





disappointing. In vain the loveliest eyes looked into his; in vain the most costly Parisian garments were donned in his honor; in vain were parties arranged, or social gatherings got together. **A Thrilling Adventure.**

A graphic account of a fatal accident which befell the Bullock Workman expedition in the Himalayas is given in the following despatch sent by Mrs. Bullock Korkman to Skardu (Cachmere) by a native runner, and just received by Frederick Burlingham.

"On the crossing of the Bilaphe pass, at about 18,000 feet, Mrs. Bullock Workman and an Italian porter named Chenez, who had been with her on four Himalayan expeditions, left the caravan in order that Dr. Hunter Workman might take a photo of them from a picturesque standpoint. After the picture was taken, Chenez who was carrying the rope and his rucksack strode ahead, taking another route to join the caravan. Mrs. Bullock Workman followed him at about three steps, when suddenly he disappeared from view, carrying with him the rope, and thus preventing his own immediate rescue.

"Mrs. Workman was left standing appalled on the brink of a blue hole in the ice. She called to the others who hurried into the spot. A guide called down into the crevasse, and a faint reply came from Chenez far below that he was still alive.

"Six men started at once after a guide who had the remaining rope, and in an hour he returned. After 1½ hours in the frigid crevasse, buried at eighty feet in the glacier, the porter was brought out on the rope conscious, but without pulse and nearly frozen. He was carried down to a camp, where everything possible was done to rescue him, but he never recovered, and died the same night from shock."

### All's Well That Ends Well.

We publish to-day a letter from Mr. F. J. Morris, K.C., its Solicitor of the City Council on the Condon case, in which he submits that the preamble of the Council resolution does not mean that he advised the Council that the Council was not liable to Condon.

On the contrary, he states that when he learnt all the facts he advised a settlement of the case.

The case however proceeded to judgment, and after judgment, if we mistake not, it was stated that an appeal would be made. We understand the matter of appeal has been abandoned.

It is clear however from the fact that the Council proceeded with the case to judgment, and from the words of the preamble under reference that the Council sought a judicial decision as to the liability in such cases.

We quote the preamble again to make this clear: "Whereas the Council had been advised from time to time by its Solicitor in somewhat similar cases that the city was not responsible in such a case and this case was contested by the Council in order to have a judicial decision upon the principle of liability in the matter."

The Council did not accept the advice of the Solicitor to make a settlement, when he advised a settlement. But now Condon has his judgment; the Council has a judicial decision and Mr. Morris has made his attitude and advice clear, and all's well that ends well.

### Terrible Shooting Accident.

From passengers who arrived by the Fortia to-day we learned particulars of the terrible shooting accident that occurred at Grand Bank, a brief account of which has already appeared in the Telegram. The tragedy happened on Thursday last. A boy named Butler, aged 15, went down on the beach with a gun to go bird shooting. Meanwhile he had been warned by his mother to stop using the firearm. Butler, after loading the gun, sat upon a rock and pointed it at a covey of birds. He took his time in taking sight, when suddenly Thomas Thornhill, aged 14, who was running along the shore, stumbled. His head struck the muzzle of the gun in falling. Immediately the trigger snapped and the charge took Thornhill full in the face, killing him instantly. He was almost blown to pieces. His brains, which were completely blown out, were found several yards distant, whilst pieces of his head were scattered around the seashore. The slight, our informant says, was a horrible one. The body of the victim was brought to the home of his parents, Dr. McDonald, who was summoned, held a post mortem examination and pronounced death to be instantaneous. In the interim the lad Butler was taken into custody by Const. Bennett. An enquiry into the death of the deceased was conducted by Magistrate Forsey and it was found that the boy who carried the firearm was blameless, and was let go. The tragedy has cast a gloom over the people of Grand Bank.





### Fire Had a Fatal Ending

Friends of Mr. Elijah Mercer, of Shoal Harbor, N. D. B., had a letter from him on Saturday telling of a great calamity which recently befell him and the relation of which must excite feelings of sympathy in the hearts of all who read about it.

On Friday night, the 29th November, his house caught fire and despite every effort of friends and neighbours to save it the structure was consumed and Mr. Mercer and family were left homeless. Besides the house the entire contents were destroyed with the exception of two beds, and not a cent of insurance was held on the house or effects. ### Solicitor Advised a Settlement.

Editor Evening Telegram.  
Dear Sir,—In your Editorial comments on the Condon case, published in Saturday's issue, you say: "The Council declares in one of the preambles to the Resolutions passed yesterday, that its legal officer advised in this and similar cases, the Council was not legally liable."  
You then quote the preamble, which is as follows:—

"Whereas the Council had been advised from time to time by its Solicitor in somewhat similar cases that the City was not responsible in such a case, and this case was contested by the Council in order to have a judicial decision upon the principle of liability in the matter."

This preamble, I submit, does not allege, as you have inferred, that the Legal Officer advised the Council in this case, that it was not legally liable. Further, it could not have been the intention of the mover of the Resolutions, that such an inference should be deduced therefrom, as he knew that when the Collector had been made aware of all the facts in connection with Condon's case, he advised the Council to negotiate a settlement of the claim.

The similarity or dissimilarity of other cases to that of Condon's, must entirely depend on the facts surrounding them, and the application of the law, in each case, would be governed by the facts disclosed.

As a brother professional I know you will appreciate the reason why I trouble you with the publication of this note.

### Disabled Steamer Arrives.

## To Speak or Not to Speak.

BY RUTH CAMERON.



Dear Friend,—  
 Please give your opinion on the subject of why mothers should spank their children or should not. My opinion is that they should when needed. Also at what age.

The above terse little note was signed by a "Miss." Somehow I imagine her a stern young aunt, who looks with disfavor upon the way her married sister "spares the rod and spoils the child."

Seriously, the little note opens up two subjects about which I have often thought. First, a corporal punishment good for children? Second, at what age should discipline begin?

It's quite a while, isn't it, since I had a symposium of my reader friends views on any subject. How is this for a chance to start the ball rolling again? This is a subject upon which almost all women and some men are likely to have very decided opinions. Let's have them. Maiden aunts and mothers of twelve, fathers, and even old bachelors who have ideas on this subject, are urged to contribute their theories and experience.

To start the discussion, here are a few of my humble opinions.

As to whether corporal punishment is advisable or not; it seems to me the only answer to that is—that depends. There are some children who can be managed without corporal punishment and some children who simply cannot. It is a matter for study.

I don't think corporal punishment

is such a terrible thing as some people consider it. To me it is infinitely better than some other forms of discipline such as frightening or threatening a child. I don't believe in spanking. I think the average mother's spanking simply makes a child mad and doesn't hurt it very much. A switch is both better and easier. If you are going to make pain the punishment of misdeeds, be sure you really inflict pain.

Never punish a child when you are angry. That's too much like revenge. Make him realize that the whipping is a consequence of his misdeeds, not your way of avenging yourself for the trouble he has caused.

The word consequence reminds me that the very best punishments to my mind, are those which fit the sin. A mischievous little boy had a trick of pulling his baby sister's hair. Spanking did no good. One day his mother punished him by pulling his hair; that eventually cured him.

The age at which discipline should begin is a vital question. I know a mother who thinks it is very strange that she cannot control her child despite repeated punishments. She forgets that up to the time he was two years old she made no attempt at discipline, and that, during that time, his naturally strong will gained tremendous headway. It seems to me that as soon as a child is old enough to throw his toys down for the pleasure of seeing them brought back, he is old enough to be taught that his mother isn't going to do that and to be disciplined if he persists.

What do you think? Let's have a real nice chat about it.

## Household Notes.

To test the freshness of eggs hold them, one at a time, to a bright light. If they are fresh the yolks will show clear. If an egg will float in water, it is a sure sign that it is old.

Rancid butter can be sweetened by melting it, then skim it, and place a piece of light brown toast in it. In a few minutes the toast will have absorbed the unpleasant taste and smell. The best way to stew prunes is to wash them and soak in fresh cold water over night. In the morning, stew slowly without sugar until tender. They will be plump and well flavored.

When cutting garments from a paper pattern which you are likely to use again, it is wise to make a note on the pattern of the least amount of material from which the garment can be cut.

A wise method of deciding whether a color is becoming or not is to take a piece of material and lay it over the forehead close to the face. Then if the effect is good, it can be safely worn.

In choosing wall paper, it is safe to consider light buff advisable when the outlook is either due north or east. If the room has a south or west exposure old blue or shades of green or rose are very satisfactory.

Boiled ham should be soaked for several hours in cold water to cover. Wash thoroughly, trim off the hard skin near the bone, put in a kettle, cover with cold water, heat to boiling point and cook slowly until tender.

It is necessary to air blankets and beds thoroughly in the morning air, because there is bound to be a certain amount of moisture from the body, and unless it is thoroughly aired out, the bed is not sweet and fresh and dry.

The majority of grease stains may be removed from woollens by such solvents as alcohol, ether, chloroform or gasoline. The grease will be dissolved by gently rubbing the spot with a piece of the same material dipped in one of the solvents.

When drying knitted things, care should be taken that the knitted things keep their measured shape, so it is necessary to look at them several times in the drying. When they are half dry, they should be turned and pulled by hand.

Dust is a great enemy to lace—fog is another, therefore, if precious old lace is stored away, be careful that it is protected from dust, and it should be taken out and exposed to the air from time to time before an open window on a clear day.

The children, when blowing soap bubbles or sprinkling the flowers, need a rubber apron. This can be made from an old raincoat. Round the corners, hollow out the neck, bind the edge, and attach a string to the neck and waist.

Shoulder of pork is delicious when stuffed. Buy a nice fresh shoulder, have the butcher bone it, then stuff it. Sew it up tight, roll it in a cloth and boil it two hours. Then remove the cloth from it, put it in an iron baking pan and bake it two hours.

A very important point in home dressmaking—especially in making coats and skirts, is the frequent use of the iron. Unless the seams are carefully pressed with a hot iron over a damp cloth, the garment, however well cut, will have an amateur look.

Remember when sewing on dark material by artificial light to wear a light colored apron, and spread a white cloth on the sewing table. These things will increase the light

to an appreciable extent, and the strain on the eyes will not be so great.

The best finish for the kitchen floor is usually decided by the condition of the floor. Where it is old and seamed, cover it with rag carpet with a good sized piece of oilcloth under the stove and in front of the sink. If it is a good smooth floor, put linoleum on it. An oiled or painted floor is not advisable unless there are servants to scrub it every day.

Sweetbreads spoil very quickly. They should be removed from the paper as soon as they come from the market, plunged into cold water and allowed to stand for an hour, then drained and put into boiling water, into which you have put lemon juice and salt. Allow them to cook very slowly twenty minutes; drain again and plunge into cold water, then they will keep firm and white. Sweetbread should always be treated in this way for subsequent cooking.

## Cable News. 'Long Live the King.'

Special to the Evening Telegram. NEW YORK, Dec. 8.

The New York World says Canada's contribution to Imperial Defence will involve a far-reaching change in the constitutional relations between the Mother Country and her colonies. While Australia and South Africa may be willing to retain their present subordinate roles when by payment of a few millions towards the British Navy, they may acquire the right to a voice in the Imperial Councils; and what may India look for if the native Princes succeed in their scheme for raising a huge fund for naval purposes? In the Canadian proposals is the beginning of a new form of Imperial Federation. The New York Tribune says: The almost unanimous and general enthusiastic approval which is given to this arrangement by the British press, and the assurance which Premier Borden says he has that it will be welcomed by the British government, presents a strong contrast to the British attitude towards the Colonies in other respects. Nevertheless the acceptance of this Canadian offer with its conditions by the present Liberal, and almost radical, government means much in itself, and strikingly suggests how much more in the same direction might be done, if the Unionists, committed to Chamberlain's Colonial fiscal policy, should be returned to power. A British Empire in six continents, with Imperial representatives in the Councils of Imperial Defence, and an Imperial system of free Trade within the Empire, and protection without it, would be a greater factor in the World's affairs than the Empire is today.

Special to the Evening Telegram. LONDON, Dec. 8.

The British Government has placed the historic St. James' Palace at the disposal of the Peace plenipotentiaries representing Turkey and the Balkan States. The meetings, which commence on Friday, are being looked forward to with great interest, and a satisfactory solution of the problem which has troubled Europe for so many years, is hoped for. It is not yet definitely decided whether Greece will participate. A report is published that she will enter into separate peace negotiations with Turkey in one of the European capitals, probably Vienna.

Special to the Evening Telegram. LONDON, Dec. 8.

A strike has been declared by locomotive engineers on the London and Northwestern Railway Company, because one of the engineers engaged on the Main Line, owing to a conviction for drunkenness, whilst on duty was reduced to running a pilot engine. The punished man had been promised by the management that if his future conduct was good he be reinstated in his old position, but the Locomotive Engineers' Union demanded his immediate reinstatement. If this was not granted, the men would be called out. Three thousand have already quit work, and the whole of the main and branch lines are being organized.

Special to the Evening Telegram. LONDON, Dec. 8.

John Redmond, Nationalist leader, is the latest victim of the Suffragettes. At Dalston last night for an hour and a half he watched the ejection of interrupters. Their desperate resistance to the ushers caused a rapid succession of rowdy scenes, and men and women were thrown bodily from the hall. Among the men were some clergy-men, who protested against the rough handling of the women. During half an hour Redmond was able to utter only a single sentence, which was that it seemed to him almost tragic that the cause of Women, which was so great in the minds and hearts of many, should be turned into a comic interlude.

Special to the Evening Telegram. VIENNA, Dec. 8.

The alliance between Austria-Hungary, Germany and Italy has been renewed without alteration. Information received from Belgrade to-day is to the effect that the union of Serbian merchants have decided to boycott all Austrian products. Servian artillery has taken up positions on the banks of the Danube below Belgrade, commanding several important points on Austrian territory.

Special to the Evening Telegram. WELLINGTON, N.Z., Dec. 8.

The Wellington Post, enlarging his action, says Premier Borden successfully claimed that Canada's contribution towards Imperial defence should give her a share in control of the Imperial policy. New Zealand's gift of a Dreadnought during the Premiership of Sir Joseph Ward represented sentiment, but Canada's Dreadnoughts combine sentiment and statesmanship in the happiest possible way.

Special to the Evening Telegram. LONDON, Dec. 8.

Price Louis of Battenburg, who was appointed First Sea Lord to succeed Sir Francis Bridgeman, has resigned on account of ill-health.

When a work of this kind falls into the hands of a musician like Mr. Bastow, there can be but one result, and fortunate enough to be present, in that result is voiced by all who were words such as "fine," "great," "beautiful," the general opinion being, that nothing in the way of church music has been heard in Macon for years that can measure up to the performance, last Thursday evening.

The sum up: To give such a rendition of a work of this nature with nothing but amateurs, speaks volumes for the choirmaster, not only as to his ability, but also his courage and perseverance.

The soloists were Miss Philo Pendleton, soprano; Mrs. H. C. Herrington, alto; Mr. O. E. Nicholls, tenor; Mr. H. G. Howell, bass. All of whom acquitted themselves most creditably.—Macon, U.S.A., Daily Telegraph, Dec. 1st, 1912.






