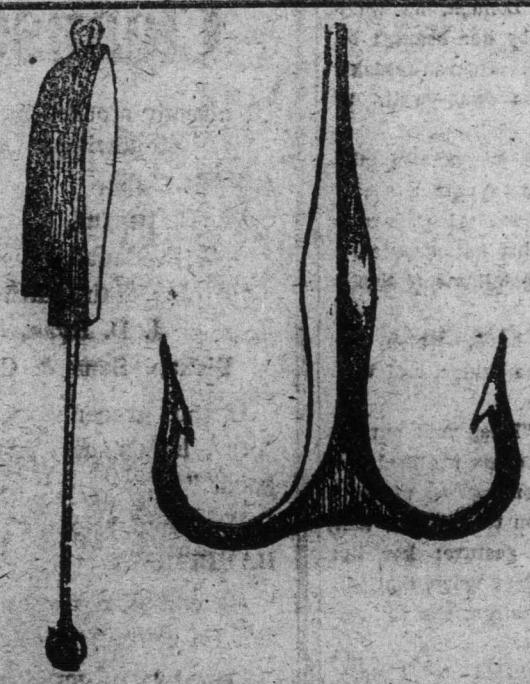

"Is there another path round?" he said, looking about him.

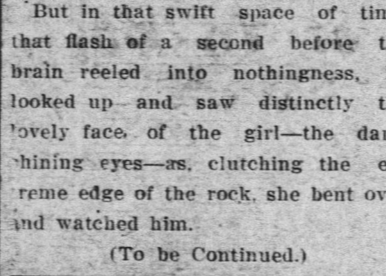
Either she did not hear him, or did not choose to reply, and Vane sent the horse forward.

Public Duty.

We follow up to-day our remarks of Saturday last as to the deplorable conditions into which the country has been plunged by the incapacity, bungling, or rascality of the present Government, and the absolute need of a strong, experienced and honorable man to form a new Government. We would emphasize the fact that it is incumbent upon all of us to make serious preparations for the coming fight, which will be waged before long. In order that we may be better prepared for that fight, let us make a diagnosis of the cause that led to the present condition of affairs. We think a little careful examination will disclose that the present Government obtained power because of the apathy and carelessness of the electors. As we pointed out in a previous issue, **Five Hundred Extra Votes Poll-ed for the Liberal Party** would have prevented the calamity which ensued as a result of its defeat. Now there are **fifty-seven thousand** registered voters in Newfoundland, thanks to the **Manhood Suffrage Act** of Sir Robert Bond, who are called upon by that law to do their duty by exercising their power of choice of representatives. More than **twelve thousands** of these electors did not vote. Probably some of them were prevented from doing so by circumstances over which they had no control, but it is certain that the greater portion of the twelve thousand manifested apathy and carelessness, with the result we have stated. The fishermen of the

country have been roused, and recognizing the mistake they made at the last election, they are banding themselves together for **Strong United Action Next November.** They are determined to undo the mischief that was done in 1909, and they have set a magnificent example to the citizens of St. John's. There are **Nine Thousand odd** registered voters in St. John's, and fifteen hundred of them did not vote last election. It is doing our leading citizens no injustice to say they largely swell the number of apathetic and indifferent voters. If this is true, and we believe it is true, then it is a matter which calls for consideration. Surely it is not too much to expect that our leading citizens will deem it their duty to comply with the law and go to the polls, and that they will also aid in other work which has to be done if financial embarrassment is not to follow wild and extravagant expenditure and the **Bartering Away of the Revenues of the Country.** They can no longer sit still and "hope" that matters will be made better some way or other. They must be up and doing, aiding in every possible way to bring about the complete overthrow of those who are bringing ruin and jeopardizing the very foundations of our existence as an independent colony. If incapacity, bungling and corruption hold sway in the Government of

the Colony to-day, the indifference and apathy of our leading citizens is in part responsible for it. Their eager participation in material things has blinded their eyes to the direction things are trending. Citizenship, let it be remembered, implies duty to the State. We may each perform that duty in our own way and

according to our own respective abilities, but we shirk that duty at our peril. It is up to every citizen in Newfoundland, from the highest to the lowest, from the richest to the poorest, to do his duty and let the motto for each of us be: **"The Love of My Country Leads Me."**

The President of the Fishermen's Union Visits Sir Robert Bond.

The President of the Fishermen's Protective Union, Mr. W. F. Coaker, left town by this morning's train for the Grange, Whitebourne, to call on Sir Robert Bond and lay before him the earnest appeal of the Northern Districts that he will lead the Liberal Party in the political fight of November next. Union and non-Union men have re-

quested Mr. Coaker to be the bearer of their wishes. The fishermen are alive to the imminent danger of a divided opposition, and that they are convinced that Sir Robert Bond is THE man pre-eminently qualified to bring together a strong and invincible party for the battle of the polls, and who can be relied upon absolutely to protect their interests when returned to power.

Lies Nailed Categorically.

Mr. Peter Cowan, Who Was Present at the F.P.U. Meeting at Change Islands, Shows Up the Falsehoods Published This Morning in a Letter in the Daily News.

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir,—I have no wish to enter into any political discussion through the columns of the press, but as I was present at Mr. Coaker's meeting at Change Islands, on August 14th, I feel it my duty to contradict several statements made in a letter from Change Islands, dated August 9th, and published in this morning's issue of the Daily News.

After reading the letter I have come to the conclusion that the writer was not present, as I feel sure no one at Change Islands would write such deliberate falsehoods, and some one has been bluffing the writer of the letter signed "One who was there."

LIE No. 1. "One who was there" starts off by saying the meeting was a private one and was attended by a few men and a crowd of women and children. If the meeting was private, how did he get in? The meeting was not private but open to all who wished to attend.

LIE No. 2. "He was insisting on at least ten seats for F. P. U. candidates, saying he would not be satisfied with less than this, as the interests of the Union would not be safe. He wanted a Union candidate for Fogo, three more for Bonavista, three for Trinity, one for Bay de Verde, one for Port de Grave and one for Harbour Grace, and he stated he would not enter into any agreement unless he got this number."

LIE No. 3. "He told the meeting what the new steamer Kintall was costing, and how and from whom he proposed to pay for it. He also told them some of the conditions under which Bond was to go in with him, one of which was that if Bond got in, a lot of freight was to be given the steamer."

LIE No. 4. "He also said that Bond had agreed to give an old age pension of \$100 to every man over 70, \$50 to every woman."

LIE No. 5. "He also stated that Bond had agreed to establish non-sectarian schools, and to outlaw every debt after two years due."

LIE No. 6. "He appealed to the audience to stand by him and the Union, and declared that if they did he would make Bond come to his terms."

LIE No. 7. "His people are beginning to feel sick over his actions, and are satisfied that the Union is not going to have a long life."

As I have quite a number of friends at Change Islands I may be hitting one of them but still I could not allow this letter to pass unnoticed, knowing that what was stated was false and likely to do harm. If "One Who was There" will sign his own name to future letters I shall be pleased to reply to them.

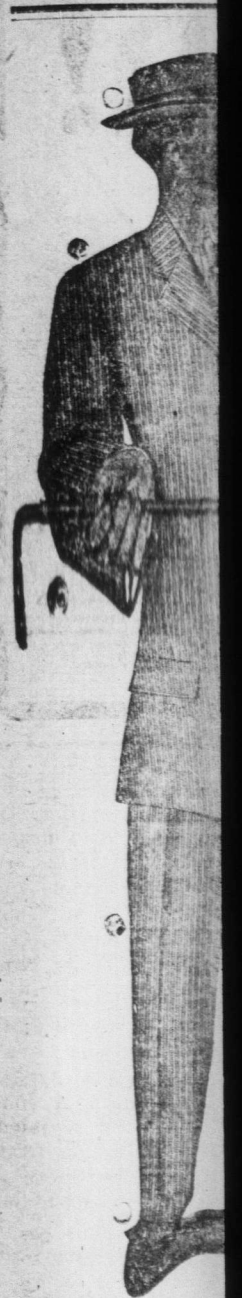

7,000 Year Old Art of Egypt.

London, August 13.—The antiquities found by the Egypt Exploration Fund workers, principally in the cemetery at Abydos, are on view for a time at Burlington House. Afterward they are to be divided among the subscribers to the fund in the United States, England and Belgium, and some lucky persons may hope to have an object d'art nearly seven thousand years old in their homes at an early date.

In a first dynasty tomb, 5004 B.C., the explorers found a pair of ivory lions, rather stumpy and square cut, but still unmistakable for any other animal. An alabaster vase of about the same date is in perfect preservation, and a beautiful piece of work. From a tomb dating from the twelfth dynasty (2062 B.C.) comes an amethyst collar, with graduated stones as carefully selected by the jeweller of that age as those of the famous missing pearl collar.

Even the contortions of the Russian danseuse were not unknown to the old Egyptians, judging from the fragment of "an acrobatic dancing girl," in limestone, discovered in a tomb which dates from about 1700 B.C.

A portion of the Abydos cemetery was evidently set apart for interment of the sacred ibis, a bird dedicated to the god Thoth. A large number of unutilized specimens of the bird, with beautiful patterns depicted on them, are on exhibition. Some of the remains are still in the earthenware coffins that have been in their graves for some five thousand to six thousand years.

Next year the explorers are proposing to turn their attention to the Temple of Osiris, where they expect to make equally interesting finds. The temple is believed to have been built by one of the sons of Ramesses. At present it is deep down in the desert, covered by the rubbish that has been thrown away by the explorers of the Temple of Seti.

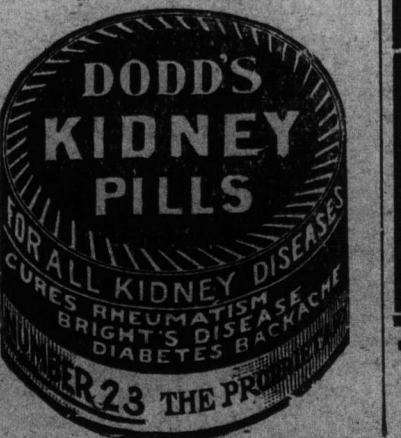

BERLIN, To-day.
The majority of Berlin newspapers print the Government's decision not to participate in the Panama Pacific Exposition, without comment. The "Deutsche Tages Zeitung," the official organ of the Agrarian League, says there are many in Germany who will not be pleased by the over-polite manner in which the Government excused itself from participation in the Exposition. Judging from former experiences, it will not make the desired impression on Americans, either. The "Tagliche Rundschau" doubts the wisdom of the decision. The "Tageblatt" says Germany's abstention from this remarkable opportunity to win new markets and to give the States actual proof of our friendliness, is a serious mistake. German exporters have tremendous interests on both sides of the Pacific.

MATTEWAN, To-day.

Five confederates mailed the car in which Thaw escaped, and the big black Limousine which trailed it past the asylum gate. HONG KONG, To-day.
The Federal General, Lung Chi Kung, who is President Yuan Shi Kai's candidate for Governor of Canton, disembarked from the government gunboat at Hong Kong on Saturday, to take charge of the city. Fighting which is being aided by pirates is proceeding against the government troops, some miles beyond Canton. Guerrillas are prosecuting their warfare principally for the purpose of looting. On one corner of the street in Canton the bodies of sixty persons killed in the fighting Friday, were found, all the men were in uniforms. The Red Cross has been unable to reach the zone of the fighting in Canton, where frightful conditions are reported to exist among the wounded owing to the great heat. Wholesale executions in Canton are taking place daily.

Cable News.

LONDON, August 17.
While returning from a memorial service to the wife of Colonel Seeley, General Sir Ian Hamilton was slightly injured by a box falling on his head from the top of his motor. He was able to resume his duties at the War Office yesterday.

HALIFAX, August 17.
A Liverpool cable says the officials of the White Star Steamship Co. decline to affirm or deny the rumor that it is their intention to follow the Cunard Line in an endeavor to abandon Queenstown as a port of call for their steamers.

HALIFAX, August 18.
A cable from London says the fourth cruiser squadron, which is to have Bermuda for its base, and which has been ordered to leave the home ports for its new station Sept. 20th, consists of the armoured cruisers, Suffolk, flying the flag of Rear-Admiral Sir C. Crocock, Berwick and Donegal. It is understood the squadron will cruise around the West Indian Islands, as well as pay occasional visits to Halifax.

HONG KONG, August 17.
Five thousand people are reported to have been killed in the fighting that is going on in Canton and its environs between the government forces and the rebels. Looting continues, and there has been a wholesale destruction of property, among the buildings destroyed being Canton governor's yamen. Residents in the foreign quarter of Canton had many narrow escapes from bursting shells. The rebels hope to embolden the foreigners in the trouble. Prisoners are being led through the streets of Canton by wires running through holes drilled in their noses. This and other methods of torturing the prisoners is common.

MATTEWAN, August 18.
Harry K. Thaw, slayer of Stanford White, escaped from the hospital for criminal insane at 7.45 this morning. The dash for liberty was through an open gate, and then a dash for the open doorway of a powerful auto which stood quivering outside. In a night like a rocket for the Connecticut State line, 30 miles away, he accomplished his escape. To-night he is still at large, and the hospital authorities feel certain he is outside the State. Once beyond the boundaries he is free. Only months, perhaps of litigation can bring him back to Mattewan, and then only in the event he is adjudged insane in the State to which he has fled.

Crabonear Man Killed in Chelsea.

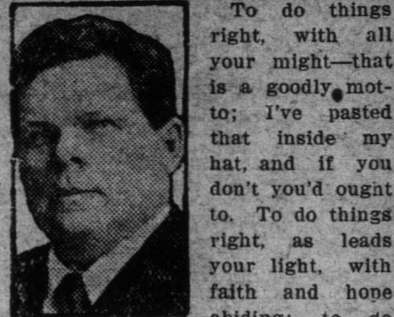

The Chief was on his way to a fire in the five-storey tenement at No. 21 West Sixty-fifth street. As his machine swung from Seventy-seventh street into Broadway he heard a hall from the heavens and saw Grey's biplane swinging into the course. Grey had made a spectacular flight across the river, and seeing the smoke cloud and hearing the bells he thought he'd go to the fire, too.

Biplane and automobile dashed to Sixty-fifth street. Burns in the lead, Grey swung around the burning building, and then sped away across the river.

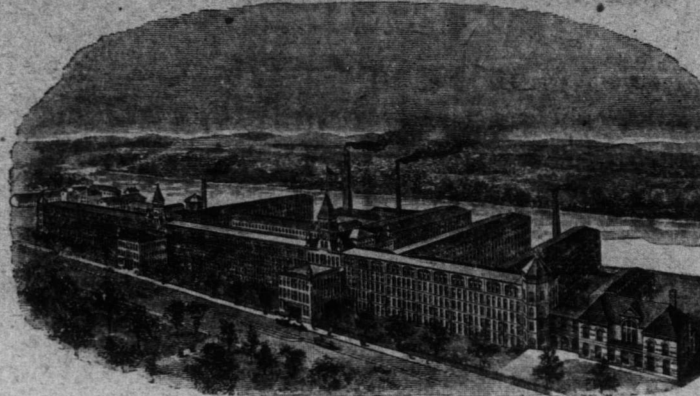
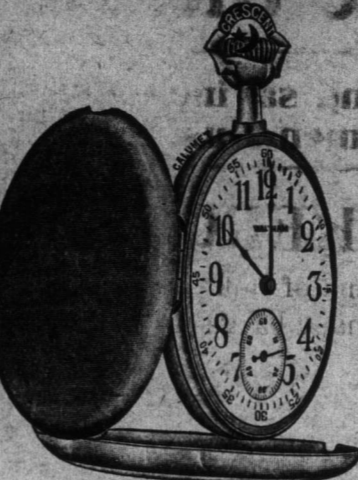

He was forcibly detained and ordered to lifelong confinement in an isolated farm several miles from St. Louis.

His wife—a bride only a few months ago—has begun a fight of habeas corpus to restrain the authorities from taking her husband to this leper farm. But while the motion was being argued in court to-day an ambulance had started Hartman on the way to the leper hospital.

The young wife then rushed to the hospital sobbing that no matter where her husband might be taken her place was by his side; that she would go wherever he went.

Dr. H. G. Woodruff, whose diagnosis has been unqualifiedly given to the effect that Hartman was a leper, gently told Mrs. Hartman that she would do well to give her resolutions the most careful consideration.

"If you decide," said he, "to go with him you will have to stay. You cannot come and go at will and you cannot leave at any time, even after his death, unless it is certain that you are free from the disease."

Hartman went to the hospital with no suspicion of having leprosy, but when he heard the diagnosis he recalled his army experience in the Philippines.

"I was put on duty guarding a leper camp there," he admitted to the surgeons, "and that's where I caught the disease."

The only other leper on the farm is a Chinaman in the last stages of the disease.

"Well," said Hartman fiercely, "if I am sent down the river, there to keep company with that Chinese leper—well, there will be two less lepers in the world."

If Mrs. Hartman should go to the farm she may never approach nearer to her husband than twenty-five feet.

North Sydney Gets First Sables Ever Imported to Canada

Three Beautiful Russian Sables, a Fur-bearing Animal, whose coat is so rich that it can place ban on its exportation, finds their way to North Sydney.

The North Sydney Herald to-day learns of the importation into this country by Mr. Ivan A. Bayley, of three valuable Russian sables, one male and two females. These animals are jet black and are without doubt the most precious fur in the world. The animals are about the size of a mink and is forest dwelling, climbing trees, and spending its time hunting among the branches.

The sables, just purchased by Mr. Bayley, were captured on the north shore of Lake Baikal, in Central Siberia, which district has always been famous for its black sables, some skins having sold for as much as 1,000 rubles, or equal to \$750 a piece.

The fur of the sable consists of a very fine thick under-fur, overlaid by two coats of over-hair, which has the peculiar property of laying any way it is brushed, and hence lies the value of the skins, being dependent on the thickness and fineness of the under-fur and the length, gloss and blackness of the beautiful over-hair.

Recently the Russian government absolutely prohibited the catching or exportation of any of these animals, owing to their extreme scarcity, and the Russians are now fully alive to the huge possibilities of ranching these most precious furs, so that it is an offence liable to severe punishment for a Monack or Siberian peasant to dare to catch a sable.

Fortunately these three animals in question were secured and taken from out of Russia before the passing of those laws, and these secured by Mr. Bayley are the first that have ever been imported into Canada, and will doubtless be the last for some years to come.

The three black beauties are to be the nucleus of a proprietary ranch here, for which a company is to be formed. And when it is considered that the Russian sable is about twelve times the value of the silver fox, comparison to size being duly considered, it can readily be seen that this is a move in the right direction.—North Sydney Herald, Aug. 13.

Robbery of \$10,000.

A sensational robbery of \$10,000, taken from the safe of Tooke Brothers, Limited, at their St. Henri factory, was reported recently, the perpetrators getting possession of papers and securities to that amount without the aid of dynamite or nitro-glycerine to blow open the safe. The lock was opened by working the combination.

The daring burglar or burglars made their successful attempt during the night, undiscovered by the watchman, the discovery of the robbery taking place in the morning when the certificates, and it is alleged currency, to the amount of \$10,000 was found to be missing from the compartment where it had been placed the night before.

The robbery has had its effect on the employees, who have lived in fear and trembling, the news having generated from the office to the factory, where every man has been working day after day with the knowledge that he is being shadowed to and from his work.

At noon the same espionage is kept up, the sleuths who are on the case being spotted in turn by the employees, who are living in dread of the outcome.

The exact amount of the robbery is not known, but the figures which the excited employees heard of, were \$10,000. An official of the company, however, stated that the amount was comparatively small.

How the office was entered with the watchman on guard, and the safe lifted without the use of anything but the knowledge possessed by the burglars of the combination is the strange feature of the case, as the combination was known but to a trusted few of the firm's employees.—Montreal Telegraph.

Matches.

The match is a small, one-legged explosive which can be carried in the vest pocket for years without igniting the wearer of the vest, but which in the hands of a small boy with a corn-silk cigarette becomes as dangerous as a bonfire in a dynamite factory. It is a very insignificant-looking object, but is really of more value to the human race than the electric egg beater or the reversible pancake skillet.

Matches are made of a low grade of sulphur and a high grade of hope, and can usually be lighted easily after the fourth attempt. They are so constructed that when they are struck on anything but the seat of a pair of blue serge trousers they will leave a long, ragged footprint, which causes every several hair in the head of a neat housewife to stand erect. If you enter a home in which none of these foot-prints is discernible, you can tell at once who wears the pants in that home. Many a man has started out in married life by striking matches on the sideboard and a white enameled plate rail, only to be tamed by a proud-spirited wife until he couldn't light his pipe without getting out of his chair and hitching one leg toward the ceiling.

The safety match is a recent invention which is designed to protect the American home and the over-hanging mustache. It comes in a box which is always up side down when you are in a hurry, and is ignited by being struck in the face by the box. The life of the average safety match is one-sixteenth part of a second, and if a man is agile it won't take over twelve of them to light a cigar. These matches are furnished free by the sleeping car companies, so that patrons will not scratch their mitts on the rosewood surroundings.

Matches are borrowed more often than anything else except trouble. The only time a man is out of matches is when he is on a fishing or hunting trip, when he is obliged to light one cigar from the other until all he can see is a giddy procession of shooting stars.

Violin Music Like The Singing of Angels.

SAYS HELEN KELLER.

Potoski, Mich., Aug. 13.—Miss Helen Keller, the blind, deaf and dumb prodigy, has heard music for the first time. With her teeth held against the bridge of a violin, she caught the vibrations of the notes and they were carried to her brain. Prof. Franz Kohler, of the Berlin Conservatory played for Miss Keller. The first note was sounded on the E string of the violin. Miss Keller was astonished. She had her teeth fairly against the instrument while Kohler played scales from Saint Saens, using the high and low registers. "Like the voices of singing angels," said Miss Keller, commencing to Miss Macey her teacher. She was exhausted from excitement. Miss Macey said that this was the first musical sound that has reached the brain of Miss Keller, despite reports of her previous knowledge of notes.
