bages, and the handsomest roses, down to the best batting averages at cricket, and the longest throw with a cricket ball, from the handsomest baby of the year to the prettiest home-made frock.





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

# GENERAL WILSON

### Death of a Distinguished Soldier at Montreal.

#### Was With General Gordon at Khartoum.

curred yesterday of one of Canada's most distinguished soldiers, in the person of Major-General Frederick Wilson. Although General Wilson had been in feeble health for a very long time, it was only during the

past few weeks that he has been con-ined to his house. He gradually be-came weaker, until death ensued. He was born at Kingston in 1852. After education at Trinity College School and Trinity College, Toronto, the deceased, when nineteen years of School and Trinity College, Toronto, the deceased, when nineteen years of age, joined the 47th Battalion as an ensign. The following year, 1872, he was appointed second Beutenant in the Kingston Field Battery. In 1877 he was made captain of A Battery and won his majority in 1883. In 1884 he was transferred to the Imperial army and was sent to Egypt, where he served under Viscount Wolseley in the expedition sent out for the relief of General Gordon at Khartoum. He took part in several engagements during this expedition, and was receiled to Canada on the outbreak of the Northwest 285 bellion. He returned to Canada via Eng-kind, taking charge of a party of inval-ided and wounded soldiers. While in England he was presented to Queen Vie-England he was presented to Quéen Vic-toria, and received the Egyptian war medal and clasps and also the Khedive's star.

star. In 1897 he was appointed Com-mandant of the Royal School of Ar-tillery at Quebec, which post he occup-ied for many years, as well as that of Inspector of Artillery for the Quebec district. In 1907 he retired from active service, when he was granted the rank of Major-General by the Dominion Gov-erment. mment.

Shortly after his retirement from Shortly after his retirement from active service General Wilson removed with Mrs. Wilson to Montreal, and he has since resided here. He was prom-inent in sporting circles, despite persis-tent ill-health, and took a keen interest in the work of the Montreal Jockey Club. The deceased in 1892 married Florence Adelaide, daughter of the late Sir Hugh Allon who curvies him. There were no Allen, who survives him. There were no children. 



The re-port of the investigators viallettes the samples submitted and the sale of the candy eggs will therefore be permitted as heretofore. The health commissioner says in his report that there is perhaps too much

report that there is perhaps too much dye used in many cases, but that the coal tar colors, which are used for the purpose are not delecterious.
