Mrs. Penness, "G. M. Ward," well known in this city, where she resided for many years; but now of St. Anne de Beaupre, has two excellent contributions in the April number of Donahoe's Magazine. We reproduce the last named contribution on the fourth page of this week's HERALD. It is admirably written, most interesting, and well worthy of perusal.

The bill of fare provided by the Dominion Government for the consideration of Parliament does not indicate that there will be any large amount of new legislation proposed this session. It is true that the Insolvency bill and the Joint Stock Companies act, which were introduced last year but not passed, are again promised for this session, but it is doubtful whether the Government will press an Insolvency bill on the House until the parties most directly interested in such a measure—the bankers and traders—can get a little more unanimous in their ideas of what such an act ought to be than they appeared to be when the bill was before the Senate committee last year. As to the Joint Stock Companies act, it is the same as the bill introduced last year it contains some very material changes from the existing act, and will afford the House ample scope for some careful and useful legislation.

The debate on the address in reply to His Excellency's speech at the opening of Parliament, had not closed in the House of Commons yesterday. In the Senate the address was moved and seconded by Hon. Messrs. P. E. Island. The chief feature of the debate was the Premier's statement with respect to the Manitoba School Question. Sir McKenzie spoke at some length, closing in substance as follows: "I hope sincerely with the mover and seconder of the address that the people of Manitoba may see their way clear to solve this question among themselves, but if they believe the Parliament of Canada from the serious situation that will otherwise devolve upon it. It is a very serious matter for the Government of the Dominion to undertake to deal with a question that affects solely one section of the country. If the people of Manitoba are patriotic, they will keep this question out of the arena of Dominion politics, but if they desire to continue fighting fire brands among the electorate of this country, who I am sure are desirous of living in peace and harmony, they will reject all overtures and act upon the suggestions of those who are leading the opposition throughout the country. I can only say that when the time comes, if it should come, for action by this Government, the people of Canada will find that the present Administration are quite responsible which may fall upon them, no matter what the result might be."

In the dying hours of the Legislative session just closed, a discussion arose regarding Government House. It was started by Mr. Rogers, of Alberton, who introduced a resolution to the effect that, during the incumbency of the present Lieutenant Governor, the expenditure upon Government House should be confined to "such temporary repairs as shall be absolutely necessary," and that, at the expiration of the present term no further expenditure shall be incurred, and it, practically, the property be sold for the benefit of the Province. Apart from the fact that the Provincial Government has no power to sell the property unless permitted to do so by the Governor-General-in-Council, we believe it would be a piece of the greatest folly to do anything of the kind. At present, we need not pursue this subject further. The discussion, however, was not without its usefulness, as it was the occasion of eliciting from some supporters of the Government admissions regarding the financial management of the Province, which, otherwise, would not likely be made. For instance, Mr. Rogers (Alberton) admitted that the gentlemen of the Public Accounts committee "were scarcely putting the case fairly" when they figured out a surplus on the ordinary transactions of last year, in face of the fact that \$65,000 of income were "not revenue, but loans." This is exactly what we have been pointing out to the electors; and Mr. Rogers' admission just now shows that the truth will now and then unwittingly crop out, no matter how great efforts are made to suppress it.

The bye-elections, for the House of Commons, held on Wednesday last, did not result quite as favor-

ably for the Government as might be wished; yet, taking all the circumstances into account, it would be difficult to expect anything very different. In Antigonish, Melrose, Opposition, was elected by a majority of 118, over Chisholm, Conservative. Antigonish is an old opposition constituency, and had been repeatedly carried by the present Judge McIsaac, brother of the member just elected, by majorities ranging from 300 to 400. Only when it elected the late Sir John Thompson, did the county depart from its Grit traditions. Every body knows that Sir John was an exceptionally strong candidate, and one that any constituency might feel honored in having for its representative. Yet, even he was elected by only a very slim majority when he first ran for the Commons. Then again, Mr. McIsaac had been elected to the Provincial Legislature, a year or two ago, by a majority of about 400. He was a member of the Fielding Government and had all that Government's prestige at his back. He lives and practices his profession in the town of Antigonish, while Mr. Chisholm, his opponent, although a native of the place, lives in Halifax. For all these reasons, it will be seen that McIsaac was an exceptionally strong candidate. Moreover, so far as the school question is concerned, he pledged himself to support any remedial legislation that might be introduced. It is, therefore, evident that the chances were altogether against the Government's retaining the seat. Mr. Chisholm is a member of one of the leading law firms in Halifax; he is a man of talent and character, and we would have been very much pleased to have seen him elected. However, he made a good fight and may win next time.

In Vercheres, P. Q., the election was to fill a vacancy caused by the death of the late sitting member, Mr. Geoffroy. Vercheres has been represented in the House of Commons by a Grit member ever since Confederation. At the last general election, four years ago, the late member was returned by a majority of 168. On Wednesday last, the Liberal candidate was elected by a majority of 156. The member elect is a namesake and a relative of the late member. He is C. A. Geoffroy, Q. C., of Montreal, a very clever lawyer. Here again, the Manitoba school question was of no advantage to the Government candidate, as Mr. Geoffroy declared he was prepared to support the Government in any measure of remedial legislation. In Quebec West, the contest was not a party one. The candidates, McGreevy and Dobell, both announced themselves as independent Conservatives. Dobell was elected by a majority of seven. The Government won a great victory in Haldimand, where the Hon. Dr. Montague was re-elected by the splendid majority of 673. After wrenching this constituency from the Grits, and fighting many hard battles, Dr. Montague was returned at the last general election by a majority of 68, which he has now increased to the figure of 673. Dalton McCarthy made this fight his own, and had a namesake and law partner pitted against the Secretary of State. In addition to this, Mr. Sifton, Attorney-General of Manitoba; Joseph Martin, P. P., author of the Manitoba School Law, and the Rev. M. Finlay, Chaplain of the Grand Grand Lodge of Manitoba, came from Winnipeg and spoke against Dr. Montague. In the face of all this, the victory of the Secretary of State is a remarkable one. These bye-elections seem to indicate that the Manitoba question has had very little influence in determining the votes of the people.

Mr. Gordon directed attention to the fact that several questions asked by the Opposition early in the session had not yet been answered. Hon.
