We have been requested to give some information as to the culture of the grape in this open air, and in the absence of interesting intelligence, we willingly devote a few lines to this subject.

The vine is propagated by seed, cuttings or layers, as well as by grafting and budding or inoculation, but as these last presuppose an abundance of plants already grown, we shall confine ourselves to the three first.

If the vine is intended for ornament chiefly, or for shade, it may be allowed to grow freely, but if fruit is required, it must be carefully pruned. The best way to do this, is to watch the cutting, letting it produce two shoots, which are to be carefully trained, rubbing off all others while young.

Gardening is the sister art of Agriculture, but the nearer the latter approaches to the former, the more perfect it is. To have it said, "it looks more like a garden than a farm," is a species of praise that every agriculturist should look forward to.
