**ESTIMATES INTRODUCED.**

LONDON, March 14. The House of Commons today introduced the estimates for the year 1916-17, which are the largest in the history of the British Empire.

**RUSSIAN OFFICIAL.**

PETROGRAD, March 14. On the Western front there has been heavy fighting southward of Lake Babitt. South east of the village of Podkamion and on the Middle Stripa sector and in Galicia, our patrols continue their operations with success against the enemy posts, and have made further progress. On the Caucasian front our troops continue to force back the enemy.

**GERMANY WILL MAKE COMPLETE AMENDS.**

WASHINGTON, March 14. Unofficial advices received here today, indicate that Germany will make complete amends to the United States if it is found that a German submarine torpedoed the Norwegian barque, Silius, from which seven Americans were rescued.

**THE APPAN AGAIN.**

NORFOLK, Va., March 14. Capt. Harrison, British master of the steamer Appan, which was brought into Hampton Roads on Feb. 21, as a German prize of war, had filed a libel against the Appan's cargo. A libel for possession of the steamer has already been filed. Because the cargo of a perishable nature, the proceedings will be expedited.

**FIRE AT HALIFAX.**

HALIFAX, March 14. The Immigration building at the deep water terminus on Old Pier No. 2, was totally destroyed by fire this morning. The building was a two-story one, and the fire ran through it like a tornado. A considerable quantity of Red Cross supplies from all parts of Canada was destroyed. The freight and Customs offices for the pier, the catering department for immigrants and the railway offices were in the burned building. The I.C.R. had a lot of railway tickets in their offices which were destroyed. John Downey, a stevedore, while handling the hose at the fire, was crushed down with some of the doors and drowned.

**COOK OR PEARY.**

WASHINGTON, March 14. Dr. Frederick A. Cook appeared today before the House Education Committee, in support of the Helgesen and Smith bills for a Congressional enquiry to determine whether he or Rear Admiral Robert Peary discovered the North Pole. Cook said he was the man. The Committee took no action other than to tell Cook that he might be given a chance to prove his claim.

**LEAVES BUCHAREST FOR BERLIN.**

LONDON, March 14. Baron von Dem Bussche Hadden-Hausen, special German Minister to Roumania, will leave Bucharest tomorrow for Berlin, says Reuter's Bucharest correspondent.

It is against murder, mutilations and aggression, hundreds of thousands of men of the British race have given their lives and limbs, and that millions of British men elected voluntarily to fight and that hundreds of thousands of British women have come forward to support them in the field. No man is allowed to do her part. Thousands of Newfoundlanders have enlisted here or abroad, but thousands more are wanted. The King needs them. Kitchener says so. Young men it is your duty to enlist, and to encourage them to go. Every man counts. Who will dare to be a slacker?

**Omitted From List.**

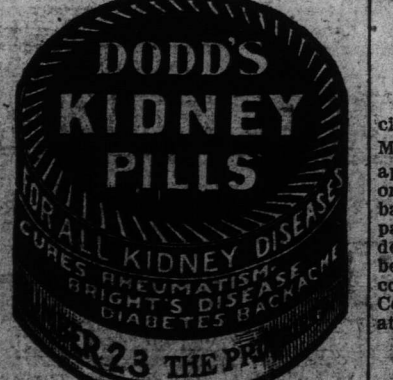

**An Unique Case.**

**Arrested for Enlisting.**

**RELEASED AND CONGRATULATED BY MAGISTRATE.**

A unique case was heard in the Magistrate's Court to-day. The principals in the case were two young men, James Watson and John Booth, aged 22 and 25 years respectively, of Pictou, Scotland. It appears that both young men had been engaged by the Scotch Herring Packing Company in Notre Dame Bay and had entered into an agreement to serve three years in the employ. They had served only but six months of that period and then decided to quit work and come on to St. John's to enlist, fearing that they would be conscripted, as they were registered in Scotland last August. They quit the job of herring packing, travelled over seventy miles through the interior of the country and came to St. John's by rail from Millertown Junction. On Sunday they arrived and on Monday offered their services at the Armory, telling of the agreement under which they had forfeited £5 sterling to enlist. The accepting of them was delayed pending negotiations. Meanwhile they were medically examined and passed as fit, and they began drilling, their attestation being delayed until the agreement was arranged as to the agreement. Meanwhile, on March 8th a warrant was taken out before a northern J.P. by the police here asked to arrest them under it. This was unknown to those conducting the negotiations. Yesterday they were arrested and the matter was described their employment. Dr. Lloyd appeared for them and questioned the propriety of the law of the warrant under the circumstances, explained that the young men considered that their duty was to join the forces, as they were registered in Scotland and that they did not do so they would be arrested and taken back to Scotland under the Compulsion Act and forced into the Army as Conscripts. They preferred to volunteer and came to St. John's to enlist. Dr. Lloyd asked for their release and that the matter be treated as a civil case, which could probably be settled amicably. Mr. F. J. Morris, K.C., who presided, intimated that whilst desertion was reprehensible, he had to congratulate the defendants in this case on their patriotism. Thereupon the volunteers were released.

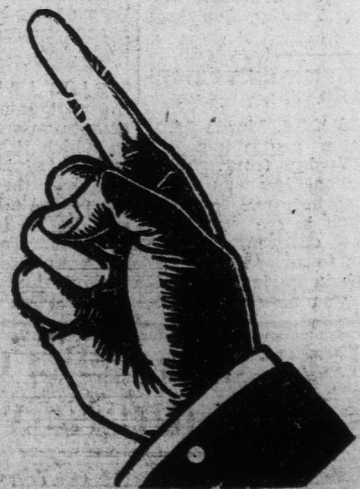

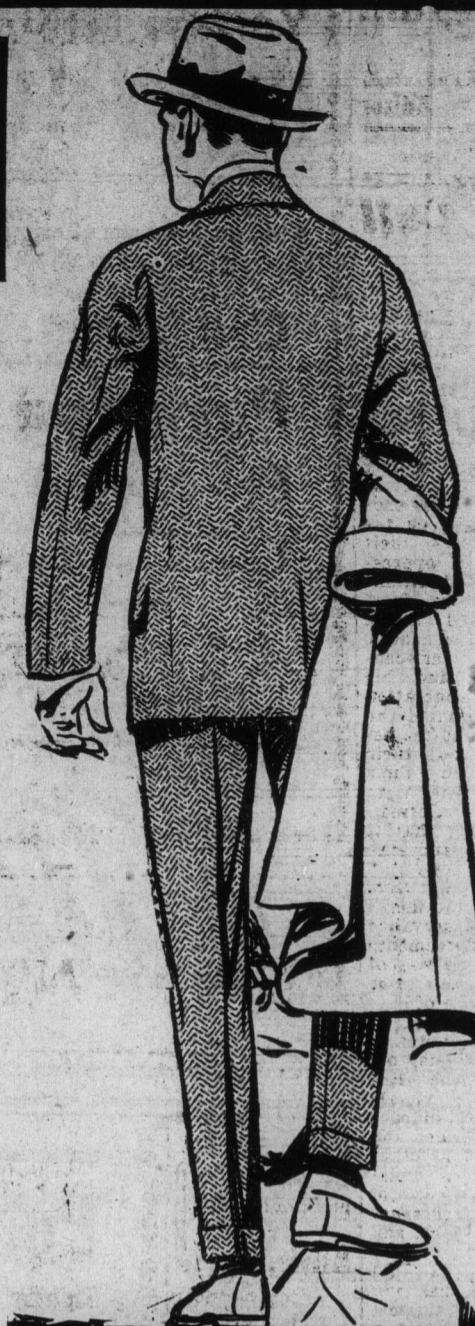

## Hair.

To quote Sir Arthur Conan Doyle "throughout the war he played manly and honorable part," and was characteristic of the man who when Buller and Boer laid down their arms, he set to work with General Buller to build up the great Union of South Africa.

**WRONG PRIDE.**

Not long ago I heard of a woman who, when her husband died, was left with a heavily mortgaged farm and a family of three small children to provide for. Her needs were desperate; she took desperate measures to meet them, domineering overalls a n.d. working about the farm herself, as hard and as long as day laborer. The first year she managed to pay the interest on the mortgage and feed her family. The second year, with courage and determination renewed she began to specialize in chickens and strawberries. She worked harder than ever; her hands grew rough, her complexion changed. But she wrung victory from defeat. The mortgage was lifted, she achieved a balance in the bank. As the children grew older she managed to send them, each in turn, to college. By that time, of course, she had men to relieve her from the drudgery of farm work. Can't her record one to be proud of? Couldn't you think that those children—two girls and a boy—would be proud of their mother and make her every act an expression of gratitude to her for all they had received from her? She was Ashamed of Her Mother's Sacrifice. I surely thought they would feel that way until, by chance, I met the mother daughter. I spoke to her of her mother and how much I admired her. She thought this would please the daughter, but it didn't. Instead, she spoke up, saying hastily:

"Oh, that is quite exaggerated. Mother never did such things. She really never worked hard at all." I thought, naturally, that I had made a mistake. But a friend of the mother explained the mystery to me. "Oh, the children are all ashamed of the fact that their mother worked as she did. You see they have been away to college and they have new friends and new ideas, and they do the best they can to keep people from knowing that their mother really worked like a man on the farm."

I do not know how the mother feels. I imagine that she finds excuses for her children, as mothers do. But I cannot. This mother was a heroine if one ever lived; her children are despicable. To be ashamed of such a mother!

The case is an extreme one, perhaps; but I wonder how many other parents there are who have worked unflaggingly through all their married life to give their children better things than they knew and whose only reward is the consciousness that the children are in their hearts, if not outspokenly, ashamed of them? Here is a Man Who is Proud of His Mother's Struggles. Consider the contrast offered by the case of a young man whom I knew only as a very successful young specialist, with a growing, increasingly profitable practice. I spoke of his success to him, as something he must take pride in. "I owe it to my mother," he said, promptly. "She kept a boarding-house and worked like a slave to send me through college. We were always on the narrow edge, but she never gave up. I wanted to quit but she wouldn't hear of it. Once, I remember, she became sick and the bills piled up, but her courage was never shaken. She didn't know what the work quit meant."

**Extraordinary German Sermons.**

"Perhaps there is no better way of getting an insight into the strangely perverted attitude of the German mind touching the present war than by reading passages taken from the sermons of their great preachers, which have recently appeared in German newspapers," says the Rev. William Burgess in the Methodist Times.

No Compromise With Hell.

"Pastor Zoebel, speaking in the great Lutheran Church in Leipzig, said:—

"It is this deep consciousness of our mission that permits us to congratulate ourselves, and rest content with a heart full of gratitude, when our guns beat down the children of Satan, and when our marvellous submarines—instruments to execute the Divine vengeance—send to the bottom of the sea thousands of the non-elect.

Divine Mission of Germany.

"We must fight the wicked with ever means in our power; their sufferings should give us pleasure; their cries of despair should not move German hearts. There ought to be no compromise with hell, no mercy for the servants of Satan—in other words no pity for the English, French and Russians, nor, indeed, for any nation that has sold itself to the Devil. They have all been condemned to death by a Divine decree."

"Pastor Fritz Philipp, of Berlin, from his Protestant pulpit, among other things, said:—

"As the Almighty allowed His Son to be crucified that the scheme of redemption might be accomplished, so Germany is destined to crucify humanity in order that its salvation may be secured. The human race can only be saved by blood, by fire and sword. German warriors do not shed blood with a light heart. They look upon it as a sacred duty imposed on them, a duty they cannot neglect without committing sin. Our beloved Emperor hates the horrors of war. Through long years he labored to maintain the peace of the world. Germany has never employed force to menace the independence of any nation.

"It is really because we are pure that we have been chosen by the Almighty as His instruments to punish the envious, to chastise the wicked and to slay with the sword sinful nations. The Divine mission of Germany, oh brethren! is to chastise humanity; the duty of German soldiers, therefore, is to strike, without mercy. They must kill, burn, and destroy; any half measures would be wicked. Let it then be a war without pity. The immoral and the friends and allies of Satan must be destroyed, as an evil plant is uprooted. Satan himself, who has come into the world in the form of a great Power (England), must be crushed.

"On Germany is laid the Divine command to bring about the destruction of those who are the personification of evil. When this work is finished, fire and sword will not have been used in vain. The redemption of humanity will be achieved. The kingdom of righteousness will be established on the earth, and the German Empire, which will have created it, will remain its protector."

A Killing Charity.

"Professor Rheindorf Seeb, who teaches theology in the Berlin University, preaching in the cathedral of the city, said:—

"We do not hate our enemies. We obey the command of God, who tells us to love them. But we believe that in killing them, in putting them to suffering, in burning their houses, in invading their territories, we simply perform a work of charity. Divine love is seen everywhere in the world, but men have to suffer for their salvation. Human parents love their children, yet they chastise them. Germany loves other nations, and when she punishes them it is for their good."

**Total Canadian Enlistments**

ARE 263,000 TO MARCH THE 1st. Ottawa, March 9.—Two hundred and sixty-three thousand recruits had been enlisted in Canada up to the first of March. These figures comprise the total from the time of the original enlistment at the outbreak of the war. Fifty-two thousand have been recruited from the East of the Ottawa River, and the remainder from West of that boundary. Ontario has raised 117,000; Quebec, 28,000; The Maritime Provinces, 24,000; and the Western Provinces, 100,000.

The enrolment by divisions is as follows: No. 1, London, 23,000; No. 2, Toronto, 40,000; No. 3, Kingston and Ottawa, 29,000; No. 4, Montreal, 29,000; No. 5, Quebec, 8,000; No. 6, Maritime Provinces, 24,000; No. 10, Manitoba and Saskatchewan, 50,000; No. 11, British Columbia, 25,000; No. 13, Alberta, 24,000.

Receives Letter of Thanks from Australian Soldier. Mrs. M. Bastow received the following letter from Private Carroll, an Australian soldier, thanking her for a pair of socks she had knit which he was wearing:—

Mosassar, 5/2/16. Dear Margaret Bastow—I am writing to let you know that in a pair of socks I got on the Peninsula or better known as the Dardanelles, I found inside a piece of paper, and on reading it I learn that you are the good-hearted friend, and I feel it my duty to write and thank you for the gift which the boys appreciate. It makes a fellow proud to think that some one takes an interest in the welfare of the men at the front. I suppose you have read all about our evacuation of the Dardanelles which was a great bit of work. I see by your note that you have a son at the front in the second contingent. I am sorry to say that it would take a lot of enquiry to find him as to find any one he wants to know, what battalion he is in and what company, but I will try and find him. I myself am an Australian and belong to the 15th battalion which comes from Queensland, Australia. I was on the Peninsula for three months and I was not sorry when we left. It was very cold when we were there, and in the end of November we had about six inches of snow and it lasted on the ground for a week. You can imagine what the Australians would think of snow considering about only one out of every hundred had seen it before. We have it very hot where we are now and I hope we are away before the summer sets in properly. Well I think I have told you all the news for the present, so I will conclude by saying that in the next time, and don't forget to write and let me know if you receive this. I remain your soldier friend, JIM CARROLL.

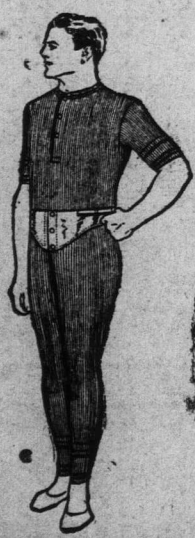

**Daring Adventure of a Russian Scout.**

A Russian scout tells the following story of his successful exploit behind the enemy's lines:

As I have a good knowledge of Polish I was sent to blow up some bridges in the Austrian rear. I changed my uniform for civilian dress, and, having crossed myself, left our trenches and crawled in the direction of the enemy's positions. On reaching the Austrian lines I suddenly heard voices to my right, so I quickly changed my course to the left, and succeeded in crossing a trench from which one could only hear measured snoring. It was a dark night and very late.

I ventured several steps forward, but was then unexpectedly met by a field patrol of 15 men. The commanding officer (an Austrian) seized me and began questioning me in Polish. He asked who I was, where I had come from, and how I had got there at that late hour. I told him that I was an Austrian Pole and had run away from the Russians in Tarnopol, as they had compelled me to dig trenches without any wages. The officer appeared to believe me, and told a Magyar soldier to take me to the staff of the regiment for examination.

When the guard and I reached the depths of the enemy's positions he asked me for a match, which a readily gave him, as I had a box in my pocket. He ordered me to stop, and I obeyed. He then leant his rifle against a tree, and, taking a pipe and tobacco out of his pocket, struck a light. It was still quite dark, and, taking my chance, with my left hand I grasped the rifle, while with my right I made a gesture as if I intended to blow my nose. With a violent swing I struck the man on the head with the butt end of the rifle, and he fell down without even uttering a cry.

Having satisfied myself that the Magyar was dead, I took off his Distinguished Conduct Medal and searching his pockets, where I found a book, from which it appeared that he had been a teacher in the Lvoff (Lemberg) Gymnasium. Dragging the body to the nearest ditch, I laid it down beside the rifle and continued my course toward the bridges which I was to blow up.

I wandered about for the rest of the night, and when it became too light to go on I lay down between some vegetable beds behind the ruins of a peasant's hut. From here I was able to observe the country and to find out from the map which I carried the places where the bridges would most probably be. I renewed my wanderings at the fall of darkness.

I reached the first bridge and saw the sentry with his rifle. On seeing me the sentry called out in German, "Wer kommt?" Instead of giving him an answer, I ran up to the bridge and threw four hand grenades one after the other. They were well aimed and the bridge with the sentry was blown into the air. The body fell into the river, and the bridge began to burn.

Not losing a moment, I ran on to the next bridge, which lay half a mile distant. The sentry was standing and staring at the burning bridge without paying any attention to me. As I approached I flung a grenade at a distance of fifteen paces. It struck the man's feet, and both his legs were torn off by the explosion. Then I quickly threw the remaining four grenades, and the bridge collapsed and began burning.

My task was accomplished, and I ran away as fast as I could and reached the destroyed hut where I had spent the previous day. Soon I heard an alarm which had been raised to catch me. Men or horseback galloped in search of me, but luckily they just missed me, and presently they disappeared in the distance. An hour after this I crept out of my hiding place and eventually reached the spot where I was first stopped. This time, however, I managed to slip past unnoticed, and, continuing on all fours, I soon got within our lines again. I was taken to the staff, my exploit was verified, and I received the St. George's Cross of the third degree.

**Your Boys and Girls.**

It should also be remembered that toys are not merely a source of amusement, but that they have an education value as well.
