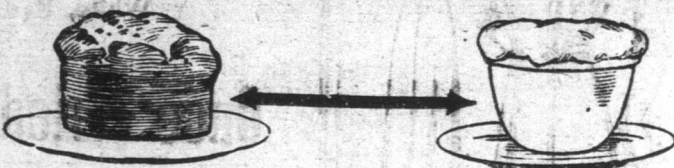

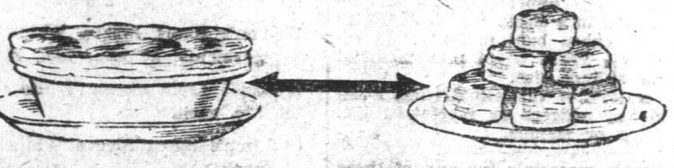

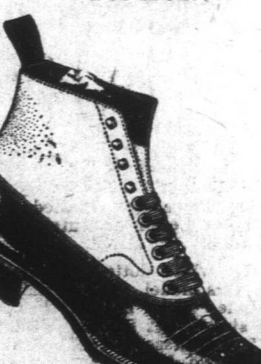

The policy of plum-picking, piecemeal and general extravagance is having its natural effect on the minds of electors, the majority of whom swung to the P. Party in the elections of May 1909. A general reaction has set in and a current of strong feeling is running with great force against the Government, which is increasing daily in volume and intensity. The extraordinary grants of timber areas, the distribution of so many of them among relatives and supporters of Government men, the giving-out in the way of patronage fees, and salaries, the carnival of general extravagance, are doing of the Government what is alarming the thoughtful men of the community and they are asking how long such things will last, when it will be possible for the electorate to put an end to these things, and for the reign of reason to commence again. The past of the Morris Government affords no hope for the future. Indeed, the outlook is nothing but one of wild extravagance, and much anxiety prevails as to how far such will-o'-the-wisp financing can go on without landing Newfoundland into such a financial bog that she will be unable

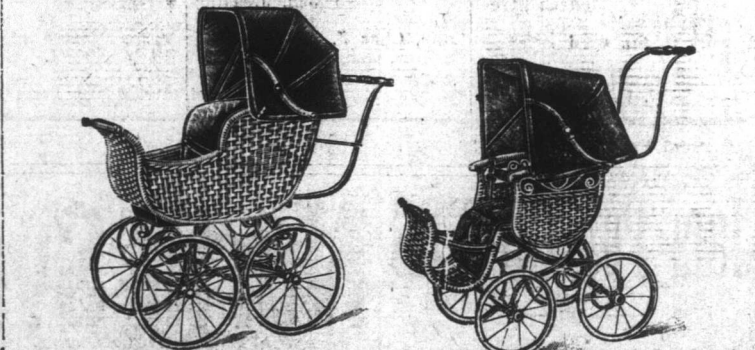

Tragedy of the Sea.

THE PRETORIAN HAS A SUCCESSION OF GALES—DURING THE PROGRESS OF ONE A SEA SWEEPS A CHILD NAMED MORGAN AND THIRD OFFICER BALLANTINE OVERBOARD.

The s.s. Pretorian arrived here at 11 a.m. to-day. She left Liverpool at 4 p.m. Saturday last and from the start had a succession of gales, mostly from the westward, with some running mountains high. Wednesday last the weather was more than ordinarily boisterous, and at 8 o'clock that evening a very high head sea ran. One exceptionally high sea was encountered and the ship made a very heavy plunge, shipping a large quantity of water on the after part of the vessel. The sea which ran on board struck Messrs. Mason and Walton, and the former was thrown with great violence against the wheel house and was severely cut about the head, while the latter received a sprained ankle from the nasty fall he also received. About an hour later Miss Mary Morgan, aged 14, was found to be missing, and a thorough search of the ship was made for her, but no tidings of her whereabouts could be had, and sorrowfully the captain and officers concluded the child had been washed overboard and drowned. Enquiries elicited the fact that she had been last seen on the after deck talking to Mr. Arthur Ballantine, the 3rd officer, just previous to the incident reported above. As Mr. Ballantine could not be found also, it was surmised that the same sea which struck Miss Morgan also took Mr. Ballantine overboard, and that when this occurred he was going to Miss Morgan's rescue. Miss Morgan, accompanied by her mother, was coming to St. John's to join her father, who is captain of Baine Johnston's Atilla. Mr. Morgan on learning of her little girl's tragic death collapsed from grief, and the awful occurrence spread a gloom over the whole ship for the rest of the voyage. Mr. Mason is recovering from the ugly wounds received, and on arrival here to-day when ashore to get medical treatment. Mr. Walton, who sacrificed his life in going to her rescue. Mr. Ballantine was 29 years old and in the prime of life and was a favorite with all on board the ship. The ship had on board 82 saloon passengers, 95 second class and 158 steerage. Special Hints on Gas Cooking.
The joint must hang downwards with its lowest part well above the level of the gas-burners. If the joint is too long, lay it flat on one of the gridiron shelves with the browning shelf close over it.

Meat shrinks with cooking, so there is no fear of it touching the shelf. If preferred, lay the joint on a trivet in a baking-tin and place this tin on a grid shelf, but many advise no baking-tin, merely the bottom pan that slips in along the floor in the bottom of the stove under the burners. If this plan is adopted, see that the bottom pan is clean, or gravy or dripping will be spoiled.

If baking pastry and roasting at the same time, put the joint on a grid shelf below the pastry, and the browning shelf close above the pastry, as the latter needs a sharper heat than the meat.

After the meat is cooked it may be necessary to turn on more gas for a few minutes to finish browning the pastry.

Household Notes.
To prepare a painted wall for papering, wash it first with a solution of half a pound of washing soda in a gallon of water, and then apply a warm mixture of half a pound of ground glue dissolved in a pail of water.

Wash leather furniture very gently with warm water in which there is a little vinegar with a dry cloth, and then restore the polish by mixing the white of two eggs and a little turpentine, which is applied with a flannel.

When working on retvet use only the finest pins or needles to pin, so as not to injure the pile, and when battings are essential do not draw the thread tight. Clip each stitch with scissors before pulling out the battings.

Shebeening in the Bay.

A WIFE'S TIMELY THOUGHTS AND SUGGESTIONS.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir— I feel driven to give your readers, the public of Harbor Grace and the atmosphere of Justice a few hints as to shebeening in this town and the way they are allowed to go on with their ruinous work. Did it ever occur to the people who were instrumental in passing the Local Option law in this town what a chance they were giving shebeens to poison our young men? I say poison, for it is nothing else. I heard of a case some time ago where a man after visiting one of those dens and drinking a quantity of the supposed liquor, on going home was suddenly seized with a serious attack of illness, and fearing he was going to die, ordered some of his household to his side, requesting them to go for the sergeant, so as he could make a statement. Just at this point he was seized with an attack of vomiting which he claims until this day saved his life. Recently our citizens have to get over the effects of a couple of glasses of the vile stuff sold for rum. Even a few days ago, on the occasion of our races, one man, who is living in St. John's, told me he drank a glass of rum in one of these places and about 10 o'clock at night he was taken sick in his lodging house, and so sick did he feel that he thought he would not live to see the daylight again. What are the policemen doing to stamp out this curse from our midst? I myself am heartbroken. Mr. Editor, and I am convinced that one shebeen is worse than ten public saloons. While I am opposed to spirits of all sorts, I am convinced that good liquor, such as public dealers are compelled to sell, is not nearly so injurious as that sold by shebeens. I say again, what are the authorities doing to stamp out these ruinous dens? The police know where it is sold, but presumably fearing a non-conviction they refrain from summoning parties; and so the illicit selling goes on. Let them summon very likely party soon coming from the States, and give them class or standing; let our citizens fall in line with the police, and give them tips as to where the body and soul-destroying stuff is dispensed, and if necessary let the law itself step in and give a reward out of the public treasury to the citizen who gives evidence that will lead to the conviction of one of these man-destroying shebeens. Then to my mind we will see the end of this cursed traffic. Let me get a step further: let the liquor that is sold for medical purposes be analyzed and let me be surprised to find some of it at least condemned as wholly unfit for human medicine. Our sons and our husbands are not safe where such stuff is procurable. I would like to go even further and mention other sorrowful incidents, but I must refrain for our present at least. I cannot close without calling on mothers, sisters and wives to make a determined effort to wipe out shebeens and to send or give to the police the names of the places where they know their brothers, fathers or sons resort and get liquor. Something will have to be done, or we will wake up one of these mornings and hear of some person being poisoned. Before I close I will draw the attention of the police to the disgraceful scene witnessed on our streets each night, and often in the day time of young lads promiscuously smoking the vile cigarette—boys from 10 to 15 years of age. The parties who sell these cigarettes to boys should be punished, and the boys themselves should get a reprimand. I don't like to be too hard on the policemen, but from my doorstep I can nightly see things that the police must see, and, seeing, put a stop to it. The above remarks may seem a little harsh, but they are the heart-thoughts of a HEART-BROKEN WIFE. Harbor Grace, Aug. 30, 11.

EXTRACTS
From C. H. E. Examiners' Reports.

PRELIMINARY GRADE.

Scripture History.—The Book of the Acts apparently contains more matter than these young candidates were able to bear in clear memory, and it might be better to take part of it another time. As it was, half the candidates were unable to distinguish persons and places in the incidents recorded, confusing such names as Peter and Paul, Aeneas and Ananias, Matthias and Matthew, Miletus and Melita; and evidently they had not been taught to follow the main course of events in St. Luke's great history of the spread of the Christian Faith.

English (Grammar).—As usual, the questions were well answered; but the names of the Parts of Speech were often misspelt.

Literature.—An excellent knowledge of the facts and contexts of the set of books was most clearly exhibited. A very pleasing feature was the decided improvement in the expression throughout. What had to be said, was said well.

History.—There were a few papers of some merit, but on the whole the answers were very unsatisfactory. So far as the candidates (with but few exceptions) showed any knowledge at all, it was of the least important incidents in the lives of the persons, or connected with the reigns, forming the subjects of the respective questions. . . . The spelling was in many cases very bad, and some proper names were hardly recognizable; e.g., "poise" or "poins" for "pious," "Chippinham" for "Chilpenham," Lord "Beggan" for Bacon, the "Uniformity" of Oxford (said to be founded by Alfred), "hearts of peace" (for "arts"), and "systematics" (coupled with "heretics").

Geography.—The general impression produced by the papers of 1911 was that they were on the whole inferior to those of 1910. . . . Question 1 required the drawing of a map of Newfoundland with a view to showing certain essential points. As a rule, this was satisfactorily done. The outline was wonderfully accurate for so intricate an outline as Newfoundland presents, and the various points were indicated with intelligence. . . . In Questions 5 and 7 a table of general facts had to be compiled and the facts of certain well-known places to be appraised. Though these produced, perhaps, the greatest crop of gross mistakes ("Germany," to wit, "the capital of France," and "the Niger as the second great river in Egypt"), they were not unsatisfactory on the whole.

Arithmetic.—A satisfactory average standard was reached.

Tots.—The Tots were in several instances done with complete accuracy, and only comparatively few candidates failed in this exercise.

Algebra.—A fair proportion of good work was done. The understanding of the work, a feature noted last year, is also very apparent this year.

Geometry.—The papers indicated an improvement over those of last year. Even so, there was little grasp of the subject on the part of a considerable number of the candidates. In many cases the preliminary work of the proposition was done, but the proof omitted.

Book-keeping.—While many batches of papers were distinctly good, others were very weak.

French.—The translation into French showed that the students had made a great effort to increase their vocabulary and their knowledge of idiomatic expressions. The passages from the set books were very well translated, and that accounts for the high percentage of passes obtained.

Latin.—The paper was very well done by the majority of candidates. The examiner repeats the suggestion made in the report on last year's examination—viz., that most of the candidates should be doing more advanced work.

General Elementary Science.—The work shows a great advance on that submitted last year.

Hygiene.—Though there were relatively few papers of high excellence, yet the general average of the work was unusually good.

Agriculture.—There was a somewhat greater number of weak candidates than last year, although, as in 1910, the work of the candidates at some centres was quite satisfactory.

Horticulture.—The answers, on the whole, were satisfactory; the subject had been carefully prepared and few blunders were made.

Plain Needlework.—There has been an earnest endeavour on the part of the candidates to cut out a pair of drawers suitable to be worn by a child, but the size required by any particular age did not seem to be realized. Taking the paper patterns as a whole, however, they were on a higher level than the calico specimens.

Shorthand.—In the majority of cases the papers showed a high standard of teaching.

Typewriting and Office Routine.—The quality of typewriting work has

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improved in both speed and accuracy. School Management.—Very few candidates answered all the questions satisfactorily. . . . The majority appeared to have learned from a book a comprehensive statement respecting school discipline. A minority of these selected from what was required, and wrote it accurately; the rest wrote either the whole of it or unsuitable parts, often with serious errors in grammar and spelling. According to the latter section, the marks of good discipline were either so many marks given daily or rewards and punishments.

Penmanship.—The papers were of good general merit, with a large number of Distinctions.

Drawing.—No improvement in methods or results is observable at present.

Fancy Needlework.—Much of the work shown was very good, and deserved commendation.

PRIMARY GRADE.

Spelling Test, Handwriting, and Reproduction of Story.—Only five candidates were absolutely free from error in the special test in Spelling, but the average was again fair, although so many mistakes in Spelling occurred in the "Reproduction of the Story," many of which would have been corrected had there been careful revision. . . . The reproduction of the Story was, on the whole, the most satisfactory part of the work, indicating great intelligence. The number obtaining the maximum was larger than ever before, and very few failed to appreciate the point of the story. On the whole, this work was at least equal to the best that has been sent up by candidates in this grade.

English Grammar.—The unevenness of this work makes general comment exceedingly difficult.

English Literature.—The work in this subject showed some improvement though few papers rose above mediocrity.

British History.—A fair proportion of candidates sent up intelligent and well informed papers, but there was a large amount of mere cram work, reproduced verbatim from text or notebooks.

Geography.—Many of the papers were exceedingly done, and gave evidence of careful and thoughtful teaching.

Arithmetic.—The questions on the ordinary rules were, with the exception of those in decimals, hardly so well answered as usual, but better results were secured in the rest of the paper.

Tots.—The number who obtained full marks on this paper was not large, but a fair proportion did more or less satisfactorily. Several, however, failed completely.

Algebra.—A fair proportion of satisfactory work was done.

Geometry.—The form displayed by the candidates is somewhat better than it was last year.

Hygiene.—The papers were, on the whole, of good quality. Most candidates attempted every question, and showed not merely fair knowledge of book-work, but also a good deal of common sense in the application of that knowledge.

Plain Needlework.—The work of a great many of the candidates deserved commendation, especially in the cutting-out of the specified garment, a working-woman's apron. The majority of the candidates sent in a sensible garment, although the meaning of a pattern cut half-size was not generally understood.

Drawing.—The Drawings from the Flat showed no improvement in the aggregate.

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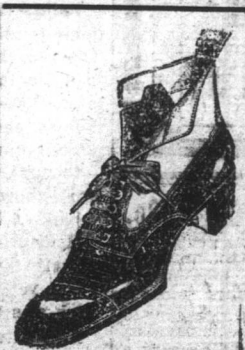
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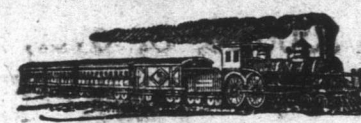
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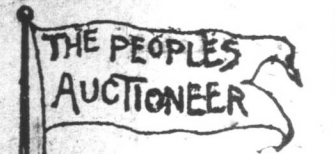
