



## **Educators Will Discuss** Building of Character.

WASHINGTON.-The recent action f the American Bar Association in promoting an active campaign for a law to compel the teaching of citizen ship in the public schools of the land has received widespread comment. There might even seem to be an implication that educators have not een looking after this very important phase of school work, but such is not the case, declares the Character Edcation Association, of this city.

Research on the problems of education for citizenship has been carried on by educators for several years, and at the forthcoming World Conference on Education, to be held in San Fransco next June, when delegates from all parts of the world will meet, this

"There is, however," declares the association's statement, "a larger movement going forward than merely the teaching of citizenship. This is 'character education," which has as its fundamental purpose the cultivation of the disposition and purpose to act right as citizens, and not merely or chiefly a knowledge of the constitution and the principles of govern-Statistics show that half of the notorious criminals and citizenship pervets of the nation are well inormed regarding the United States onstitution and the laws of the naion. These people take advantage of their legal knowledge to contrive ways and means of breaking the laws of the land without subjecting themselves to the danger of suffering the penalties of their crimes.

"The educators of America realize hat character forming should be one of the principal aims of our schools Inculcate in the child the will to do right and act right, and he will grow up to be a worthy citizen. Ignore the moral side and there is always the possibility that the more knowledge a citizenship or anything else, the greater criminal will he turn out to be eventually if the will to wrong doing is present. Many a defaulting bank president would be only a "second-story worker" but for an education that has neglected the moral ele-

The Character Education Associaion was organized to give impetus to the movement for character training. t is under the control of a board of trustees, all federal educators, and the state commissioners and superintendents of education, is non-commercial, and works under endowment. It recently completed a competition for a code of morals for children, and awarded the prize to William J. Hutchins, president of Berea College, This code is now used extensively in varous school systems through the





In the sphere of art also, Dr. Oldfield declared, although women had been busy painting their nails, eye lashes, lips, and faces for countless ages, if one sought paintings which would create emotion of the highest and best character for all time, one had to go to paintings done by men. If search were made in Westminster Abbeby for records of the great women of England one would find a few actresses and courtesans, but none who was worthy of being commemorated as poets, painters, scuptors, inventors, world ioneers, or world benefactors.

Having charged women with negecting the most sacred duties of otherhood and with having selected he doubtful pleasures of politics and public life in pace of it, Dr. Oldfield oncluded by saying that men were uperior and should be reverenced, and until women were taught to behe co-partnership of the sexes there would be no peace in life.


