



Dear Sir .- In view of the recen controversy, the following extract from a legal book of authority may be of public interest. It is my opinion It was finally decided that a con- he should not have been apprehended.

"In some cases a constable can ar rest a person without a warrant obtained before any arrest can be made. If a constable acts illegally he becomes liable to an action, which must be commenced within six calendar months from the date when the cause of action arose. A warrant is a document issued by a judge, justice of the peace, or stipendary magistrate authorizing the arrest of a person al

leged to have committed the crime.

A constable may without warrant arrest a person if he has reasonable grounds for believing that such person has committed a felony, or any person who commits a breach of the peace in his presence. Certain other offenders may be arrested without varrant e.g., any person found committing an indictable offence in the Sermon, Preacher, Rev. C. A. Born on August 6, 1775, in County All parties who intend drawing | Kerry, the son of a small landed proprietor, he delighted to style himself the Irish "agitator" or "liberator." When an Act of Parliament had admitted Roman Catholics to the barwhereas, if they insist on full suffrage grapnel not less than 25 lbs. atthey may be delayed one year, which is no delay at all, but certainly they marked with Christian and Surrister, from 1798, he earned a large income. Elequently and earnestly advocating the emancipation of Roman Catholics, he called the Dublin Corporation "beggarly," and being therefore challenged by Alderman D'Esterre, O'Connell killed him in a duel, but was prevented by the police from fighting another against Sir Robert Peel, baronet, then Chief Secretary for Ireland, and afterwards Prime Minister. O'Connell obtained a seat in the House of Commons, sitting successively for the County of Clare, the counties of Waterford and Kerry, twice for Dublin, and at other times for Kilkenny and Cork, thus remaining a member of that House for eighteen years, and in seven Parliaments; always on the side of the Whigs, as Radicals and Liberals were called in those days. He had been educated at St. Omer's and Dousy, but preferred to enter the legal proession instead of the priestly one. Retiring from the arena of political strife, he commenced a pilgrimage in 1847, more for devotion than for health, towards Rome, but he had proeeded no farther than Genoa, in Italy, when, with comparatively little suffering, he expired, in his seventy second year. His heart was embal ed, and carried to Rome; and his body





The very many friends of Thomas Slaney will regret to hear of his death at Camden, N.J., a few weeks ago. 

Famous Austrian Crown Jewels in Litigation

The Treasure Chamber.

The character of the Austrian in the sovereign was indicated by the fact that, together with the other re galia, it was kept not in a state build ing, but in the private treasury of the eigning house officially described as the treasure chamber of the most

Situated in the heart of Vienna this building, which before the war could be inspected by the public like a museum, housed one of the most as lery and other objects of value in the world. It was, indeed, rivaled only by the treasure vaults of the lat-Romanoff dynasty.

From the middle of the entury the various regalia gems and reasure chamber in glass cases There were several glass-walled wordrobes containing heralds' robe all richly ornamented with gold an ilver lace and embroidery and gems here were six large closets filled wit ine watches and clocks, many of then cellent working condition, some

Therewere several closets filled with vases, bowls, dishes, baptismal fonts, all carved of the finest crystal and smoky topaz. There was silver and gold plate and an enormous variety of most valuable curios.

But most important of all was the section called the "private jewellery of the imperial house." This depart ment included the imperial crown, the crown of the empress, the other re galia and a collection of diamonds rubies, emeralds and other germs that was the most astonishing hoard of its kind in the world, next, or rather equal, to that of the Romanoffs. It is the treasures listed in this section that will form the main subject of the proposed lilitagation between the republic of Austria and the ex-

Art Object of Exquisite Beauty.

The imperial crown is an art oblect of exquisite beauty and enormous value. It was made under the reign of the Roman emperor, Rudolph II. and bears the inscription "Rud. Rom. Imp. Hung. et Boh Rex. Contruxit, MDCVII." (Fashioned by Rudolphus, Roman emperor, king of Hungary and Bohemia, 1607.) It cost the for that time-tremendous sum of 700,000 imperial dollars.

The crown's head is of solid gold and consists of two parts a headband mounted with gems, upon which are mounted eight lily-shaped ornaments of two different sizes, richly jewelled and topped by large pearls. The blobular cap is divided into two triangular sections, each bordered by an enamelled band, which, again, are hemmed by rows of pearls. The hoop, richly set with gems, is surmounted by a small cross bearing an enormous sapphire of extraordinary beauty.

The imperial globe or apple was

made in 1607 of gold and ornamented like the crown. The sceptre was, on the first glance, similar to the crown and globe in workmanship and orna-mentation, but halled, however, from another master and dated from the





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
