There is nothing so important in a public man, especially if he be the leader of a party, as backbone.

LABEL SUITS.

We are delighted to be able to announce that label suits will be entered immediately against some of the StJohn papers, by certain members of the House of Assembly whom these papers most foully belied yesterday. We earnestly recommend the honorable gentlemen to go on with their actions and bring the malignant offenders to justice. We do not know of any report we have heard for this many a day that has given us more unmixt pleasure than the above.

The passages for which these malicious detractors are to be called to account are the following:

It is said that Messrs Kenney and McManus were openly in favor of the amendment until the last moment, when some subtle influence appears to have moved them to the place they were all along intended to fill.—Sun.

There are fortunately two ways the miscreant who wrote the above may be proceeded against: by criminal process or by civil process. Guilt under the former is punished by imprisonment and lashing; under the latter a fine is imposed. But as Mr Livingston has no property and is only the paid Editor of the Sun, civil proceedings would be useless. We therefore strongly recommend the gentlemen slandered to take the other means: In such case Mr Livingston would assuredly be sent to jail, and probably be lashed there every morning. Which state of affairs would be most satisfactory to us. The same calumniator thus libels another honorable gentleman:

Mr Johnson is practically without a constituency, having lost the confidence of the electors of Kent.

We need not say to Mr Johnson to take precisely the same course as the other gentlemen: unless knowing too well of Mr Livingston's antecedents he may not deem it worth his while.

It is for the following slanders the Telegraph will likely have to stand before the bar of justice:

Among the names of those who were, until last evening, understood to be outspoken in favor of the amendment, gentlemen who lately visited Fredericton found the names of Messrs McManus and Kenney. When the latter announced his intention last evening to vote for the resolution he was cheered by the majority, for they well knew he had voluntarily given his adhesion to the opposite side.

The supporters of the amendment must have been equally astonished to see Mr McManus in his seat when Mr Sayre rose to vote for the amendment, for it is certain that the member for Gloucester had been outspoken in support of the amendment up to within a few hours of the closing of the debate. We are in the dark as to the influences which brought about these results.

It is but too painfully evident, that it does not dwell with the Editor of the Telegraph to conceive of an honest man. Why bless you sir the men whom you insinuate were dragged from the path of duty by wrong "influences" have never yet known what it is to be bought and sold. Can you say this Sir? And unable to say it Sir, must they be subject to your censure? Those men whom you slander have not run so far a lengthy political race, but their career has been honorable. Has yours sir? Their course has been straight, and their footsteps unflinching. Have yours? They have openly declared themselves prepared to give the new government a trial, disapproving strongly of the wrong doing of that governments' predecessor. Have you done this sir?

Let your career as a man, and let your utterances in your paper go to proclaim wherever the one has been seen and the other heard. No, And sir, will you to whom sincerity is an

unknown jewel, dare to accuse men who are unpurchasable with being the captives of "influences?" Will you put yourself up the first, who should be the last to censure?

Will you with your tarnished and dishonoured escutcheon, point with scorn to men whose shields bear not the slightest tarnish? You have incurred penalties, and it were well the men you have belied proceeded to prompt vengeance against you. But we fancy they care so little for the man, that they care much less for what he says. Do you hear?

Or have you been mistaken as to the character of the men you so vilely traduce? Why sir one of these is immeasurably your superior in every sense. He is a better scholar than you sir, and a better philosopher, though he does not mock ethics by making of them a hollow pipe to sound on every occasion to beglorify himself. As a type of a man, he is your superior; and the principles he once learned and believed, he has never forsaken. But you Mr. Elder. O fie! The other, Sir, is also far and far your superior. It is an unpleasant task surely to be obliged to refer to these things, but we feel it a point of duty. It is our principle to let him who deserves it bear his scolding, but we shall not stand by and see honorable men maligned by those whose whole course through life has been zigzag, treacherous and unmanly. We make a child's bargain with Mr Elder: let him leave his betters alone, and we shall deal more mercifully with him. What we have said already are the mere pattering drops that only give evidence of the shower.

If the Sun is not even a more accomplished coward than we take it to be, it will name the "subtle influences" which swayed Messrs Kenney and McManus. We ask the Sun in the name of the gentlemen it vilifies. But of course the explanation will not save it from punishment. It will not dare to further assert its charge.

It is the unscrupulous wirepuller, that notorious bridge builder, Mr Killam, who inspires the Sun with its malice and poison. Mr Killam owns the largest portion of the Sun, but the more he owns of it the poorer he is. It is no wonder he is striving for the Chief Commissionership that he may get a few more bridges to feast himself on. God, in his mercy, protect the Province from the clutches of this man.

THE COMPLEXION OF THE VOTE.

It may be interesting to analyze the vote in the Assembly on Wednesday evening, on the Seat of Government question from a party standpoint. To do so we must have recourse to the party divisions of last session, as there has been no distinct vote of the kind during the present sitting. It is of course understood that one or two very talkative supporters of the Government have gone over to the Opposition on certain personal grounds of a very selfish kind—but it is equally well understood that the Government has gained the support of several gentlemen who, if less loquacious, are much more valuable than the individuals who think the path to personal aggrandizement lies through the "shades" of Opposition.

To begin with we have, in favor of and opposed to Mr. Ryan's resolution:

Hon Mr Fraser, Hon Mr Wedderburn, Mr Landry, Mr Adams, Mr Perley, Mr Crawford, Mr Marshall, Mr Hanington.

Of course a man whose every motive and movement is of the most questionable character, (instance the man of the Sun of unsavory reputation wherever he is known) may value the truth so little as to insinuate that this division is per arrangement, but every intelligent man here, and every honest man everywhere, will know how scandalously the editor of the Sun is—no, indulges in his usual and characteristic propensity. But even he will scarcely claim that the "rank and file" of the House have been manipulated. We hold, therefore, of the Government supporters of the last session, on the resolution of Wednesday night, there were:

Mr. Sayre voted with the amendment but he was, and perhaps continued a friend of the Government during the last Session. Mr. Davidson, a supporter of the Government and of Mr. Ryan's resolution, paired off with Mr. Willis, a person in the Opposition in favor of the amendment.

It will be seen, therefore, that out of a vote of twenty in favor of Fredericton Mr. Blair was able to command just six votes! the remainder being made up of followers and supporters of the Hon. Attorney General! Our readers will readily see, at a glance, how much

York and Fredericton are indebted to the Honorable Leader of the Opposition! If we even give him the "independent," aspirant for the Surveyor-Generalship, Mr. Ryan, he is confronted with the equally "independent" aspirant for the office of Chief Commissioner, the wonderful Amasa E. Killam!—Mr Killam the bridge builder!

SOME MORE OF THE SUN'S CONSIDERENCY—AND LITERATURE.

Yesterday the miserable concern that edits the Sun wrote editorially:

"Not a newspaper in New Brunswick, outside of Fredericton, supports the creation of New Buildings. We have the unseemly spectacle of a majority of a government advocating such an impolitic and wild expenditure."

But on the morning of March 9th the same worthless editor wrote the following paragraph, also in the editorial column of the paper he is disgracing:

"The Government stand committed to this course, [the creation of New Buildings.] NEW BUILDINGS WILL BE ERRECTED EITHER IN FREDERICTON OR ST. JOHN.

Yes, especially "in Fredericton." But it is enough the Sun should speak for its own renegade and hired self: Let it not dare to speak for other newspapers.

The Sun is just about as learned as it is consistent. Here is an editorial paragraph we found in it yesterday, among a number of others equally as bad:

"METAPHORICALLY speaking tears stood in the Telegraph's eyes as it described the ruin which had been worked."

So much for what this ignorant fellow knows about metaphors. There are ten figures of speech in the English language, and the figure the vulgarian of the Sun uses, is metonymy, or a "substitution of the author for his works"—Bellal for his oily speeches *ezemplogratia*. Let the Sun confine itself to slanders and stamp compositions, but let it not dabble its coarse hands in literature.

THE DEBATE AND ITS CONCLUSION—THE VICTORY OURS.

In our last issue, we concluded our editorial review before Mr. Landry's speech was yet finished. That speech ended as it began, full of force and pregnant with points. As we have said before, Mr. Landry did not deal with his subject from local ground but he argued as the calm, unbiased advocate of the Province.

Mr Hill followed in a speech which was a complete scintillation of wit and amusing points. He had great fun at the expense of Mr. Willis' glit factories. He told the St. John members in the words of Byron, that they were the "mildest-mannered men that ever scolded a ship or cut a throat." How apt a sentence! It would be hard to find a more entertaining speaker than Mr. Hill, though he did vote for the amendment.

Mr Thompson followed in a rattling speech about which the greatest point was that it favored the resolution. Anything in favor of the resolution, of course, we would set down as a "good speech."

Mr Butler spoke in an earnest and practical way against patching up the old ruins.

Mr Colter, all honor to that sturdy yeoman of this county, gave some very hard hits. It was hard on the oily St. John representative to be sneered at for saying Sir Leonard Tilley would scorn to rob a province of its capital, after the Telegraph having charged that gentleman with plundering a Dominion. Mr Colter is a gentleman of good sense and excellent judgment. His speech was creditable.

Mr Sayre, who had taken more notes than would put out an encyclopedia, followed Mr Colter and made a speech rather passable, and only that, in a grammatical sense, but poor enough in every other respect.

And then the notorious Bridge Builder from Westmorland arose. He looked like a brooding assassin who had a knife for the throat of some honest man. He hit at the Government as an underground intriguer. He felt he was the first that raised the howl for the sake of destroying his friends of last winter. He did not venture to hold up his face in a manly way before the House: but hung his head and drew out his words between his teeth. A frank man, and an honorable man, stands boldly up and looks his fellows in the eyes, and says his say without fear or trembling. Mr. Killam's speech was one of expediency: it was made for the occasion; and like its author it amounted to very little that was good. He favored of course the amendment.

Mr. Lynott followed the Provincial Bridge Builder, and the contrast was as wide between the speeches, as between the reputation of the men who made them. Mr. Lynott's speech was frank, pointed and brilliant. He thought the "greatest number" in Mr. Elder's text "the greatest good of the greatest number," was number one, and we heartily agreed with him. He favored the resolution strongly and pointed out how absurd it would be to attempt to rehabilitate a structure, one half of which was consumed by fire, and the other half by time. Mr. Lynott was cheered at the close.

Mr. Kenny followed Mr. Lynott, in a speech which for calm and clear reasoning would be a credit to any one. He could not make up his mind to vote for repairing the old buildings because he had visited the ruins, and seen for himself that they were in a far worse condition even than Hon. Mr. Hanington said they were. His speech commanded the close attention of the House; and it would be well that little wind puffs like Mr. Barbare and Mr. Ritchie, who can make as eloquent a speech about a broomstick as about an empire, were to take pattern by him.

And then the father of the resolution, that political stray sheep, Mr. P. G. Ryan, stood up and delighted the House for fully an hour with a speech for which Fredericton people, we feel assured, were quite thankful. Mr Ryan made a great exertion to be even in the mimicking line with the Provincial Secretary and the pictures he drew created a good deal of fun. If Mr. Ryan were of the true political faith we should be delighted to bestow a good deal more praise on him: but as it is the duty of every honest partizan to withhold all praise from his opponents, unless what he cannot actually avoid, we desist.

By this time despair had settled upon the visages of the St. John men: Mr. Elder actually had turned blue. Some of them looked disgusted, and a few hung their heads. Then Mr. Speaker read the amendment, and the result was as follows:

Messrs Willis and Davidson paired off.

The resolution, then, carried by a majority of two. We may now say that but for a conjuncture of abnormal circumstances, the vote would not have stood as above: but we will know how to forgive those who were forced into a position as disagreeable to themselves as to us. The safety of the Seat of Government here, actually depended on the closeness of the contest. Who then from Fredericton can blame a certain three or four? We do not.

The new building it is said will be a very handsome one, and an ornament to the city. It would be a pity to put up buildings that would not be in keeping with the beauty of the surroundings. The work on the new buildings will likely commence about the first of May.

THE NEW BUILDINGS, ETC.



It is well that Mr. Blair should bear in mind that every straw he throws in the government's path at the present, is an obstacle in the way of New Buildings. Let Mr. Blair and his party forget for the hour that they are in opposition: let them join hands with the government till the New Buildings are secured. After that party lines can again be drawn, and test votes brought in of the opposition will.

It must be borne in mind that the House has decided in favor of New Buildings in Fredericton, and that this decision will be the government's justification before their constituents, and before their Country, for bringing in estimates for a New Building. On the floors of the House, in a mixed question, government members can well claim individuality, but having accepted the decision of the House their individuality is lost, and they become a portion of the government who must carry out the wishes of the Legislature. In this case it is folly to think that the positions of those members of the government who voted the amendment will be imperilled: but we believe the only authority for such a piece of rant is the unscrupulous A. E. Killam, through his organ the Sun.

The reckless St. John organ controlled by Mr Killam is evidently trying to split the Government. The Sun has just about as much influence in provincial politics as it has on the Eastern question. Most of its articles are indiscreet, and altogether it is calculated to harm considerably the party which in its unscrupulous ignorance tries to serve.

It is quite unfortunate that Mr. Justice Fisher should have said anything for Fredericton at the Northumberland Circuit.

THE DIVISION OF THIS CITY FROM YORK.

Next week a Bill will be presented to the Legislature, from our City Council, asking that the City of Fredericton get separate representation on the floors of the House. We confide this Bill to the care of our friends in the House of Assembly, outside of York. The members for York will oppose the Bill, because they are afraid of the County to do otherwise. In their breasts they know Fredericton should have a representative, and Mr. Blair was the first that started the question. We appeal to the justice of the House for support of the Bill in the name of the City of Fredericton.

We are glad to notice that the Surveyor General has so far recovered from his recent illness as to be able to attend to his duties in the House. He has brought down all the papers that Mr. Ryan asked for, and judging from the bulk a few more. We are entirely satisfied that Hon. M. Adams will come out of the investigation spotless; and that Mr. Ryan will make the fullest apology within his power.

The House took recess this afternoon, till yesterday morning when local business only will be transacted. Several of the members have gone home for the remainder of Holy Week.

The Fredericton Reporter is strongly under the impression that the seat of government ought to be in this place. Poor Fred!

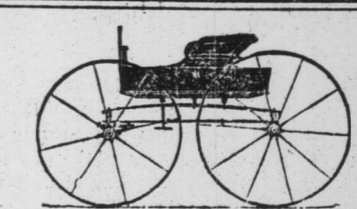
